
#### **President's Letter**

# **Carla Bremner Steps Down From the WHA Presidency**

In anticipation of the annual meeting in January, the WHA board meeting in December looked back at the eleven years that Carla Bremner served as president. Carla was front and center in 2009 when the City closed the Civic Center and announced their demolition plans. She organized us to make speeches to city council, host public meetings, and



circulate petitions and citizen surveys. Within a year we also incorporated and found grant money to fund a reuse study. We developed budgets to cover needed civic center renovations and proposed program operation. We all breathed a collective sigh of relief when the Nowakowski's bailed us out of this enormous undertaking by negotiating with the city to purchase the building. Then we refocused our energy to support the City's application to gain Federal recognition for the East Third Street Historic District.

Under Carla's leadership we were never stagnant! The Tony Woiak series of 8 lectures per year started in 2012. To entice tourists to explore our town, we designed and printed placemats with maps to distribute to restaurants. We printed historic sites notecards to sell at Christmas bazaars. We recognized businesses that renovated their facades. Trolley tours and house tours became part of Brownstone Days. And when our treasury got too big, we gave grants to three Bayfield Street businesses to update their storefronts.

Carla didn't let Covid-19 slow us down. In 2021 WHA uploaded past history lectures to YouTube, worked with the chamber to produce a new Walking Trail Brochure, and installed a public information kiosk at Wikdahl Park.

While celebrating Carla Bremner's success in December, we recognized that a significant part of her effectiveness is maintaining a board with diverse talents who are willing to share the workload and have fun while making WHA projects reach fruition.

Thanks to some generous donations, we provided financial support to "The Club" for building renovations. We also completed many administrative tasks. In spite of the challenges of 2020, thanks to Zoom and a versatile, talented board, we accomplished much.

# Buildings and Sites Committee Established

Washburn Heritage Association (WHA) announces the formation of a new standing committee. The Buildings and Sites Committee (BSC) advocates the significance of historic buildings and sites by promoting awareness, encouraging improvements and collaborating with relevant property owners and community organizations.

Initially, the BSC will focus on the following areas:

\*collaborating with the various organizations in the community concerned with preserving and safeguarding historic buildings and sites

\*encouraging and recognizing building and site improvements that enhance the community

\*celebrating Preservation Month in May, 2021.

Planning for the Preservation Month celebration has begun. BSC plans to create a poster announcing the event by requesting a Mayoral Proclamation and by identifying all historic buildings and sites with signs or balloons. In addition, they will have a map of the buildings and sites available so residents can drive-by or walk-by the various locations during the month. Additional activities may be added in the next few months as planning for the celebration continues.

WHA believes this committee will assist in enriching the experience of living in our community with its attention on building and site improvements and preservation.

# **WHA Kiosk Project**

The long-awaited kiosk is now finished and installed on the corner of Bayfield Street and 3rd Avenue in Washburn's Wikdal Park. The kiosk was designed in the bungalow style of architecture as reflected in many of the charming homes of our city. It was constructed for the purpose of displaying Washburn's considerable history and current events. It will be of interest to visitors and residents alike.

On September 21st, despite Covid-19, a well-attended dedication ceremony was held in the park. Speakers were Carla Bremner, WHA president, and Karen Novachek, who explained that her son left the Eric R. Novachek fund so the

city could celebrate its life and heritage. Sharon Stewart explained the project process and finally our mayor, Mary Motif, gave the project her congratulations.

The WHA kiosk committee (co-chairs - Ginny Pedersen and Patra Holter with Carla Bremner, Sharon Stewart, Lynn Adams, Jill Lorenz, Karen Novachek and Kitty Wilson ) worked in partnership with the city, the Chamber of Commerce, the Beautification Committee, other organizations, businesses, and many community members to make this project a reality.

The master carpenter was Mike Pedersen with assistant Pete Dagsgard. John Cook provided the lightning rod atop the building as well as overseeing the cement patio. Aaron Irmiter crafted the Brownstone around the base. Two Aldo Leopold benches were built by Jim Pedersen and decorated by Ginny Pedersen. Bob Sanger was the project manager.

The kiosk is about 10 feet tall and 4 feet square. It has cedar siding, exposed eave rafters and decorative supports. There is an ample cement patio that surrounds it and a handicap-accessible ramp from the sidewalk to the kiosk. A large window is on each side of the kiosk. The front window is reserved for the Chamber of Commerce to post current events and notices. The other three win-

dows display aspects of Washburn's history. Currently one window displays the DuPont

Legacy, one is about the Washburn Historical District and the third describes the Washburn Museum.

A committee consisting of Sharon Stewart (script), Lynn Adams (graphics), Ginny Pedersen, Patra Holter and Susan Mackreth (museum research) is working on future display panels so we can interchange them. We have completed panels on logging and sawmills, brownstone

buildings and quarries, the library, Homecoming, and WHA. We are working on The Club (Dupont Civic Center) display and for this one we need some assistance.



We are having a difficult time finding pictures of activities and uses of The Club from the past. If anyone has photos they could lend us it would be

greatly appreciated. The pictures would be

returned unharmed. If you have images to share, please contact any member of the committee.

The WHA Kiosk has been given to the city to celebrate the pride in and love for our town.
