


Sims, Chandler sign with Indiana

What do The Plain Dealer's top basketball player and wrestler have in common?

They're both going to Indiana University.

Malcolm Sims, a 6-4 forward-guard from Shaker Heights and Roger (The Hammer) Chandler, the Division I state wrestling champion at 140 pounds from St. Edward, officially signed national letters of intent with Indiana. The NCAA's signing period began yesterday.

Sims, The Plain Dealer's basketball player of the year, was the area's leading scorer with an average of 27.9 points a game. He was a threetime MVP of the Lake Erie League and a three-time first-team PD All-Scholastic.

Voted the Division I player of the year in the state by the Ohio High School Basketball Coaches Associa-

tion, Sims selected the Hoosiers over Providence, Pittsburgh, Minnesota, Marquette and Miami (Fla.).


"First of all, what drew me to Indiana was the academics," Sims said. "As a kid, I always dreamed of playing for coach (Bobby) Knight. He's one of the greatest coaches in the nation."

Chandler, The Plain Dealer's wrestler of the year, won all 40 matches, with 36 pins, en route to his state title.

"Roger will give our wrestling program a real shot in the arm," said Indiana wrestling coach Joe McFarland, who was a two-time state champ at North Olmsted.

Tony Pariano, a two-time Division II state champ from Fairview and winner of the Cleveland Touchdown Club's 1992 Lee Kemp Award as the area's outstanding wrestler-scholar, signed a letter of intent with Northwestern.


The 6-4 sophomore forward dominated at both ends of the court in leading the Red Raiders to victories over Padua, 94-81, and Lakewood, 75-51.



Against Padua, he scored 20 of his gamehigh 34 points in the second half as Shaker Heights broke open a tight game. He connected on 16 of 26 shots from the field and was two of two from the foul line. He added 13 rebounds, eight assists, six steals and two blocked shots.

In a little more than two quarters at Lakewood, he had 17 points, nine rebounds, four steals and a blocked shot.

A key to Shaker Heights' 11-2 start, Sims was an All-Lake Erie League selection last season.

Vikings triumph despite Sims' 55 points

After losing two consecutive games in overtime and having their record drop below .500, the Villa Angela-St. Joseph Vikings admittedly had some doubts about their season.

But there is nothing like a couple of victories over two of the area's best to restore your confidence.

VASJ, the defending big-school state champion, withstood a 55-point performance by Shaker Heights all-state senior forward Malcolm Sims and defeated the Red Raiders, 82-72, last night in an independent game at Villa Angela-St. Joseph.

"It was nice to play in front of a friendly crowd for a change," said Vikings coach Mike Moran, referring to the two overtime losses at Akron Central-Hower and Massillon.

"It was the little things that we got done this week. We were definitely more consistent."

While the Vikings' victory, which came on the

heels of a 58-57 victory over St. Ignatius on Friday night, was impressive, it was overshadowed by the play of Sims.

"My God, he was just amazing," said Moran. "He's the Superman of area high school ball."

VASJ, which improved to 8-7, led, 23-11, after junior forward Brian Hocevar beat the first-quarter buzzer with a dunk.

Hocevar scored eight of his team-high 23 points in the first eight minutes, hitting 4-of-5 shots from the field.

Sims, a two-time MVP of the Lake Erie League, accounted for all 11 of the Red Raiders' first-quarter points.

With Sims continuing to supply the offense, Shaker Heights cut the deficit to 27-22 on a follow by Sims with 4:41 left in the first half.

But VASJ, led by 3-point baskets by guards London Fletcher and Michael Wojciechowski, went on an 18-10 run and took a 45-32 lead at halftime.

Sims scored 25 points in the first half, hitting 11

of 13 shots from the field. He had 30 points in the second half. For the game, he was 20-of-25 from the field, including three 3-pointers, and 12-of-15 from the foul line.

"The last time I saw an individual performance like that was in 1979 when Clark (former Vikings standout Clark Kellogg) scored 51 in the state championship game," said Moran.

