Potato Chip Cookies Contributed by Barb Pybas

Cream together 2 cubes butter, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup sugar, and 1 teaspoon vanilla. Add 2 cups flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup chopped walnuts, and 1 cup crushed potato chips.

Put the entire bag of chips in a large Ziplok bag, leave an inch or so opened, and keep running the rolling pin over and over the bag. Shake the chips around and keep repeating. This should give you about 3 cups of crushed chips, enough for 3 batches of cookies. Keep the unused crushed chips in the freezer.

Form into small balls, then press with the flat bottom of a glass that has been dipped in sugar. Bake at 350 degrees for 14-15 minutes.

There are a million things I could be doing right now, but writing this letter is the one thing I am compelled to do this very minute. In June, my classmates and I graduated from Salinas Police Department's **Community Academy**. We spent 12 consecutive Wednesdays (6 pm – 9pm, and sometimes even later) with Salinas' finest, and it's my realization there's nothing I can ever do to adequately express my gratitude to and admiration for the men and women who make Salinas PD one of the nation's most excellent police forces. I'm not exaggerating. I'm not embellishing. I'm not kidding. I'm simply stating God's honest truth.

Making you believe me is not my mission. My mission is to challenge you -- whatever your station in life -- so you may make your own informed decision which spurs you on to be the kind of neighbor you'd want if you lived next door to yourself.

Enroll in the next Community Academy, so you may receive a sliver of appreciation for what our officers contend with to protect and serve this beloved city called Salinas. I challenge you to *think for yourself* (challenge those stereotypes and preconceived notions) and then be the same after taking this course. You can't be the same.

Notice I wrote, "appreciation" and not "understanding". Seriously, who fully understands the heart and mind of another? Understanding each other is overrated and not necessary for us to look out for each other and give a damn about our beloved city.

Frankly, it's not about us walking a mile in each other's shoes. It's about us walking our best *in our own shoes*.

I can't walk in SPD's boots. What I can do is shout from the mountain tops what I've learned and share SPD's most important need: for us to be good witnesses

Call in suspicious behavior (758.7321), to help prevent crime) and cooperate when we've seen a crime in progress. I wish the police could solve crimes with a magic wand, but wishing it won't make it so. What makes it so is us telling the police what we saw. 'Cause whether we're from the South side or East side, it's not about "understanding", it's about appreciating our common desire to be safe and secure and what we do to make that happen while we all live and dream in the best city this side of the Salinas River.

While we enjoy time with our friends, go to work, and raise our families, (all 155,000+ of us) there are some 200 folks with SPD who do the same except their work involves placing themselves in harm's way to fight the good fight. I cannot begin to express how proud I am of and what respect I have for Salinas' finest. My confidence in Salinas PD is unwavering and justified. I challenge you to prove me wrong.

On August 7th, LORNA shared a booth with Eagle-Bison Neighborhood Association and the Salinas Neighborhood Council at the National Night Out event in Salinas. National Night Out is held in over 15,000 communities across the country in an effort to strengthen the relationship between law enforcement and community members. Law enforcement units and non-profit organizations all had booths at the event, and Salinas PD and the Salinas Fire Department had several of their vehicles present.

An estimated 1,500 people attended the event. LORNA volunteers educated attendees on the benefit of a neighborhood watch and provided information on how one could start a neighborhood watch program in their area.
