#### **Mennonite Friendship Bread**

#### Batter:

- 1 C butter softened
- 2 C. sugar
- 2 eggs
- 2 C. buttermilk
- 4 C. flour

2 teas. Baking soda

#### Cinnamon/sugar mixture:

2/3 C. sugar 2 teas. Cinnamon

#### Instructions:

Cream butter, sugar, eggs.

Add milk, flour, baking soda.

Put 1/4 of batter into each of two greased and floured loaf pans.

Sprinkle with half of cinnamon sugar mix.

Repeat with remaining batter and sugar.

Swirl with knife.

**Optional:** 

Thinly slice a peeled and cored baking apple. Layer on top of batter and sprinkle with sugar mix.

Bake 45-50 min in 350 degree oven.

#### Pat Blair's Spicy Pumpkin Bread

#### submitted by Barb Lusk

4 eggs

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 3 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 teaspoon ground cloves
- 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cups cooking oil
- 1 16 oz. can solid pack pumpkin
- <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup nuts [optional]
- 1 cup seedless raisins [optional]

In large mixing bowl beat eggs until light and fluffy. Add sugar, cooking oil and pumpkin; mix well. Sift together flour, baking powder, soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg and cloves. Add flour mixture to pumpkin mixture, a little at a time, and stir until thoroughly blended. Fold in raisins and nuts. Pour batter into 2 greased and floured 9x5x3-inch loaf pans, dividing the batter evenly between the two.

Bake in a 350° F oven for 1 hour and 5 minutes or until tester comes out free of batter. Cool in pans for 5 minutes. Turn out onto racks to cool.

### Research & Information

#### **Batiks!**

Batiks! We love them and they come in a wide variety of prints but what do you do if you just can't find the perfect batik for your project? Why, make your own of course. And, according to http://elementaryartfun.blogspot.com you can make your very own batik using crayons. Yes, good old crayons!

You will need the following materials: Empty glass baby food jars


Crayons with the paper peeled off [the site recommends Crayola crayons as the best to use for this project]

Electric try pan	water	Masking tape	
Paintbrushes	Muslin	Rubber gloves	
Cardboard	Drawing paper	Dry iron	
Pencils	Black marker	Wooden spoon	
Rit dye (or other fabric dye that can be used in cool water)			
Container large enough to submerge your fabric.			

- 1. Draw your design on the drawing paper with the pencil. A simple design without a lot of detail is best. Outline your design with the black marker. Tape your design to the cardboard. Place the muslin over the design and tape it securely. Make sure that you can see your drawn design through the muslin.
- 2. Drop each color of the peeled crayons into the baby food jars using a separate jar for each color. Place the jars in the electric fry pan and fill the pan about <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> full of water. Turn on the fry pan and melt the crayons. This is your "paint".
- 3. Once the crayons are completely melted, use the paintbrushes and melted crayons to paint your design. Do not layer your colors. Whatever color hits the fabric first will be the final color of that part of the design. Make sure the entire surface of the muslin is covered. When the wax on the muslin is solid again, crumble up the muslin to create crackles in the wax on the surface. Only crumple it once. Place the muslin in the container of dye and let sit for 5 to 10minutes. Remove, rinse if desired (optional) and let dry flat.
- 4. Finally, place the muslin on a piece of white paper and then between four or five sheets of newspaper. Press with the iron. You may need to change the paper and newspaper several times. Continue pressing until all of the wax is removed.

The site did not say anything about washing instructions or how colorfast the project may be. If anyone tries this project (it's on my list of things to do), please report back on that part of the process.

## Vista Maria to Benefit from CAMEO's Generosity

Vista Maria (www.vistamaria.org) is one of the charities that CAMEO has chosen to support this year. Located in Dearborn Heights, Vista Maria has been in existence since 1883 with a mission to deliver innovative care, support, treatment and education to vulnerable youth so that they heal, believe in their worth, and build the skills needed to succeed.

One of the many services Vista Maria offers is the Shepherd Hall Transitional Living Program. This program provides a living facility for girls, ages 12 to 24. The facility can house up to 128 girls who live on campus for anywhere from 6 months to a year. These are girls who have been abused, neglected and or abandoned and some are victims of human trafficking. (The average age of a human trafficking victim is 12 to 14 years old.)

