The really clinching factor in the outcome of the game was a shrewd re-shuffle by Sean MacManamon, the Salthill coach, when he placed Basil Regan, a powerfully built kicker, at full back and brought out Noel McDonagh to centre half back. The red-haired centre half had an immediate telling effect, as with much more freedom, he convincingly displayed attractive, all-round football ability. His anticipation was uncanny, and he evaded tacklers with ease, while his attcking role gave a plentiful supply to the forward line and thoroughly revealed the potential of the two wing forwards, P. J. Kelly

and Frankie Mitchell. The Renmore defence reeled under the onslaught but Sean Leen, having a superb game at full back, resisted stoutly with goalie John Nugent, Tony Canavan and Gerry Prendergast aiding admirably However, the game reached its climax when Frank Mitchell fielded magnificently near the Renmore square, came round an opponent to the edge of the small square only to be fouled in a treble tackle. Ballinasloe referee, Pat Vaughan pointed to the penalty spot and Niall Barrett goaled with consummate ease.

Kevin Connolly, Richie Comer and Michael Quigley dominated in the attack and Salthill pushed two points clear, with five minutes
