A Worship Technology Update:

It's amazing to think that in just two years, we've gone from a single access worship (in-person only) to a completely hybrid 3-point model (in-person, live streamed, and recorded). Our hybrid worship has enabled people to continue worshiping with their RBC family even when they are sick, traveling, or unable to get out. We've reconnected with RBCers who had been unable to worship with us due to distance or inability to leave their home. As we've all navigated health needs and risks during this time of pandemic, our ability to worship together has not been impacted because we've remained connected virtually.

The pandemic fast-tracked many of these technology changes that would otherwise have taken years. And yet we still have a ways to go. We are aware that the connection isn't always great and that the sound quality can be difficult to hear at times, and we are working on it. As you might imagine, upgrading our outdated system has taken a lot of people-power and financial power. This, along with world-wide supply chain issues, is taking a while to resolve yet we are grateful to be moving forward. We appreciate everyone's patience as we continue to live into this new mode of worship and connection.

In addition to having online worship available for two years, some other technology changes you may have noticed:

- New television displays in the sanctuary (thanks to a very generous donation!)
- · Improved graphics
- Improving sound thanks to the purchase of a new sound board (and still a work in progress!)
- Steadier connection

One big change since moving into the sanctuary is that we are no longer using Zoom for worship time, but rather live-streaming on YouTube/our website. This gives us a much steadier connection, but it also means that people worshiping at home cannot see one another. If you are worshiping online, one way you can feel more connected is to use the chat box on YouTube. Say "hi" or "amen" - greet and interact with your fellow RBCers.



What can you do to help with these technology transitions:

- If you are in-person and having trouble hearing, try moving forward in the sanctuary
- If you are speaking during worship, be sure to hold the microphone close to your mouth
- If you are online, use the chat to interact with other worshippers
- Volunteer to be trained on our new systems to free up our tech coordinator to focus on troubleshooting
- If you notice some technology malfunctions during worship, pray for our worship team. They most likely are aware of the issue and trying to resolve it on the fly.

FROM THE GREEN TEAM

Did You Know...

According to Green Matters, the percentage of recycling that actually gets recycled is both surprising and disconcerting. About 35% of the total amount that Americans generated was actually recycled. It feels like we are trying harder, yet the sad reality is that there are many flaws in the process itself. Plastic, metal, glass and paper are the most common, yet they all recycle with varying degrees of success. Plastics recycled are only 9%, metals are 69%, glass is 31%, and paper is 68%. These figures are from a couple years ago. So, what is the good news? And how does this affect our recycling efforts? Read on, McDuff!

An innovative company was established in 2001 called Terracycle, a social enterprise on a mission to eliminate the idea of waste. In fact, they have taken on a difficult goal – to recycle the un-recyclable. "Nearly everything we touch can be recycled." They have begun a first-of-theirkind-program. Leading companies work with them to take hard-to-recycle materials, and turn them into new products. They provide services, for a fee of course, to recycle everyday items which curbside will not pick up. For example: Styrofoam, clamshells, trays, single-use cutlery, candy wrappers, and much more. Their theory is to "Eliminate the Idea of Waste". They are moving from a linear economy where we throw things "away", to a circular one, where waste is used to make new products. For these efforts, they have won over 200 awards for social entrepreneurship and sustainable business.

Here's how it works: Consumers choose which items they would like to recycle. For example: shoes, disposable gloves, small action figures, coffee bags, razors, tape dispensers, pens and markers or batteries. There are hundreds of options. They choose the size container to order, from a pouch, a box, a bucket, or a pallet. After sending the fee, Terracycle sends the chosen container. When it is filled up, there is a prepaid label to mail it back. You can either wait to order again, or they will automatically send you a new one. It's pretty slick, really. And it is guaranteed that these hard-to-recycle items will be made into a new product, instead of going to the landfill.

So, how does this affect RBC? We are going to give it a try, with alkaline batteries, including AA, AAA, C, D, and 9 volt. We will order the small bucket, which holds up to 10 lbs of batteries. When it is full, we just mail it back. We do have to tape the top of each battery, but they tell us how to do that. After we see how it goes, we might do it again, or try another item, like razors, or pens and markers. The price for each is different, so it is definitely a consideration. But, isn't this cool? Those batteries that would go to the landfill now have a place to be recycled. I invite all of you to take part, in supporting this ministry. Your job is to bring in your alkaline batteries, of the sizes mentioned above. We will have a box to receive them, near the box for the caps (across from the nursery). When it is full, then we have done a great service to keep these batteries out of the landfill. Let us try this first, and see where God leads us next.







RBC BOOK CLUB



Charlotte Rowe was orphaned in Lancaster and overcame scandal and prejudice to become an educator in India and America's first appointed woman missionary. After a decade of service in 'Hindustan,' she taught in Philadelphia and Alabama before moving to Strasburg, eight miles from her childhood home. There she restarted the Strasburg Female Seminary as its new principal. Charlotte Rowe (d. 1863) lies buried in St. James Episcopal Church cemetery. Her life story invites examination of gender bias today.

In response to immediate needs resulting from the Russian invasion of Ukraine that began on February 24, 2022, International Ministries, on behalf of American Baptist Churches USA, has sent an initial grant of \$15,000 in One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) emergency relief to the European Baptist Federation to provide humanitarian aid for Ukrainian Baptists. This grant joins a larger, global Baptist response to this evolving situation.

Since early 2022, the world has watched as tensions escalated along Ukraine's border with Russia. Sadly, on February 24, Ukrainians woke to the sounds of sirens and falling artillery as Russia launched a full-scale invasion by land, air, and sea. "The threat of this incursion is something that Ukrainians have lived with since 2014, when Russia invaded and annexed the Crimean Peninsula from Ukraine," says Lisa Rothenberger, IM's World Relief Officer. "We have stood with our Ukrainian Baptist brothers and sisters since 2014, with our prayers and financial resources, and we continue that support today. We know that what is unfolding today will create enormous social, economic, and political challenges."

Initial relief will provide basic provisions—food, shelter, medicine, and hygiene items—to at least 2,500 people who are fleeing their homes. Displaced people will be served by distribution centers set up by the Ukrainian Baptists to provide temporary shelter and relief. In addition, the threat of the incursion and the invasion have resulted in refugees fleeing to neighboring countries. In those countries, Baptists are also responding. There will be ongoing needs both within Ukraine and in the surrounding countries.

Our global servants in Europe are all well and safe; we ask for your prayers for their continued security.

While our financial support will provide for physical needs, the need for prayer is paramount. IM Area Director for Europe, the Middle East and Liberia Rev. Charles Jones shares, "We ask American Baptists to join in prayer for our Baptist sisters and brothers, and all the people of Ukraine: for protection and provision for those who suffer, and for peace to be restored. And for our Baptist sisters and brothers and all peace-loving people in Russia, that God will give them courage to pursue peace."

Additional relief is urgently needed. Persons wishing to support relief efforts can do so through their American Baptist church, **by giving online**, or by sending checks directly to International Ministries. Please designate your contribution to "OGHS–Ukraine Relief."
