LORNAS 🤎 TREE UPDATE

Every year our neighborhood gets prettier and more charming with new trees being planted. They add a sense of tranquility and increase our property values too! **PROPER CARE IS IMPORTANT** to ensure the trees are healthy and their roots grow deep. This care is required for the young trees recently planted (and those planted in the last few years):

- WATER 2xs a week, low flow from a hose for 20 minutes
- REMOVE all grass and weeds around the base of the trunk - this ensures the tree gets the water it needs vs the grass and weeds

Trees add so much beauty to our neighborhood and I appreciate ya'll taking good care of them.



WATER WISE TIPS

CALIFORNIA CONTINUES TO BE IN DROUGHT - Here are some easy ways to conserve precious and expensive WATER in your garden:

Water Lawns Morning or Evening, NOT in the middle of the day when it's hottest and most of the water evaporates and also tends to burn the grass.

MOW YOUR LAWN HIGH

How you mow has a huge impact on how thirsty your lawn is. Mowing turf high encourages roots to sink deep, which means the lawn won't need watering as often. A sharp mower blade cuts grass cleanly, which reduces water loss per grass blade. (continue on next page)







WATER POTS IN THE AFTERNOON

Water plants at the right time of day: inground plantings in the morning and containers in the afternoon. Research has shown that watering container gardens late in the day leads to healthier plants.



REPLACE OR REDUCE LAWN

Replace part of a water-guzzling lawn with outdoor living and dining rooms. Modern building materials make it possible to design a deck that fits into the tightest spaces.

ADD MULCH

Cover bare soil with mulch to help slow water evaporation. A mulch layer that's 2 to 3 inches deep helps retain soil moisture and reduce weed sprouting.



CONSIDER PERMEABLE PAVERS

Choose water-permeable building materials for hardscape surfaces including driveways, walks and patios. Permeable pavers allow water to percolate through the surface, which reduces rainwater runoff.

MAKE YOUR OWN COMPOST

Compost is one of the best additives to soil because it helps to retain water in sandy soils and improve drainage in clay soils. Making compost is easy, and adding compost to soil fosters a healthy soil-food web.



SELECT LOW WATER USE PLANTS

Swap water guzzling plants for low water use beauties. Many drought tolerant plants feature leaves that are silver, spiny or succulent (thick) in nature. You can find a wide variety of lovely low water use plants for our area at a local nursery.





CONTROLLING LITTER & DEBRIS IN SALINAS

With COVID-19 and a growing homeless population in Salinas, litter and debris have become a major issue. It is with great gratitude that our neighborhood has had the help of several volunteers to help pitch in and lead efforts to clean litter and dumping. Hot spots include behind the apartments on Stephanie Drive and along the fields of Luther Way. Not to mention Kipling St.

Special recognition goes to efforts organized by Ursula, Cheri, Diane and others. The Farm Bureau, Republic Services and the City of Salinas have been incredibly helpful. It is important that issues get reported right away. The Salinas Connect App is the best way to report issues. You can also report issues on the City website at www.cityofsalinas.org. The rest of Salinas is not immune to litter and in January of this year, Mayor Kimbley Craig commissioned a special Litter and Debris Task Force that includes City Councilmembers Osornio, Gonzales and McShane. We will continue to work hard to make sure Salinas gets cleaned up and stays that way.

DOWNTOWN SALINAS GLOWS

It is with great excitement that major improvements to Downtown Salinas were dedicated May 20th. More than \$10 million was spent on safety, infrastructure and beautification. City Council first prioritized downtown for upgrades in 2014 and ever since additional investment has followed. Special incentives and ordinances has also been put in place to prioritize housing, redevelopment and historic preservation, Cal Water and PG&E made improvements to underground utilities as well. Special *super high speed* internet was added as part of a regional project linking South Salinas to East Salinas. The capstone to all of the improvements was the "Salinas" archway funded by the Rotary Club of Salinas. The club fundraised for more than seven years to add the iconic archway. While the project is on a priority list, lack of funding has not made construction possible. Efforts on the part of LORNA leadership have helped to get funding in place for the City's 2021-2022 year. 
DOWNTOWN BOOKS
