### SMART METER PRESENTATION



At the October meeting, LORNA hosted Gabriel Martinez of PG&E for a SmartMeter presentation. Gabriel spoke briefly about PG&E and customers' bills and rates. He then introduced the technology behind the SmartMeter, and explained that the California PUC voted nearly four years ago to implement SmartMeters statewide in order to create a "smart grid", given brown outs in 2002. Nearly six million meters have already been installed. Several residents asked questions, and Gabriel spoke to some of their health and/or wireless interference concerns. ## **NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH**

LORNA Neighborhood Watch (LORNW) was officially kicked off at the end of September with distribution of a two-page flyer containing an introduction to the Watch, a LORNA membership form, and a copy of the LORNA newsletter. As a result of the flyer and other outreach activities, LORNA membership is continuing to grow. Email alerts are extremely popular and the alerts feed right into the Watch activities. As Watch activities continue to increase. we will all have a better feel for the "pulse" of our neighborhoods. While knowledge of suspicious activities that occur in our neighborhoods may be unsettling, it is far better that it be a "known", rather than an "unknown". Knowledge of these activities provides a heightened awareness for everyone, which is the first step in combating crime.

## **VEHICLE SECURITY TIPS**

- Park in a garage or well-lit area such as the driveway or carport.
- Remove all valuables. An old GPS or iPod might not seem valuable, but could be gold to a thief.
- ► Lock the doors and close all the windows.
- ► Activate the security system.
- ► Stay vigilant.

## COMMUNITY SAFETY AWARENESS TRAINING

Learn how to protect and maintain the safety of the neighborhood and community at Monterey Park's *Community Safety Awareness Training*. Residents learn to evaluate suspicious situations, persons, and threats to personal safety and security, detect and deter criminal activities, access Salinas Police dispatchers, and effectively communicate and report crimes.

The training program is an informative multimedia presentation led by former and current law enforcement personnel. Don't wait for someone else to do something about the problem. Get educated and be an active steward of the community.

Watch Co-Chair and Citizen Patrol Chief, Don Jones:

"Numerous LORNA members attended the MP CP Orientation on Saturday, 11/6/10. This was an excellent presentation and I would highly recommend other LORNA members attend when it comes around again, even if you're not interested in patrolling. MP conducts the 90-minute orientations about every three months. Most of the attendees were LORNA members this time.

The tips and background information that they presented answered many of my own questions. Especially helpful also was the interaction among members (both LORNA and MP) about what they are seeing in the neighborhoods. We all share the same concerns, and sharing different perspectives and experiences was both interesting and helpful.

The MP Civilian Patrol Orientation is an excellent service to the community and I would recommend taking 90 minutes to attend one of the sessions at your next opportunity."

A dedicated contingent of eleven LORNA members attended the November 6<sup>th</sup> presentation and completed the Community Safety Awareness Training.

#### **OPEN LETTER FROM THE WATCH CHAIR**

#### Dear Neighbors,

Happy Holidays everyone! My name is **Cynthia Shaffer** and I am the Chair of the Los Olivos-Riker Neighborhood Watch (LORNW). LORNW is a committee of Los Olivos-Riker Neighborhood Association (LORNA).

Part of my responsibilities is sending out the email alerts. These are emails that go out to the neighbors alerting us about suspicious activity and all things safety/security, including information from the Salinas Police Department (SPD). Additionally, the email list is used to keep the neighbors up to date with all the great things going on with LORNA, our community building effort.

A word about your contact information—it is important we keep your information safe, so I want to tell you who will have access to your information.

- Don Jones is the keeper of the Master Email Alert List (MEAL), which includes over 200 email addresses along with street addresses and phone numbers. He is also the Co-Chair of LORNW and the Citizen Patrol Coordinator.
- Cynthia Shaffer (that's me) sends out the email alerts and announcements.
- ► Kevin Low is the email alert backup and Citizen Patrol Co-Coordinator
- Bill Slezak is the Treasurer. Since Bill handles the money it is important for him to be able to contact folks should he have questions or need to work something out.
- Zone Coordinators (ZCs) and Block Captains (BCs) only have access to the folks who are in their respective zones.

We've divided our neighborhood into 13 zones and each zone has a Zone Coordinator. The ZC keeps the neighbors in the loop with respect to what is going on specifically with that zone and generally what is going on with LORNA and LORNW. Zone Coordinators and Block Captains are also the ones who faithfully deliver the Newsletter to you.

We are the Eyes and Ears (E&E) for the SPD, so I'll often use "E&E" in my closing to remind us to stay alert.

If you witness suspicious activity please call the SPD nonemergency number (758.7321). What is suspicious activity? Anything that doesn't "sit right with you". Considering you are a resident of the neighborhood, you know what looks out of place. The police request us to call in those activities that don't sit right with us. That single phone call may prevent a crime from happening. Since neighbors have been looking out for each other, we've actually averted some potential break-ins! If you witness a crime in progress, call 911.

We do our best to impart information by way of the Newsletter, but the most up-to-date, efficient way to be informed and network is to be a part of the MEAL.

I do hope you consider becoming a LORNA member. We suggest a minimum of \$10 for a household, but you may give any amount you choose. Your return on your investment is much greater than the dues. Besides receiving a membership decal and a discount on the Citizen Patrol vest, your membership helps to cover the costs incurred in stewarding a successful neighborhood group. There are modest costs such as funding neighborhood activities (like the hot dogs that were provided at the Kipling Street Fall Festival) where we have a chance to meet and hang out with each other which is the best way to combat crime. Neighborhood Watch works best when neighbors know each other!

Personally, I believe the membership decal sums it up: **PROUD LORNA MEMBER**. I love being part of this neighborhood!

To give you an idea of what you will receive in your Inbox, below is the most recent alert that went out on Halloween night. Please note I was able to call the neighbor since he had provided his contact information by way of LORNA membership. The Citizen Patroller (CP), the neighbor, and I went out for coffee after the police did a sweep and declared the house safe. It's rewarding that not only are we looking out for each other, but we are also comforting each other after the fact. I checked in with the neighbor the next day and he's feeling OK.

#### Dear Neighbors,

Just called 911. There was an attempted break-in at one of the houses on Riker. One of our Citizen Patrollers heard glass breaking and yelled out, "We're going to call 911!" The CP called me to contact the neighbor. I called the neighbor and the neighbor came home right away. Dispatch says the police will come as soon as they can.

Tonight is a victory for Neighborhood Watch! It is unfortunate our neighbor's house was targeted, but it is fortunate our neighborhood has Neighborhood Watch... especially, Citizen Patrol!

Neighbors, Halloween night is fun, but it's also a night when people are running the streets. BE ESPECIALLY ALERT TONIGHT! Keep your outside lights on. Make sure your motion sensor lights are on. If you hear/see suspicious activity, PLEASE call the non-emergency number: 758.7321. If a crime is in progress (like you hear glass breaking) call 911!
