IN ONE of the most exciting finals of the Club Cup in many a year at Galway Golf Club, three handicapper Peter Scott "came of age" when he defeated Club Captain Sean Hosty (2) on the twenty-first;

The match sea-sawed wildly with Scott turning three up after nine, but Hosty came back to bring it to all flat (he won ten, thirteen and fifteen), but then Scott (who had previously won the fifth, sixth and ninth), struck back to win sixteen with a superb second shot after Hosty caught the edge of the furze with his drive.

Back came Hosty to win seventeen with a birdie three and get back to all flat, and when they halved the eighteenth in regulation fours, it was across the road and into extra time for a match that had by then begun to pick up a

On the first extra hole, Scott hit a second shot that came in for high praise from Hosty as "the best pressure shot" he had seen in a long time. They halved it in fours with Scott on the green and Hosty pitching in and holding from four feet for his four.

The battle finally ended on the twenty first when Scott left his second shot short and later holed from six feet for a four, while Hosty downwind mishit an extremely delicate pitch to the pin on the front edge, and failed

On the way to the final-Scott had beaten Sean O Muircheathaigh, to won he had to give fourteen shots, and he also beat Andy Bradley, a two handicapper. Hosty beat Padraic O'Connor (5) and beat Pat Barton in a sparkling game that ended on fourteen with Hosty three under par. In fact just qualifying was quite a trick with only 67 net qualifying.

It has been quite a year for Club Captain, Sean Hosty, for with his second place in the Club Cup he is now leader in the Golfer of the Year Competition, has brought his handicap down to two again (he is former scratch, Walker Cup trialist and Interpro and plays Senior Cup) and this year has been particularly enjoying his game and playing really well despite not practising and getting in very little golf except at weekends. On Sunday last he was second to former Senior Cup team-mate Des

Mahon, now playing out of Ennis, when Mahon, off two, won the Galway Guinness Senior Scratch Cup beating out Hosty by one shot on a stormy day when two rounds of 69/74 were good enough to give the Cup to Mahon. Hosty scored 73/71.

In his third win in the competition, previously won twice by Sean Hosty, Mahon laid the foundation with a splendid level par round of sixty-nine in the morning when he picked up two birdies, dropped two shots and parred the fourteen other holes on the course.

Notable Putts

Though he had only twenty-six putts in his morning round, Mahon did not really have to hole anythjing spectacular before lunch, his most notable putts being a twelve footer on the third, knocking one in from ten feet at thirteen, and an eight footer at sixteen.

The excellent figures in the morning round were largely attributable to good driving, hitting many of his greens and, where necessary, leaving the chips dead.

It was in the evening round that Mahon produced the putting magic holing from thirty-five feet for four (par) at the second, ten feet for a one over five at the third, fifteen feet for a birdie three at eight, eight fewet for a par four at ten, and eight feet for a four at the eleventh where he had trouble clubbing in the big following wind at the relatively easy par four.

But he reserved the magic for the end when he knew that Hosty had done either a 70 or 71 last round (word was that it was a 70 whereas Hosty had actually done 71) - Mahon holed from thirty feet down along the "hog's back" on which the pin was sited on sixteen for a birdie three, and then finished with regulation fours on seventeen and eighteen.

At the end of the round, Mahon had many tributes to pay to the Galway course which was his 'home' for so many years, and had special words of praise for the condition of the greens and the way in which the trees have "tightened up" the course - he and Donal Kenny were hitting irons from the tenth, eleventh, thirteenth and seventeenth tees, though admittedly

part of the reason was a gale behind on ten and eleven. One of the most remarkable rounds of the day was that of three handicapper Seamus McEvoy who had a tremendous one under par 68 in the morning when his old putting touch returned at its best --- would you believe twenty-five putts. In the afternoon he could not match that in the

wind which upset so many scores. In fact recent weeks have some quite amazing scoring - perhaps the title for 'round of a lifetime' going to eleven handicapper Adrian Glynn in the Rooney Memorial Intermediate Scratch Cup where he produced a level par first round of 69 that would have put many a scratch player to

The round, which put him a laughable eleven shots ahead of his nearest rival, consisted of eight pars and one birdie on the front nine, a shot dropped on the tenth, and then eight more pars to follow in a card that was Glynn's best round ever (by about five shots) and read like the efforts of a

very low handicapper. But the cold figures disquised the drama that went into its compilation - Adrian says he holed everything from eight feet (eat your heart out Des Smyth), he twisted his ankle and tore ligaments in a hole on thirteen, started with a damaged four iron, and then broke the shaft of his putter on seventeen and had to finish out catching the club down what remained on

The drama didn't all consist either of damage to club or person - on sixteen he drove into furze on the left, hacked out across the fairway into light roung on the right of the fairway, hit a nine iron to the green to one

foot, and, you guessed it, holed for his four. Eleven shots ahead of the field, he, not surprisingly, found it hard to concentrate and keep it all going in the afternoon nine holes, and in the best traditiona of this humbling game he shot a glorious forty-nine,
