CAMEO 2018 CHALLENGE QUILT

Theme: CAMEO Revelations - make a guilt featuring a cameo! Cost: None to participants.

- Fabric: Participant's choice. Use your own fabric, new or from stash. The guild will not be supplying any fabric.
- Timeline: A sign up sheet will be available at the April, 2018 guild meeting. Quilts are to be brought early to the May guild meeting. Voting will be by the members present at the May, 2018 meeting.
- Rules: the cameo (of any shape, not our Guild logo) may be pieced, appliquéd or a combination; embroidery and/or embellishments may be added. Quilt must have a cameo made from fabric or embroidery; attaching a cameo does not meet criteria. The finished quilt must be at least 12" x 12" and may not exceed 144" around the perimeter. It may be any shape. Quilts will be measured to determine eligibility for prizes. Finished quilt should be completed, quilted, bound and labeled. Use your original design; using someone else's pattern defeats the purpose of a challenge. Challenge committee members are not excluded from participation.
- Prizes: To be determined You are guaranteed the satisfaction of challanging yourself!

Full disclosure - when I saw the Civil War theme for this month's Fabric Exchange I said, "No way, uh - uh, not me." I was completely happy to let this fabric exchange go by without even thinking about signing up.

My aversion to Civil War fabrics came from my belief that these fabrics were dark, dull, plain, and lifeless. But then I started reading about Civil War fabrics and what prints and colors fit into this category. I took a closer look at Cindy May's beautiful quilts with the deep, rich colors and remembered the wonderful President's Quilt that we made for Cindy last year.

My reading led me to discover that Civil War fabric is a lot more complex and exciting than I originally thought. A color palette described as brown, red, blue, purple and gold color families ranging from light to dark in each color-way does sound pretty boring, until you consider the names of some of the colors... Indigo blue, shades of red, dull lavenders, double pinks, madder, chrome yellow, mourning grays, cadet blues, fugitive purples, burgundy, dark chocolate and cocoa, with accents of cheddar, cinnamon pinks and poison greens. Hey, I even realized that I have some cheddar and poison green that's been sitting in my stash since the Civil War.

Civil War fabric included fabrics associated with men's clothing, such as stripes, plaids, checks, polka dots, shirting prints, textured fabrics and other geometric shapes and prints. Interesting backgrounds featured vines, tiny prints in deep hues, dots, squiggles, and mottled colors. Madder-style prints, stripes and paisley were also popular in Civil War fabrics.

RESEARCH AND INFORMATION COMMITTEE #1 Detroit Discoveries-Collections and Collectors by Jan Recinos

Last January, an announcement popped up on my Facebook page about a Button Swap. Like most of you, I have a tin of buttons which I have had forever. My mother's button basket is still in her closet, too. I was curious to see what was so special about buttons that would merit a swap. So, I went down to the Fisher Building lobby, (another attraction for me), and there the Michigan Button Society, www.michiganbuttonsociety.org, was at 10 tables educating people about their button collections. Most of their displays were of cardboard and each was united by a theme, material or color. There were militaria, service buttons, glass, horn and shell beads. The buttons were not for sale, but I had taken my box of buttons and I swapped some of mine for small sets of boot buttons, blue glass trimmed in gold and black glass buttons. If you go to their website or find them on Facebook, look at the winning trays from their competitions. They are eye-opening. Maybe YOU could display your best buttons!

In March, eight CAMEO members met at the Troy Historical Society to hear speaker, Ryan Hynd, who has a collection of another kind. His collection of cameos were displayed in glass cases and were made of various materials from shell and coral, to agate and carnelian, ranging in color from white to deep peach. Many were busts of men and women, but there were also buildings, vistas and full body carvings. He explained that the definition of a cameo is a raised image on a background. He explained how they may be made by shaving down on one piece of shell to reveal an image, or that acid is used to remove layers to make cameos of agate or stone. His interest has led him to purchase many cameos online and to seek them wherever he goes. He recommended caution if purchasing online. Many people in the large audience had brought their cameos to share with him and he graciously evaluated them by shining a flashlight through them to check for stress cracks or breaks, or to evaluate their age and uniqueness. Much like quilts or buttons, they are more valuable if they are older, in good condition and rare. He recommended caring for them by not jumbling them with other jewelry, subjecting them to extreme temperatures changes, cleaning them by soaking them in warm water, and brushing them lightly with mineral oil every 6 months. It would be interesting to see the collection our Guild could display of CAMEOS!

Lastly, there is a gem in the heart of Northville, called the Detroit Lace Museum. It is only open Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, but the owner, Mary Salmon, has collected lace (and ephemera) all her life and this new museum is the result of her efforts. There are displays of the use of lace in this shop in Northville Square at 133 W. Main St., but everything is for sale. There are nightshirts and curtains and doilies. The bureau in the back room is full of buttons and rick rack. Bring cash or your checkbook. The credit card machine doesn't always work. Crazy quilters could get lost in this museum. They have a Facebook page and the website is www.thelacemuseumllc.com.

