## Update on RBC Property Exploration

As of June 1, RBC has officially begun an exploration process with the consulting group Sympara as to what possibilities exist for our property. Sympara's mission is to repurpose religious assets for the common good. A team of 8 of us from RBC (Pastor Sarah, Mark Hite, Nancy O'Neil, Mary Panetta, George Reitnour, Kay Rolfs Massaglia, Deb Savage, and Reid Trulson) will meet throughout the summer with Sympara's founder and CEO to explore the needs of the community around us, take stock of the assets RBC has, and explore possible ways we can respond to God's call to us here in Royersford and beyond.

*This team is not a decision-making team.* We are using this time to thoughtfully and prayerfully discern and explore what might be next for RBC. At the end of our exploration period, we will report to the congregation what we've learned and possible steps forward.

I invite you to be in prayer for our team and our whole congregation in the coming months. I'm excited to see where God will lead us in this next phase of ministry together!

## CHRIST, COVID, CHURCH AND CHANGE by Reid Trulson

We thank God that COVID-19 is currently under control in Montgomery County. For three consecutive weeks prior to this writing, the positivity rate in the county has been less than 1%. A positivity rate of 5% indicates that the virus is under suppression, and a positivity rate of 1% indicates the virus is under control.

A *Wall Street Journal* opinion writer noted that our nation has been experiencing “a plague of biblical proportions.” He observed, “Sometimes the most important ingredient for spiritual renewal is a cataclysmic event.” (Source: Robert Nicholson, “A Coronavirus Great Awakening?” *Wall Street Journal*, March 26, 2020)

Here is one aspect of renewal that the pandemic has taught us: RBC will be best served by being a hybrid church that continues to offer in-person as well as online worship, gatherings, meetings and other services. We began that transition when we resumed in-person worship in our air-conditioned Fellowship Hall on June 20 while continuing online worship on Zoom.

Step by step we are moving to the day when we can return to worship in our sanctuary. At present we are preparing to return to the sanctuary with a joyous worship service on Sunday, September 26. Our return, however, will be part of a transitional process versus a single day, and it's unlikely to be church-as-usual.

Throughout the summer months, as long as the virus remains under control in our area, we will progressively relax and remove the COVID-19 health and safety protocols we have been observing. We will take these steps while continuing to monitor the incidence of virus infections in our area. If the positivity rate in Montgomery County returns to unsafe levels, we will resume our previous COVID protocols.

We know that the genetic code of the coronavirus is constantly changing. One or more of the mutations are known to be more easily transmitted and result in more severe sickness. Some variants also reduce the effectiveness of antibody therapies and vaccines. Furthermore, University of Pennsylvania microbiologist Frederic Bushman reports that all the new infections in the greater Philadelphia area are now variants. RBC is seeking to make decisions that are informed by scripture, by our best understanding of science and data and by guidance from the Pennsylvania and Montgomery County public health offices. Jesus' command to “love your neighbor as yourself” (Mark 12:28-31) guides us to give particular care for the wellbeing of people who have compromised immune systems as well as the health of the unvaccinated children among us. For this reason, we will continue wearing masks during in-person worship services. We will review this and the remaining protocols after Labor Day.

In the meantime, let us celebrate our week-to-week progress as we grow into a future of effective ministry as a hybrid church. Let our journey reflect this song that we have often sung in worship:

I will never be the same again  
I can never return, I've closed the door  
I will walk the path, I'll run the race  
And I will never be the same again.  
There are higher heights, there are deeper seas  
Whatever you need to do, Lord, do in me....

These words composed by Darlene Zschech express the change that the Holy Spirit brings into our life as well as our commitment to welcome and walk in that change. As we sing the words “I” and “me,” we quite naturally think of this spiritual journey in personal terms. But in Christ Jesus we are a new creation. Not only are we individuals, we are also a family – members of the body of Christ. Therefore, we should also sing the song in the plural:

We will never be the same again  
We can never return, we've closed the door  
We will walk the path, we'll run the race  
And we will never be the same again.  
There are higher heights, there are deeper seas  
Whatever you need to do, Lord, do in us....