With the victories over St. Ignatius and Shaker Heights, VASJ defeated the fifth (Shaker Heights) and sixth-ranked teams in The Plain Dealer's Top 30 poll. The Red Raiders lost for only the second time in 13 games.

The Vikings, who are competing in Division II this season, led, 60-45, entering the fourth quarter and increased their lead to 71-48 with 4:30 left.

Moran made what Shaker Heights coach Bob Wonson described as a "class move" when he allowed Sims to go in for an uncontested dunk in the final seconds, the two points that set what Wonson thought to be a school record.

"The kid can play, can't he?" said Wonson as he was going over the scorebook at halftime.



Sims strives to drive Shaker to new heights

Every morning at 7, it's the same routine.

The soft baseline jump shots, the strong drives to the basket and the high-arching attempts from 3-point range.

For Malcolm Sims, Shaker Heights High School's 6-4 junior forward, the hour of practice before school is part of his long-range plan.

"I want to do things that will improve my game, things that will help me move up to another level," said Sims, who last season became the first sophomore since former St. Joseph High standout Clark Kellogg to be named to The Plain Dealer's All-Scholastic basketball team. Kellogg went on to play at Ohio State and for the Indiana Pacers in the NBA.


"And I want to help Shaker get a bigger name."

With Sims playing a major role, the Red Raiders have already made a name for themselves.

Under the direction of coach Bob Wonson, Shaker Heights has won three consecutive Lake Erie League titles. Last season, the Red Raiders advanced to regional play for the first time.

Sims, who was introduced to basketball in the sixth grade, earned all-LEL honors as a freshman. He was the league's most valuable player last season.

"He's an outstanding athlete and

very much an improved player from last year," said Wonson, who is in his sixth season at Shaker Heights. "His competitiveness is what stands out.

as hard as he does."

Sims said his first loves were swimming and football.

"I learned to swim when I was 4, and football was all I played seriously until I was 13," Sims said. "But then I started playing basketball in the back yard with my older brothers, and by the time I was in the eighth grade, I was competing with the guys from high school.

"Julius Erving was my inspiration. I just loved to see him play. Watching him taught me the importance of opening up my game more and learning to create things on the court."

In earning all-district and Associated Press all-state special mention honors last season, Sims put up Erving-like numbers.

He averaged 19.7 points and nine rebounds per game, shot 78% from the foul line, and had 56 assists as the Red Raiders had a school-best 21-3 record.

"His versatility is his greatest asset," said Wonson, who previously coached at Lakewood and Crestwood high schools and was an assistant to George Raveling at Iowa and Washington State universities. "He does everything pretty well."

"In 21 years of coaching, I've never seen a kid who could care less about scoring and more about winning than Malcolm," Wonson said.

The bigger the game, the more likely he is to play well, and the bigger the shots, the more likely he is to make them. With Malcolm, you know he's going to do everything he can to get ready to play."

The youngest of five children, Sims speaks fondly of his family, which includes his mom, Billie; dad, Robert; sisters, Carlene and Rhonda; and brothers, Daniel and Jamal.

He credits former teammates
Vada Burnett and Derek White for
helping him through his freshman
season and says that Wonson has
had an impact on his life.

"Coach Wonson is just a great person," said Sims. "The players love him. He knows what it takes to win, and his attitude has carried over to me. He's been a big influence."

Wonson said that Sims has received more than 1,000 letters from colleges and universities.

Sims says he's prepared to face the pressure that follows a banner season and that he has already overcome a major obstacle in the preseason — arthroscopic surgery on his left knee.

"I had it done on Aug. 28," Sims said. "It doesn't bother me at all. I did a lot of weightlifting and bicycling to get it back to 100 percent. I feel streamenthen cure."

That's bad news for Shaker
Heights' opponents.

Combining his unselfish style with 6-7 center DeShaun King and point guard Doug Underwood, both standouts last year. Sims says he's looking for the Red Raiders to take another step this season, one that would carry them to the state finals.

"Malcolm is able to deal with adversity better than any high school player I've been around," said Wonson. "He has set high goals, yet he's realistic enough to know his game is not yet where he wants it to be.

