### WHAT'S HAPPENING?



## Did you know?.....

Our town was named Wendell for a time, we still have Wendell Marsh, and the western section in the vicinity of Old Wendell Depot is known as Wendell—all named in honor **John Wendell**. But who was he? Was he the father of our town? Or a land speculator? Or perhaps a little of both?

John Wendell was born in Boston in 1731, entered Harvard College at the age of 15 and graduated in 1750, then moved to Portsmouth, NH and became a real estate attorney and broker of some repute. He received honorary Master's degrees from Yale (1768) and Dartmouth (1773) and was well connected to powerful men in Portsmouth and Boston.

When our town was formed as a proprietary in 1768 and named Saville, Wendell was one of 85 proprietors. He served as clerk for proprietors' meetings that were held in Portsmouth, advertised in Portsmouth for settlers, and otherwise worked to ensure successful settlement of this town and others. Records of the Saville proprietors' meetings are held by the Sunapee Town Clerk.



From 1768 until his death in 1808, John Wendell bought and sold lots in town in at least 80 real estate transactions. But he was more than just an absentee landlord. About 1770 he built a log cabin on the north side of Rand Pond on the Province Road, and he paid to have a small bolt mill (a kind of saw mill) built in 1774 on the Rand's Pond outlet brook for use by the local inhabitants. That's in the part of town that was first settled and later sectioned off to help form Goshen. The proprietors granted him one lot in exchange for building the mill and four lots came from Dartmouth College when he made a \$300 donation and received that honorary degree.

Wendell declared his support for independence in 1776 when he signed the Portsmouth Association Test and, according to Governor Bartlett in *Story of Sunapee*, he provided ammunition for defense of the town. When the town was incorporated in 1781 in the new State of New Hampshire, the name was changed from Saville to Wendell in his honor. That remained our name until it was changed to Sunapee in 1850.

When John Wendell died in 1808, he left his widow with 1,900 acres in Wendell, 2,000 acres in Springfield, and 6,800 acres in six other towns. Over the next 40 years, Widow Wendell and her sons sold about 50 lots in Wendell and let some of the property go in unpaid land tax sales. Most reports of our town's name change in 1850 attribute that action to a decision by the townspeople to match the name of the town to that of the lake and mountain. A report on town name changes in an 1862 Portsmouth *Journal* article, however, says that the only known reason was dissatisfaction with the family that owned so much land on which they paid so little taxes. So perhaps Wendell bought lots from proprietors



eager to sell but then was unable to "flip" them. Certainly, he does not appear ever to have planned to live here.

John Wendell's permanent residence was in Portsmouth. At one time he resided here (photo at left), at 7 Islington Street on the corner of Bridge Street, in a home now known as Buckminster House. It was built in 1720 by Daniel Warner and was later owned by Reverend Joseph Buckminster, pastor of Portsmouth's North Church.