And so I close these thoughts with the following reflection: “The Coronavirus has changed many things. Some things will remain the same—the unchanging Truth of the Gospel, of course. ## Spotlight on a Mission Project

Did you ever go to summer camp as a kid? Camp is a great place to learn how to swim, sing around a campfire, ride a horse and make new friends. Our Baptist partners in Cuba and the Dominican Republic offer youth camps where children can have fun while they learn about God's love for them.

There are four camps, two in Cuba and two in the Dominican Republic which can host up to 800 children. The leaders have big dreams about being able to host 1,000 children and youth each year. Their dream will increase the size of the dorms and bath facilities, as well as the kitchens and meeting rooms. They want these camps to operate year-round!



Their big dreams not only include improving the facilities, but to be able to offer scholarships and have program materials that help with the physical and emotional growth of the children as well as their spiritual growth.

# FROM THE GREEN TEAM

## *Solving the Plastics Dilemma*

### *Did You Know...*

That we can all be a part of solving the plastics dilemma. And what is that, exactly? Here are a few facts from the latest issue of “Yes!” magazine to help you understand. 1) The toxins from plastic production and pollution are everywhere – in the air we breathe, the food we eat, in the water we drink, and in our bodies. 2) Mounds of plastic are ending up on the beaches and streets of primarily poor countries around the world. 3) In the last 70 years, more than 8 billion metric tons of plastic have been manufactured. Only 9% of that has been recycled. 4) Plastic’s largest market is packaging, nearly half of which is single use. (141 tons). 5) Textiles are the second largest source of plastic waste, at 42 tons. In fact, clothing is mostly plastic, 64% of the total market. 6) The US did not sign on to a recent international agreement (187 countries did) which limits international trade for plastic scrap in “recycling”. The US still sends plastic scrap to 89 trade partners, mostly in poorer countries. 7) The 10 worst plastic polluters are led by Coca-Cola whose plastic waste is found in 51 countries, followed by PepsiCo (43) and Nestle (37) and Unilever (37). 8) Quote from the Editor of “Yes!”: “We all know by now that we’ve been lied to about the effectiveness of recycling plastic.” But it’s not all bad news, and this publication has several words of encouragement. From Mexico City banning all single use plastics, to 3 communities which have come up with creative ways to repurpose the plastic waste around them, there is hope. In addition, I wanted to share that our church is making its own small contribution in repurposing plastics by collecting and delivering caps and lids to EcoPlastics of Delaware. Thanks to Becky and Kori who delivered 60 pounds last month, that will not end up in a landfill! So, keep those caps and lids coming, to the church or my house (340 Spring Street).

But, back to the solutions. How can we get rid of our throwaway culture? Let’s start with the personal level. We can think very carefully before we buy anything, especially if it is packaged in plastic. Like those apples at Costco. And many products which have layers of unnecessary packaging. Remember the old credo from WWII: Use it up, wear it out, make it do, or do without! This isn’t just for our grandparents. It’s for us too. As we purchase items, let’s think about where it will end up when we are done with it. Sarah Lazarovic (in “Yes!”) created a “Buyerarchy of Needs”. This is to be constructed in a triangle, with the first choice at the bottom: Use What You Have. Borrow. Swap. Thrift. Make. Buy. There are a lot of choices before “Buy”! We are in a culture of too much. Too much food. Too many choices to wear, too much to store, and too many that are unfixable. We can encourage producers to be responsible for their plastic waste, and encourage circular economy, to keep materials recycling forever. This is also called closed-loop manufacturing. These systems repurpose their waste to produce energy. Here’s a good phrase to say before purchasing: “There is no such thing as away.” They are referring, of course, to throwing it away. That item always ends up somewhere—in the ocean or on a beach, in the street of a poorer country which needs the income, or in a landfill wreaking havoc for centuries to come. So keep this phrase in mind when you shop. There is much we can do. Slowing down to first do some research about viable alternatives can save quite a few items from the land of no return. The problem is huge, and we can be a part of the solution on whatever level we are comfortable: personal, community, or global. We can all do something, whether we are part of the Green Team or not. This is a huge dilemma, and needs immediate attention from everyone, whether we want to or not. What will you do next time you shop for an item? Will you be part of the solution?