"With Malcolm, however, you know he'll keep working to get it there."

Sims the first to hit 1,000-point barrier

There was one especially bright spot about Malcom Sims breaking the 1,000-point barrier Friday night on Shaker's home floor (in a 78-69 win over Lakewood); he's only a junior.

"I hope he scores a lot more points for the school," said head coach Bob Wonson.

"Malcom has been a starter and featured performer since his freshman year," the coach explained. "It's a nice milestone for him to hit. I'm just glad it's over, because it may have taken some of the focus away from the team, but it's (the point barrier) unavoidable.

"One thing is for sure, Malcom is one of the best, if not the best player to ever play at Shaker."

Sims is the first person ever to reach the plateau for the Raiders and is the school's all-time career scorer.

Sims went into the Lakewood game with 993 points for his 21/4 seasons of work.

His 1,000-plus parade followed this course:

First period: 5:31, short jumper left side of key; 2:23, hit one of two free throws.

Second period 5:32, three-pointer from the left wing; :54, layup in the paint off a missed shot for

1,001 carrer points.

. Sims went on to finish the game with 17 points.

Sims, ironically, was concentrating on improvement when he reached the milestone.

"I noticed in some films during the week, my form was all wrong, so I worked on changing my form," said the sharp shooter.

"It was smooth at the start, but it then took time to get use to it.

"Reaching 1,000 points was nice, but getting the win was bigger," he added. "But I want to thank all the players that I've been with that helped me get to this level—from Vada Burnett to Doug Underwood and everyone in between."


The main focus for Sims and his mates is the LEL and then down the road a bit.

"We want to win the league, but then we'll be getting ready to play the big schools in the tournament.

"That's what we want, to get back down to Akron (regionals) and farther."


If Sims and his new look jumper clicks in like the old jumper, the Raiders may be doing some damage south of Shaker Heights in March.

Shaker Heights trounces Lakewood

Shaking his head and smiling, Shaker Heights basketball coach Bob Wonson tried to explain the first nine minutes of last night's Lake Erie League game at Lakewood.

"To be honest, I think we were too excited at the start," Wonson said. "I don't know, maybe it came too easy at first."

Shaker Heights, defending champion of the LEL, squandered a 13-point first-quarter lead and came back to dominate Lakewood, 85-64, in the league opener for both teams.

The Red Raiders, who have won three straight LEL titles, improved to 3-0 overall and Lakewood dropped to 1-2.

"I don't care what anybody says," said Wonson, who led Shaker Heights to a school-best 21-3 record last season. "When you get into LEL play, there aren't going to be any walkovers."

For the first three minutes, Shaker Heights had everything go its way.

With 6-4 forward Malcolm Sims and 6-7 center DeShaun King controlling the offensive boards and 5-11 point guard Doug Underwood leading the Red Raiders' man-to-man full-court defense, Shaker Heights jumped to a 17-4 lead.

When it appeared the rout was on, Lakewood, which finished 6-15 last season, came to life behind reserve guard Corey Rossen.

Forcing turnovers, the Rangers outscored the Red Raiders, 18-3, over the next six minutes, taking a 22-20 lead on a layup by forward Joe Armstrong with seven minutes left in the first half.


After hitting seven of its first 11 shots, Shaker Heights made one of its next 12.

"Heck, we jump to a big lead and the next thing I know we're behind," said Wonson, who said he had some strong words for his team during a timeout with 3:20 remaining in the first quarter.

"But I think we grew up a lot tonight. We got back control of the game midway through the second quarter and we




Malcolm Sims, right, and Doug Underwood double-team an unidentified Shaw player.



Boys basketball defeats Shaw, advances to regionals Sims leads Raiders in 78-71 victory

Led by junior Malcolm Sims' 37 points, the Raider basketball team beat the Cardinals of Shaw High 78-71 in the district championship on Saturday.

It was the third year in a row that the teams met for the district title. Shaker has won the past two.

The teams played to a draw in the first half with a 37-37 score at the intermission. That is when head coach Bob Wonson and his team decided to turn up the intensity.

