

They subsequently went on to win the competition for the first time ever and on Sunday at Strandhill Road they started off their defence in a similar winning fashion.

It was a badly depleted side that made the journey to Sligo as they were denied the services of goalkeeper Martin Greaney, Conor Molloy and Kevin Carr.

Once more Noel Greaney stepped in as net minder and for the second Sunday in succession made vital saves.



After the break, Rossi Flaherty and Eoin Keane began to get a grip in midfield and they were rewarded with the Keane equaliser when headed home powerfully Fahy's corner kick.

Despite creating a number of late opportunities it was left to the shoot out to decide the issue as Renmore finally got their reward.

In recent weeks, West look potential like more champions than relegation candidates as they continue their quest to get away from



the foot of the table.

At least they achieved that on Sunday because as a result of the point gained they moved off the bottom of the table for the first time this season.

Looking back they could see this game as two points lost. Having had a strong wind advantage they led 2-0 at the interval and with Hibernians down to 10 men, following the dismissal of Dave Samuels, the advantage lay with the home side.

It was two crisp strikes from Alan beatty and Shane Flaherty that gave them that first half lead as poor finishing denied them further reward.