RESEARCH AND INFORMATION COMMITTEE #2 Patronize Your Local Copy Center - Laminate Your "Quilt Helps" By Donna Brokenshire

Listen up. This probably refers to the ladies more than the men, however, it could make things easier if they need a quick referral once in a while.

I look for the easiest way to remember some things ... such as what are some specific things to do in making a quilt. Actually, it is in finishing that quilt that I occasionally need a memory boost.

I have many quilt books and quilt magazines that have all the information I need. However, going over to my local copier place, like Kinko's, I made six hard-laminated pages 8 ½ x 11 to make my stress level much lower and my time much shorter and easier. With a hole on top of these pages I can hang or keep them together on the shelf. Kinko's has been my friend for many years!!

This is a list of these handy "Quilt Helps" that puts me on course for quilting. I have found articles, videos, and have cut-and-pasted articles and notes to put together my own little reference cards....oh, so handy, and there all the time for me. I am open to sharing with anyone that asks. These cards are:

<u>PERFECT BINDING CARD</u>. Fons and Porter's Purchased already laminated with a hole for hanging, it includes directions and illustrations for Binding Basics, mitering corners, making continuous bias, and "Liz's Lumpless Finish", etc. And most helpful – this card shows how to finish the ends together of the binding to finish the quilt.

<u>QUILTER'S TERMINOLOGY</u>. Here is my cut-and-paste version for refreshing my quilting skills. Such subjects as Fabric Grain Lines...(woven fabric has two straight grain lines), cutting strips - Laying a border - Placing Borders – How to "Miter" the corners – Layering, making the Sandwich - Machine Quilted items - Even Feed Foot-Needles-Thread-Stitch Length, Quilt Position, and Hand Position - ("do not pull the quilt as you stitch")..., and Binding Basics of cutting binding 2, 2 ¼, 2 ½", etc., etc. Suggestions are from Heavens Above book.

<u>QUILT BACKING / MEASURING-CUTTING-SEWING</u> These are basic details that are always helpful when one is a multi-tasker like me and needs a step or two: Width of fabric, fabric shifting, etc., Quilt Backing, Finishing, Binding. Types of quilting, and Marking quilting lines with what aids to help. Suggestions came from Quilts of Thimble Creek, CA and The Rabbit Factory.

<u>HOW TO MAKE A HANGING SLEEVE</u> by Karen Blocher, This is a great visual aid for me with drawings and guidelines, and showing the extra little pleat to make quilts hang better. <u>HANGING A QUILT – MAKING AND ADDING A SLEEVE</u> AQS quilt show directions from Bonnie Browning's video transcript Jan. 2011

CHATELAINE My directions to make that I don't want to lose, and on the back is my article on chatelaines.

<u>PACKING LIST FOR RETREAT WEEKENDS & WORKSHOP ESSENTIALS</u> All the things one would need, and not necessarily need except for "comfort". This also has a space for filling in the blank for when leaving and arriving, when to be out of the lodgings, and when leaving and arriving home. Of course it leaves space for the meal stop both ways. And, all the things you would need, and again not necessarily need but want for workshops and retreats of a "more" basic sewing supply list. I can copy this on my computer and use any time. In fact, I refer to it when I go on trips to cross-off or to pack.



2018 Mystery Quilt - Clue #4



Template and rotary-cutting instructions (Cut from selvage to selvage.)

Fabric Description	
#2 Lt. pink	4 - 3½" strips, cut into 72 template A patches
#4 Medium 1	4 - 3 ⁷ / ₈ " strips, cut into 36 - 3 ⁷ / ₈ " squares 5 - 2 ³ / ₈ " strips,
	cut into 72 - 2¾" squares 5 - 3¾" strips,
	cut into 144 template B & Br patches
(See step 1 for inst	ructions.)
#5 Medium 2 4 - 2"	strips, cut into 36 - 2" squares
	(Set aside remaining two strips for four-patch units.)
#6 Dark	4 - 2" strips, cut into 36 - 2" squares
	(Set aside remaining two stips for four-patch units.)


So, bake some scones to enjoy as you sew your Blossom blocks, then relax for a while in anticipation of your own English Enchantment quilt.

1. Cut the pieces as listed in the Blossom block template and rotary-cutting instructions table. For template B, place two 3-3/4" strips right sides together and cut 36 B patches, rotating the template as shown. Repeat with the remaining strips for a total of 72 B and 72 Br patches (fig. 1).



Use template B & Br to trim the corners.

Meeting called to order at 7.05 by President Cindy May. Meeting was held at the home of Pat Baldauf. All Board Members were present.

Nominations & Elections Committee. Members are Sandy Peiss, Donna Brokenshire, Jan Recinos and Karen Sayles. They will meet on Thursday and then begin making phone calls to solicit volunteers. Discussed how difficult it is to get people willing to run for offices and how burned out others are getting. The number of officers and committees have been reduced over the last two years to try to address this problem. We must have a full slate of officers in order for the club to exist. Of those on the Board, only Cindy is not eligible for an office.

Sharon Cratsenburg, Programs ...Donna Kooistra was very well received. It was suggested that we ask members who had her appraise their quilts to bring them to the meeting so the membership could see how close they could get to her appraised value. 


