ANGST, ADORATION, APTITUDE, ALLOWANCES, ATTENDING, APPETITE, AMBITIONS, ARTISTIC.

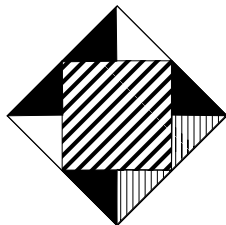
MEANINGFUL, METICULOUSNESS, MAKERS, MEASURING, MASTERS, MATURE, MANY-SIDED, MODEST.

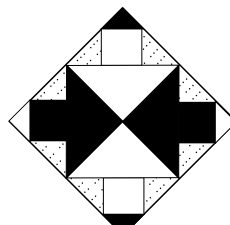

March Fabric Exchange

That Fabric is So Ugly.....

That's right, the theme for our March fabric exchange is ugly fabric.

Actually, combined with a background fabric, ugly scrappy quilts can be beautiful. Bonnie Hunter loves ugly fabrics and has lots of free patterns on her website, quiltville.com. Or strip sew some 4 or 9 patches and combine with a neutral block of the same size, or a snowballed block. Here are some other suggestions for using "ugly" fabrics:

- The smaller you cut them the better they look!
- Make them into a scrap quilt by adding one neutral color.
- Ugly fabrics add interest in scrap quilts. Combined with other fabrics you won't even see them.
- Use ugly fabrics for trial blocks.
- Get rid of that fabric at a fabric exchange!

Remember, ugly is in the eye of the beholder. What one considers ugly is beautiful to another.

Here are the people who signed up for our Ugly Fabric Exchange of 10 1/2" squares: **Tina Rink, Loreen Garrison, Karen Sayles, Linda Ibbs, Rosemary Spatafora, Cindy May.**

There are 6 people signed up so each person will bring twelve 10-1/2" squares. A total of one yard of fabric will be needed.

Looking ahead - our April exchange will be Civil War fabrics. Sign up at the March meeting.

2018 Mystery Quilt – CLUE #3

4. Make 68 rectangle units. Join 2" strips of #2 light and #3 light to make six strip sets. Press seams toward darker fabric. Cut the strip sets into 3-1/2" units (Figure 2, below).

After sewing and pressing the triangle and rectangle units, make sure they measure 3-1/2" before joining them into blocks. Remake any that are significantly smaller or trim any that are larger than 3-1/2".

5. Assemble 17 trellis blocks as shown in the block assembly diagram, being careful to orient the units as shown (Figure 3, below).

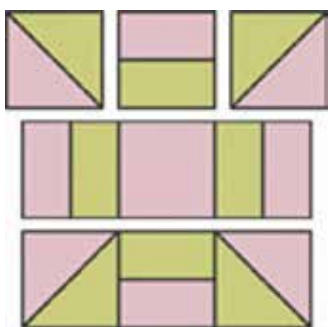

Snips Whistlestop - 3 versions

submitted by Jan Recinos

Materials: Base fabric, heavy paper, decorative paper, stretched canvas, fabric marker, snippets of fabric (sorted by color), thread cuttings, yarns, words cut from fabric or made from self-edge letters.

Embellishments: sequins, glitter, fabric paint, ribbons, angelina fibers, ric-rack,

Adhesives: Modge-Podge, Water soluble Sulky Paint Brush or stick to move fabric into place

ON CANVAS OR PAPER (STIFF SURFACE):

BLUE SNOW, BLUE HOUSE, RED HEARTS

1. draw design on base.
(painting canvas or watercolor paper)
2. Apply modge podge to the first part of the design.
3. Put first color on the wet surface. Move it around with brush or stick getting the fabric wet.
4. Add more modge Podge over the snips if needed. Stick on the embellishments/glitter.
5. Allow 24 hours to dry.
6. Refine with more fabric, paint or embellishments.

ALL FABRIC - SEWN HEARTS

Covered with Tulle - do not iron, it will melt

1. draw design on muslin or plain fabric
2. place snippets on fabric
3. embellish with threads, fibers, yarns, etc.
4. cover the design with tulle
5. baste around edges to contain the pieces
6. sew across the top with free motion foot, trying to catch all the elements
7. add decorative stitches, letters, use metallic threads
8. add beads, embroidery, ric-rack etc.
9. cut out design
10. applique to a backing fabric for hanging
11. for wallhangings that will never be washed, no worries.
But ribbons and tulle can bleed if washed or melt if ironed.

WITH WATER SOLUBLE SULKY - RED HEART

1. draw design on muslin or plain fabric
2. place snippets on fabric
3. embellish with threads, fibers, etc.
4. cover design with water soluble Sulky
5. sew over the top to catch the elements
6. add decorative stitches, letters, use metallic thread
7. follow Sulky instructions, put piece in water to dissolve the Sulky
8. when dry, add further decorative stitches

**CAMEO Guild Meeting Minutes
February 15, 2018
Clawson United Methodist Church**

Meeting called to order by President Cindy May at 7:02. After the Pledge of Allegiance, Cindy opened with a welcome.

An addendum to January minutes was made to include Ann Bonelli as Recording Secretary on the Executive Board as Linda Ibbs stepped down for personal reasons. Linda Watkins moved to accept. Kathy Wilson seconded, and the motion passed unanimously. Minutes were approved.

