

## **Letter from Pastor Smee**

#### It is a good thing...

How delightfully good when brothers live together in harmony! - Psalm 133:1

The closing of the Lord's Prayer is rather self-explanatory – For Thine is the Kingdom, and the power, and the glory forever and ever. Amen. I think it is a petition, though. When we close our prayers in this way, we are saying two things. First, that we commend all glory and power, and every "so-called" kingdom to the Lord; and second, as Luther says, we say "amen, amen," trusting in the Lord that all we have prayed shall come about.

Often, as human beings, and as sinners, we rarely do either of these things. We mostly want to keep all the glory, all the power and every kingdom for ourselves. We hardly want to share, let alone rely on others for care and support. We also will say "amen", which is a word for certainty, and yet we will pray and beg and be upset if things don't go exactly as we asked, even though God answers us more often than not.

As part of my work these last few months, while the council and Pr. Kris have been working on dual affiliation with the North American Lutheran Church (NALC), I have also been working on the formation of the LCMC Southern California District. The NALC offers us an opportunity to receive mutual care and assistance from a more organized denomination while maintaining our autonomy. There are plenty of resources that the NALC has that will help us continue to grow stronger as a Lutheran witness in the Indian Wells Valley. The work being done to form the LCMC Southern California District is something that has been tried and failed in the past because there was an attempt to do too much. Now, as we prepare for the district constituting convention in July, we are looking at the possibilities of a different kind of district. A district that does not exist as a bureaucracy to do things for the churches, but a fellowship of churches who mutually support one another. Where one church or pastor is gifted in a particular area, the other congregations can connect with them to receive benefits from the work God has called them to do.

The struggle with all of this is that each church, and each pastor, has to let go of all of our proprietary natures. We have to be open to being brothers and sisters that live together in harmony. That we give all glory and power to God. Ask that His Kingdom might continue to work in us and through us so we rely on His care and guidance. That we definitely pray "amen, amen" that He might make His Kingdom grow in and among us, and we trust that it will happen. It means that pastors let go of "their" stuff and give up time and talents to help seek and mentor future leaders. It means that churches join together to create disciples, not church members. May it be so for all of us.

However, thanks be to God for His great love and mercy toward us, He provided a wonderful solution to the predicament. God sent us a glorious Savior to give us a new nature. Our new nature in Christ enables us to view our wealth as a gift from God to be used in holy stewardship as He directs! In Christ we have enough. We can trust Him to supply our needs, without resorting to sinful acts to meet those needs. We can become generous and serve others instead of wanting to be served or noticed.

This holy season may the love of God in Christ help us to have pure and right motives in the acquisition and use of silver.

#### Dear Grace Family,


















Peace Bible Study meets the third Wednesday of the month at 9 am in the CR. The study is called Why Did Jesus Have to Die?. All are welcome.