"At the half we made a great commitment to get the ball down low," Wonson said.

The squad did just that, feeding the ball time and again to Sims, who exploded for 17 points in the third period and 25 on the half.

"It was always just a matter of getting me the ball underneath," Sims said with the net around his neck. "Nobody covered me all game."

Led by Sims outburst, the passing of senior Doug Underwood and the defense of senior DeShaun King, the Raiders out-scored Shaw 23-16 in taking a 60-53 lead after the third period.

In the huddle after the period, a calm Wonson tried to relax his excited players.

"We've beaten them six out of the last eight times that we've played them," Wonson said. "This is just another day at the office, We're better than them.

The Cardinals two victories came in the 1989 district finals, and earlier this year in a regular season game.

According to Sims, the earlier loss to Shaw was in the back of the team's minds.

Throughout the year, the team has tried to play together as a team. According to King, who had 19 points, the team put everything together for the showdown.

"This is the best we've played all year," King said. "We played like a family."

The team had high hopes going into the regional tournament.

Wonson was cautiously optimistic.

"There's good news and there's bad news," Wonson told his team in the locker room following the game. "The good news is that we go to Akron. The bad news is that it gets tougher."

"I know one thing though," Wonson continued. "We aren't going to be afraid. We've been there before."


Last year the team lost to St. Josephs 66-65 in overtime in the first round of the regional. This year they hope to go further.

"Final four baby, that's our mission," Underwood said. The region, which includes Villa Angela St. Joseph's, Barberton and Toledo St. John's, as well as Shaker was described by Wonson as the toughest of the states four regions.

Because the Shakerite went to press on Monday, the Barberton game could not be covered. If they win, they will face the winner of Toledo St. John's and VA/SJ. If they lose, they still will have equaled the best year in Shaker history by making the "sweet 16."

Former Raider basketball player Mike Matthews, who is currently a freshman at Miami University in Florida, was on hand to see the game. He had his own assessment of this year's team.

"This year was harder for them than last year," Matthews said. "They had to work for whatever they got."

Sims scored 25 second half points to keep the Cardinals at bay. Hitting driving layups, at the foul line, and from longrange, Sims scored a game high 37 points.





Sims work ethics keeps Shaker undefeated

Scores 37 points in 78-63 victory over Cleveland Hts.

It was advertised as the matchup between two Lake Erie League powerhouses—the undefeated Shaker High Red Raiders (6-0), and the Tigers of Cleveland Hts. (4-3 overall, 3-0 in the LEL). It began on Shaker's home court, and ended with Malcolm Sims shooting out the lights with a 37-point performance.

This one could have been the Malcolm Sims Show, for the scholar/athlete was all over the place: blocking shots, hitting 3-pointers, grabbing rebounds, dishing out assists, and scoring slam-dunks three-feet above the basket.


Sims had a feel for the game from the start said Red Raiders' head coach Bob Wonson. Sims led Shaker to a 12-point lead (20-8) after 8 minutes into the first quarter. The half ended with the Red Raiders holding on to an eight-point lead (39-31).

The scrappy Tigers led by 6-7 center Jauron Connally, mounted a run to close the gap to two points mid-way through the final period (57-55), before Sims shifted into second gear—accounting for eight points in a 13-0 run to put the game out of reach. His tally for the fourth quarter was 12 points, including seven free throws.

"Malcolm's got a tremendous will," said Wonson. "I told the guys after the third quarter that it was going to be a battle or will, whichever team wanted it more."

Complementing Sims' outstanding performance: seven assists, 16 rebounds,

four steals, and three blocked shots were: Kyle Withers (17 points); Antiuan Taylor (11); Travis Kennebrew and Anton Hameed (4 points each); Quinn Chambers (3); and Markie Hall, two points. 



"Malcolm has been offered a scholarship from Marquette, but the subject of him signing never even came up," said Shaker Heights coach **Bob**





Cleveland State's Malcolm Sims drives past La Salle's Jasper Van Teeseling during the Vikings' 81-78 victory last night.