Sharon Cratsenburg, VP Facilitator, introduced the Whistle Stop with presenters Linda Watkins, Jan Recinos, Cindy May, and Linda Wallace. Reminder made of quilt appraiser Doris Kooistra for next month. Sign up at the front table for appointments.

Pat Baldauf, VP Treasurer, made a report of the guild's financial accounts and balances. Report was accepted by all.

Susan Larson, VP Membership, reported 28 members in attendance with 2 guests. Current membership stands at 54.

At 7:10, Whistle Stop began. Cindy May presented flower pounding. Linda Wallace presented a ruler to square up triangles, the Slidelock ruler, and the Once and Done ruler. Jan Recinos presented Snip Its, and Linda Watkins presented a quilted bag made from 2 ½ inch strips.

At 8:10, a break for refreshments.

Meeting resumed at 8:30 for Committee Reports.

Karla Sutton reminded members of Charity Day, February 17. Doors open at 9:00. Sew until 3:00.

Pat Baldauf reported for Retreat Committee. Retreat to be held April 27-29 at the Lions Bear Camp. Cost is \$100 for members, \$110 for non-members, with \$18 extra for those arriving early on Thursday, April 26. Attendees need to sign up by March, and pay by April. Forms are available at the table and on website. Retreat is open to all with a 40 person maximum.

Linda Watkins reported 14 people taking Quilting with Confidence. The next meeting is Monday, February 19, 6:30 at JoAnn's on John R. No sewing machines, just pen and paper for notes.

Cindy May reported for Tina Rink that the Mystery Quilt moves on with the next clue available at the table and in the next Silhouette.

Rosemary Spatafora reported 6 people signed up for the Ugly Fabric 10" Squares Exchange next month.

Theresa Neilson has 5 members involved in the Round Robin.

Jan Recinos from Research & Information Committee offered dates to go to MSU to view the Quilt Museum. A June 2 date was agreed upon. Sign up needs to be between 15-20 people. There will be a \$15 fee.

Linda Wallace reported for Charity. Donations will be accepted the next two months for the Layette Program. CAMEO supports the Clawson Methodist Church Layette Program by providing items for newborns such as diapers, burp rags, quilts, etc. They will be given in April.

**CAMEO Board Meeting Minutes
February 22, 2018**

Meeting called to order at 7:10 by President Cindy May. Meeting held at the home of Karla Sutton. Present were Laurie Johnson, Cindy May, Pat Baldauf, Sharon Cratsenburg, Kathy Wilson, Susan Larson, Loreen Garrison, and Karla Sutton. Absent were Cheryl Cawley, Barb Lusk, and Ann Bonelli.

Treasurer's report: Pat Baldauf reported total receipts for retreat of \$1521.

Membership report: An update on Barb Eakin's and Jackie Considine's membership status requested. Extra membership books to be given to Darlene Baer, Barb Eakin, and possibly Karen Hoskins. Current membership stands at 54.

VP Facilitator's report: Sharon Cratsenburg reported Doris Kooistra, our speaker for March, will have a very interactive lecture. There are six people scheduled to have seven quilts appraised on Friday, March 16. The contract for our April speaker, Linda Thieffold, has not yet been returned. May's presenter, Karen Turkes, has a pattern for her Saturday workshop. Cost for members is \$55 and participants should bring their own fabric.

Retreat Committee report: Janeen Sharp has received payment for 18 people signed up. Massages will be available at the retreat on Saturday and into Sunday, if needed. Will set up Friday and take reservations.

Charity Day: Attendance was 25 people. 30 quilts were completed, 16 to be given to Miracle Quilts, and 14 to the Layette Program for the church. At least eight pillowcases were completed. Charity Committee members will demonstrate how to put on a binding during the next Open Sew, so that everyone's work is uniform.

Quilting with Confidence: Linda Watkins is leading the group with Laurie Johnson and Cindy May as teachers. There are 14 people in the class. Meetings are every two weeks, with Monday meetings at Needleworks in Birmingham and Tuesday meetings at JoAnn's. The group will also meet at the church occasionally for hands-on sewing.

Research and Information: Jan Recinos is coordinating a field trip to the Quilt Museum at MSU on June 2. Sign up at the March Guild meeting. Laurie Johnson moved to reimburse participants \$10 toward the ticket price of \$15. Karla Sutton seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

Cindy May received information from the **Oakland County Quilt Guild** which is having a quilt show on April 6 and 7 in Lake Orion. March 14 is the deadline to put an ad in their Quilt Show program. Board unanimously agreed to purchase a half page ad for \$60. Laurie Johnson will create the ad with our logo prominently displayed and Pat Baldauf wrote a check.

Stitching at the Well in Bay City is sponsoring the **Quilters Showcase Quilt Show** in Bay City on September 21 and 22. They offered our guild the opportunity to have a booth to sell homemade items and to display our quilts for a set monetary payment. More information regarding amount of work involved and the value of the booth is required before a decision is made.

Former CAMEO member **Lori Miller** is featured in the current edition (January/February) of AQ magazine. Lori will be a speaker next year at the guild.

Meeting was adjourned at 8:11.

The next board meeting is 7pm, March 22 at the home of Pat Baldauf.
