COMMUNITY GRANT

The Community Foundation for Monterey County (CFMC) announced that 2011 grants are now available for grassroots groups through the annual Neighborhood Grants Program (NGP).

NGP funding supports technical assistance and training to qualified applicants in Monterey County who organize and act cooperatively to improve the well-being, safety, and overall quality of life in their neighborhoods.

Grants range between \$1,000 and \$4,000 per group. In addition to the funding, CFMC staff will be available to assist and facilitate the groups with leadership and project management training and coaching throughout the year.

LORNA representatives recently attended a CFMCsponsored workshop for the purpose of submitting an application for funding. After much spirited deliberation, the LORNA grant team, led by **Cynthia Shaffer**, announced the decision to seek primary funding for an itemized list under the *Neighborhood Watch* umbrella, and the application has been completed and submitted. The team is also considering a grant-matching program, depending on the success of the CFMC/NGP grant process.

Eyes and Ears – The Watch, the Neighborhood, the Police

FROM THE WATCH CHAIR

Dear Neighbors,

I was saddened to read about this because it took place in our very own Zone 13 – The Pointe at Westlake.

Salinas Police Department's Narcotics Unit served a search warrant at 60 Stephanie Drive, Apt. C203, the residence of Roberto Lopez Jr., 33. and Rebeckah Hensley, 34. During the search of the house, detectives found .6 grams of methamphetamine and a methamphetamine smoking pipe in Hensley's purse. Detectives also found a stolen, loaded, Smith and Wesson 9mm pistol in Lopez's truck. Lopez is a known gang member and ex-parolee and convicted felon. He was booked into Monterey County Jail for being a gang member and convicted felon in possession of a firearm, possession of a stolen firearm, and possession of a loaded concealed firearm in a vehicle. Hensley was booked in the Monterey County Jail for possession of methamphetamine and a smoking pipe.

To some, Neighborhood Watch is a joke. I am willing to bet, however, that if I'm your next door neighbor and a moving truck pulls up to your house in the middle of the day, you would want me to call in the suspicious activity to the police.

How do I know you're not moving? Because we took a little time to meet at a Neighborhood Watch gathering to learn about each other so we're able to identify what's out of place with respect to what our neighborhood considers acceptable activity.

During the first meeting of the Los Olivos-Riker Neighborhood Watch in March 2010, we were informed that there had been a shooting in east Salinas. The next day's headlines revealed a sixyear-old boy had been shot and killed, dramatically reminding me that what we were attempting to do was not a waste of time or a joke. Rewind to 2009 when a rash of burglaries caused residents to form the *Monterey Park Neighborhood Watch*. Rewind further to 2007, when a person dying on the street caused residents in east Salinas to form the *Eagle Drive and Bison Way Neighborhood Association*. Fast forward to today, as LORNA and its Neighborhood Watch continue to grow and evolve as we celebrate our first anniversary.

The neighborhood-oriented policing philosophy of Salinas Police Chief **Louis Fetherolf** includes fixing the responsibility for crime and problem-solving as a shared responsibility between police and community members. Neighborhood Watch fits right in with the Chief's philosophy.

Removing the divide between the police and the people results in lower crime in the neighborhoods that choose to be deliberate about partnering with the police. Neighborhood Watch is the change agent in how, together, we build a safe, secure, and viable neighborhood.
