Did you know that there are only 23 Salinas firefighters on duty at any one time? In the event of an earthquake or other catastrophe,

they will be kept busy and it might not be several days until we receive additional help.

That is where **Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)** training comes in. Salinas Fire
Department is training citizens to be able to step up
and fill this void during a disaster. You will learn
disaster preparedness, when to shut off utilities,
search and rescue, how to fight small fires,
and medical triage and treatment.

This training can save your life, your family, and your neighbors. Don't think that someone else will do the job for you. In our fire response area, roughly south of Market between Davis Road and Main Street, we have only **one** person trained!

Sign up for this fun and informative training. People with a medical background and HAM radio operators are needed. Don't think you're not the right age! Half of the last class was composed of retired people.

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The Watch — Eyes and Ears of the Neighborhood



CAR TAGGING Submitted by Don Jones

I recently received a forwarded email that originated from a resident of the Maple Park neighborhood. The subject matter, however, is a concern for all of us. The message included a photo of a car that was tagged with graffiti. This incident represents a serious escalation of the tagging problem in the city of Salinas.

Graffiti tags on cars can be difficult to remove without damaging the paint, especially if the car doesn't have a good wax coating. It's important to remove graffiti quickly before it becomes baked-on by the sun. After a tag bakes on, it becomes harder to remove. Goof Off may remove the tag, but try it on a small area first to make sure it doesn't damage the paint. It might be wise to call a paint store for advice before trying to remove a tag from your car.

The email represented another red flag for LORNA residents to be vigilant about suspicious people in our neighborhoods. Tagging may be done in early morning hours or late in the evening when it's harder for us to observe the taggers. Be wary of young kids with backpacks riding on skateboards.

This is just another example of the benefit of video cameras in the neighborhood.

As many of you on the LORNA email alert list may have noticed, the number of email alerts has significantly declined over the last several months. After our LORNA group got rolling around this time last year, the number of LORNA alerts was alarming. I believe that due to the dedication of our LORNA members, the word has gotten out that we are watching the neighborhood, to counter the criminals who are watching us.

That said, we've had some suspicious truck sightings and activity in the neighborhoods, so please remain vigilant in watching out for our fellow neighbors and for suspicious activity. We had one occurrence of loud music that the SPD responded to and resolved within about ten minutes. We may not get that guick response every time due to short staffing in the PD. However, we have gone to great lengths to develop a cordial relationship with the SPD, and I think it's paying off.

REFLECTIVE K-9 VESTS



The Watch is now taking orders for LORNA reflective K-9 Vests that match our own vests. They come in various sizes, depending upon the dog measurements, and are beautifully embroidered with our LORNA logo.

Cost is \$30 for LORNA members, or \$40 for non-LORNA members, which also buys you a LORNA membership. We are accumulating orders until we reach a price-break point, and we've also opened it up to the Monterey Park Association. If we order 20 vests by the September 12th deadline, you may qualify for a \$3 discount.

TAGGING in the HOOD

There has been a disquieting flurry of tagging activity here on the south side. Many of the tags we have seen before, but there are always new perpetrators striving to make their marks. Through our e-alerts and LORNA meetings, we have become familiar with graffiti and often recognize the tagging.

Rapid reporting and removal is essential to deterring these vandals. If you see graffiti, call Republic Services on their hotline at 751.5493 for removal. It is especially helpful to have pictures of the tagging.

If you see tagging in process, call 911. If you observe suspicious activity, call the Salinas PD non-emergency number at 758.7321. You don't have to give your name, and remember, first priority is to stay safe.

LORNA residents have increasingly been taking prompt action to report and remove tagging in and around our neighborhood. One of our neighbors recently removed eight tags along two streets within 48 hours of the first report.

By working together with city services and maintaining constant surveillance, we can keep our neighborhood free of this disgraceful graffiti, and take pride in ownership that fuels our motivation to increase safety and security and improve our quality of life.

LORNA email alerts prompt me to continue to be ever so vigilant around my home and neighborhood. An attempted break-in on a recent Monday morning with the homeowners asleep in their home was very alarming. Thankfully, the residents were unharmed.

By attending our monthly LORNA meetings, I've learned of our neighbors' plights. A neighbor who attended a recent meeting shared with me that the family had experienced their home being egged and one of their new windows shot with a BB gun. I now often drive past this home to help with the **Eyes and Ears**.

One Saturday when I was out working in my front yard, I was able to visit with several neighbors on my street. One told me that his home has been egged in the past, and he has experienced other incidents. He also shared his concern about illegal fireworks that I was able to bring up at the next LORNA meeting.

I have also noticed a long-time pattern of casings, reports of break-ins, and other unwanted activities that occur on Mondays, the days that we all have our trash, yard waste, and recycle bins out on the streets for Republic/BFI to pick up. It is good to be even more vigilant on those days.

It's important to talk with our neighbors and listen to their concerns, to get information that may not be shared at our monthly meetings or social gatherings. We need to be more attentive to LORNA residents who are quieter than others.

The e-alerts and *From the Fields* newsletter are great. There are lots of people who don't use the computer and rely on neighbors and the newsletter to find out what's going on in our neighborhood.

A majority of us feel very safe and blessed to be living here. Our neighbors are wonderful, we all watch out for each other, and so much kindness and care is expressed in so many ways. Let's all continue to be vigilant and keep our homes secure from potential troublemakers.

On the days that **PG&E** is scheduled to read the meters, some of our neighbors have to leave their side gates unlocked. To tell if the meter reader has been to your home, place a piece of painter's tape on the meter. When the meter reader comes, he/she will remove it, you will know that PG&E has come by, and you can then lock the gate.

You can go to www.pge.com and print out the current year's meter reading schedule. Here are the dates that PG&E meter readers will come into our neighborhood, through November:

August 25 th	October 25 th
September 26 th	November 23 rd

Normally, PG&E will come on the scheduled days, but there have been times when the meter reader has come the day after the scheduled day. The painter's tape is also very helpful when this occurs.

If you are not ready for the SmartMeter®, PG&E will honor your requests. Call PG&E at 1.877.743.7378 to be added to the SmartMeter® delayed installation list and place a note on your meter that reads, "Please, no SmartMeters".

STOLEN POTS

A flower pot thief has been spotted in Maple Park. Fortunately, an alert resident captured images on a surveillance camera of a man stealing big ceramic pots from the front yard. The video was provided to Salinas PD and a police report was filed. A second resident in that area also reported stolen pots. **Eyes and Ears!**

PARKING CONCERNS

A trusty neighbor has reported that, in recent months, people are parking their cars in the same locations, sometimes overnight or for the weekend, and are later dropped off to retrieve their vehicles.

Often, one or more young women are being dropped off by one or more men of a similar age. They appear to be clean and well-dressed, and never seem to enter a nearby house or condo. On occasion, they have also been seen with small pieces of luggage.

Perception is not always reality. However, changes in the activities in the neighborhood bring a heightened concern and awareness, and remind us that we are the **Eyes and Ears** for the police. It's up to all of us to continue to take notice, express our concerns, and share the benefits of a safe neighborhood.