I have been in touch with a representative from Vista Maria and they would love to receive quilts from CAMEO. The requested size is for large twin beds (size of quilt approximately 63"x 87"). The girls like all colors.

I am always amazed at the beautiful quilts our members produce for Charity and hope that CAMEO members will keep the girls of Vista Maria in mind this year when planning their Charity quilts. Thank you so much!

Called to order by **President Cindy May** at 7:03 P.M.

Cindy led the Pledge of Allegiance, welcomed all in attendance, explained the meaning of CAMEO, and read the guild's mission statement.

Barb Lusk, Facilitator VP, introduced the guest speaker for the evening, Lynn Harris.

At 8:00 the program ended and there was a Hospitality break until 8:24 when the Business portion of the meeting began.

Minutes of the September General membership Meeting were approved; they will be signed, dated, and placed on file.

**Cindy May, President** - commended **Rosemary Spatafora** for curating the guild's quilt display during September's Flint Festival of Quilts and thanked members who donated quilts for it

Announced and thanked **Theresa Nielsen** for stepping up to chair the Hospitality Committee.

Described the "field trips' that were organized during the previous guild year and asked for a show of hands as to how many would be interested if additional ones were planned for this year; the results indicated that the Executive Board would begin to look for a member to begin the coordination of some such day trips.

# **Mystery Quilt Fabric List**

Your project may be as small as 4 blocks with side borders to make a **placemat**; 36 blocks with 2 borders to make **a square quilt** or 48 blocks with 2 borders to make a rectangular **throw**.



The Mediums and Darks should appear as a solid from a distance, should contain a large variety of different fabrics, and should not be a directional design.

When choosing your fabrics:

- Successful quilts will have a large number of different Darks and Mediums.
- The Light fabric can be the same one throughout the quilt, or may also be a variety of light fabrics of one color with the same value. Examples: cream, "baby quilt" pale color, muslin.
- Use the Outer Border to select all of the Darks and Mediums that will be used for piecing the Blocks. Select a fabric with a print or design that is classified as medium or large in size. Examples: large floral, animals, holiday themes. The square Quilt and Throw border will be cut 5" wide.
- The Inner Border should be darker than the Outer Border, non-directional, and look like a solid from a distance. Its purpose is to stop the eye movement from block to border, so it should look like the fabric in the Blocks, but not to be used in the Blocks.



## 2016-17 MyStery QUILt Clue 1 (from October meeting)

Choose your mystery adventure: a placemat, a square quilt or a throw.


BLOCK A: From your light background fabric, cut:


PLACEMAT: Cut two 3 inch squares per placemat.


**SQUARE QUILT:** Cut two strips at 3" x 42". Then subcut into eighteen 3" squares.

THROW: Cut two strips at 3" x 42". Then subcut into twenty-four 3" squares.

FOR ALL THREE PROJECTS: Cut diagonally from one corner to its opposite corner to make half square triangles.







REMINDER: Reserve extra background fabric for next month's clues.

From your light background fabric, cut:

PLACEMAT: Cut eight 2-1/2" squares per placemat

**SQUARE QUILT:** Cut five strips at 2-1/2" x 42"; then subcut seventy-two 2-1/2" squares.

THROW: Cut six strips at 2-1/2" x 42"; then subcut ninety-six 2-1/2" squares

REMINDER: Reserve extra background fabric for next month's clues.

From each of your **Mediums** and **Darks**, cut several strips/scraps from each fabric measuring 1-1/2" wide. Subcut to make rectangles at 1-1/2" x 5" and 1-1/2" x 7"

PLACEMAT: Cut four medium and four dark at 5" & cut four medium and four dark at 7" per placemat.

SQUARE QUILT: Cut 36 medium and 36 dark at 5" & cut 36 medium and 36 dark at 7"

THROW: Cut 48 medium and 48 dark at 5" & cut 48 medium and 48 dark at 7"

REMINDER: Reserve extra medium and dark fabric strips for next month's clues.
