Drunkard's Path Block

History

It is thought that the design for the Drunkard's Path block originated in England, but some say that it can be traced back to Ancient Egypt. Archeologists have found it on Roman artifacts. It consists of a zig-zag pattern made of curved pieces and is said to resemble the staggering path a drunk might make on his way home.

Since the beginning of time, people have had a need to communicate. One way to do this is by using pictures or symbols. Totem poles and tattoos each express what their creators believe about this world. In Benin (Africa), people have made banners for centuries. These banners represented history and good things. African slaves brought that tradition with them and may have used quilts to "talk" to one another and to tell stories.

There is an African belief that going in a straight line is bad luck and that evil spirits would have a harder time finding a person who went in crocked lines. That belief may have led to the idea that the block was part of the communication system for the Underground railroad. Some scholars dispute that but the legend remains that the zig-zag was used by the Underground railroad to throw off pursuers since runaway slaves often moved in a zig-zag pattern and doubled back to confuse pursuers and dogs.

In the last quarter of the 19th century, there was a movement to rid the country of beer and liquor. This movement let to Prohibition in the early 20th century. The Anti=Saloon League was organized in 1872 followed by the WCTU (Women's Christian Temperance Union) in 1874 to get rid of "demon rum". It subsequently spread all over the United States amongst a diverse crowd of people all across the political spectrum and included a substantial proportion of women. In 1907, there were more than 350 thousand members. These women marched and demonstrated, smashing pubs, bottles and barrels where ever and when ever they could find them. They were temporarily successful with the enactment of National Prohibition (enacted into law January 17, 1920) from 1920 to 1933, although it should be remembered women did not get the right to vote until August 18 of that same year...7 months after Prohibition began.

One of the ways they supported their cause was raffling quilts. They adapted an English pattern and named it Drunkard's Path. The quilt was traditionally constructed with positive and negative cutouts requiring only two colors. Often the quilt was made in blue and white: blue for water (which the WCTU deemed the purest drink) and white for purity. It was also done in red and white. One of the reasons the WCTU may have adopted this block is that the triangle represents the Trinity.

Several well-known quilters have made versions of Drunkard's Path. Fons and Porter have a version on their web site, Eleanor Burns's hack is part of her Underground Railroad pattern book, and McCalls Quilting also has a pattern at www.mccallsquilting.com. Jennie Doan uses a circle cut ruler and a layer cake (Drunkard's Path: the Easy Way) and on January 8, Sarah Gallegos and Angela Hoffman featured a version of Drunkard's Path on Love of Quilting.

Many patterns are optical illusions achieved by rearranging the blocks. Curved piecing requires skill and patience, but there are many hacks which make the block do-able. I always take life with a grain of salt. And a slice of lemon. And a shot of tequila. There are more than 60 patterns using this block! Some of the best known are Solomon's Puzzle, Endless Trail, Old Maid's Puzzle, Mill Wheel, Wanderer in the Wilderness, Robbing Peter to Pay Paul and Oregon trail which was often used by early pioneers.

There are also more modern interpretations of this block. Enlarging the negative space gives the block a more contemporary look. Using colors instead of the traditional white is another way to make the block look different. Neutral tones give the quilt a different feel from the usual two-toned quilts as do stitching in the negative spaces. You will see some of these variations in the examples we have to show you.

Make an Ornament Together

There will be a No Sew Ornament from Shabby Fabrics as a fun activity for our February meeting.

Materials needed:

3" styrofoam ball (rough or smooth)

3 contrasting 2.5" strips of fabric to cut down to 2.5" squares as follows:

8 squares of a flowery or colorful print

16 squares of a light contrasting fabric

16 squares of a dark contrasting fabric

12" ribbon for circumference to cover raw edges

6-10" yarn or ribbon for hanger

200 Straight flathead pins - short (long ones work too)

Decorative pearl headed or shiny colored straight pins (optional)

CAMEO Guild Meeting December 20, 2022

President Carole Gilbert called the meeting to order at 7:00 pm. It was noted that 19 persons were in attendance via Zoom. It was noted that we have 3 months before the quilt show in April and we need to meet in person.

Our Whistle-Stop program in February will include Barb Lusk, presenting Quilt Sleeve & Dinding). Carole Gilbert will re-visit the Drunkard's Path with a sewing demo.

V.P. Scheduling: Loreen Garrison: Lynn Carson Harris, a quilter/knitter known as The Little Red Hen will be displaying her Mini Quilt series on Domestic Violence at our April 2022 quilt show. She will also be presenting a lecture at our January 2023 meeting.

Spring 2022 Retreat; Sharon Cratsenberg: The Retreat is April 7-10. Food costs have increased and prices are \$1 to \$1.25 more. In addition, Lions Bear Lake needs 25 persons to make it profitable. We had about 22 people seemed interested. Quilt Show: Contracts are coming in for vendors, among them are Theresa Weaver (Your Sewing Friend on Etsy), Times Remembered, The Front Porch Quilt Shop in Frankenmuth, Quilting Season, and Rose villa Retreat. Guild member Theresa Nielson will be handling the "Mini Silent Auction Quilts". Contact Theresa for more information on how to contribute. Basket auction, so far, we have 2 dog baskets, 2 quilting baskets, and 2 ugly fat quarter baskets. A gardening basket is another idea. Contact Judy Murray or Darlene Baer for info on how to donate. Enter your quilts: the form for quilt entry is due April 1 st . The finished quilt is due April 20 th . Find hanging sleeve instructions on the website. We want 150 to 200 quilts. (That works out to 4-5 quilts per member). Fee for non-member quilt entry is \$5.00.

Scrap Bag Challenge: Rosemary S. reminds us you can use one additional fabric for the top, in addition to the fabric in the scrap bag. Backing and binding can also be additional fabrics. The finished quilt (18" X 18" or larger) is due by the March 17 th Guild meeting, and will be displayed in April at the Quilt Show.

Charity Committee: Linda Wallace Items for Layette can be brought to the next meeting, happy to take layette donations any time of the year. Charity Day is Saturday, February 19 th . May be in person or via Zoom.

Program for January: Project B.E.T.H. Drunkard's Path was the topic. Block, Examples, Technique and History of the block were presented.

Retreat Count: Approximately 22 people are interested in attending the April Retreat.

Meeting was called to order by President Carole Gilbert at 7:00 pm

<u>Treasurers' Report:</u> Janeen Sharpe reported no activity since November.

<u>V. P. Loreen Garrison</u>: Asked about her budget for programs for 2022-2033. An approximate figure is \$1600.00 to cover presentations, workshops should be self-supporting – individual fees to cover the cost. Per Sharon C. Rental of the church hall comes from the Guild rental, a separate budget item. Programing: Contract received from Lynn Carson Harris (January 2023). Workshop chosen: Intuitive piecing with solids.
