

## **Letter from Pastor Kris**

## Make a Joyful Noise Unto the Lord

Building off of the 2024 Tournament of Roses parade theme, "Celebrating a World of Music: The Universal Language," this year's Lutheran Hour Ministries float is entitled, "Make a Joyful Noise Unto the Lord."

Psalm 98 calls forth a new song from the entirety of the creation: a universal song of victory proclaimed with voices, lyre, trumpets and horns. This is the song of God's victory which He has achieved through the death and resurrection of His Son, the Messiah, Jesus of Nazareth. Through the death and resurrection of Jesus, God brings hope of life eternal to a people who are otherwise entangled in death, who are on a trajectory towards death from the moment we're born. But God sends His only Son, Jesus, who takes human brokenness (a.k.a. sin) and death upon himself, suffers death, and three days later rises victorious over both.

For this reason, the people of God – the Church of Jesus Christ – sing a new song. It is a song of hope, a song of joy, a song of praise. No longer does death have any power over us; death has lost its sting (1Cor.15.56). Yes, we still mourn the death of those we love, but we do not mourn as those who are without this resurrection hope (1Thess.4:13). What this means is that we do not become lost in grief, over-whelmed by the darkness of grief and death; instead we grieve with hope, we mourn our dead with a glimmer of light in the midst of the darkness because "those who be-

lieve in (Jesus), even though they die, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in (him) shall never die" (John 11:25b-26).

This year's Lutheran Hour float features three heralding trumpets proceeding from a song-book. Hanging from the trumpets are banners featuring the great mantra of the Lutheran Reformation which is God's plan of salvation: Grace Alone, Faith Alone, Christ



Alone. Salvation is a gift (grace) from God given to those who believe (faith) that Christ's death and resurrection is *for you*... that it takes away your sin and death and thus raises you to new and eternal life (Eph. 2:4-9).

Watch for the float in the 2024 Rose Parade on New Year's Day and may our Lord, Jesus Christ who is Himself the New Song, bless you and keep you in his peace.

## **Letter from Pastor Smee**

#### Give us this day our daily bread...

He has satisfied the hungry with good things and sent the rich away empty. – Luke 1:53

What sort of bread has God given you this last year? What blessings has He poured out upon you? What are the things that you recognize that were not accomplished or gained by you, but actually came to you from the Lord?

This petition about daily bread is one of the most overlooked petitions in the Lord's Prayer. It is a petition that makes us ask God to give us the bread we need for today, or more specifically the thing we need that is necessary for existence. It is a petition that should cull our appetites for entitlement or apathy. Entitlement makes us think we deserve something more than we do. Apathy can make us not care about daily needs, or think that asking God just for what we need is somehow not enough.

I love the little verse from Mary's song, the Magnificat in Luke 1, that gives a little taste of what God does. It speaks of God satisfying the ones who are hungry with good things. The Greek is a little more specific, speaking to those who have the pains of hunger, are lacking the needed essentials, and God comes to them and fills up the empty space, to satisfy the need. It doesn't mean that He lays out a buffet so that we can gorge ourselves and have to spend the next two hours laying on our left side. It means that those who are missing that which they should have receive it freely from God. While the rich, or the ones who have enough and are full are sent away lacking.

Think of that picture. Two people. One has nothing and is given something. One has everything but has something, not everything, taken away. What attitudes do you usually find accompanying those two kinds of people? The one who has nothing and is given something often feels loved, blessed and thankful. The one who has everything and has something taken away, maybe a flat tire, a car accident, a flooded basement, a refrigerator that goes out and all the food is spoiled, the attitude can lead to anger and even hatred because they feel slighted or even cursed.

The question, as we look at this petition, which one might we become? Are we to join the majority of Americans who have this sense of entitlement that causes us never to imagine that God might love us, because we don't see each day, each moment, as a gift? Or are we to be overcome by the Holy Spirit and echo Luther's explanation to the 1<sup>st</sup> Article of the Creed – "I believe that God has created me and all that exists. He has given me and still sustains my body and soul, all my limbs and senses, my reason and all mental faculties. He provides me daily and abundantly with food and clothing, house and home, family and property, along with all the necessities for this body and life. He also protects me from all danger and preserves me from all evil. All this He does out of fatherly and divine goodness and mercy"? May the Lord save us from the former and nurture us in the latter.

Based on Matthew 2:1-12, 3:13-17, 4:12-23 & John 1:29-42

Welcome to Epiphany, the Great Reveal.

"Epiphany" comes from a Greek word that means "appearing" or "revealing." The Gospel for Epiphany tells of the Magi, wise men from far away who followed a star to find the newborn King of the Jews. Find Him they did, just as prophets promised. The Great Reveal of Immanuel, God-With-Us in the flesh, was truly underway.

Each church year, Epiphany points us to the rest of the story about the Messiah in the manger. Gospel readings for Epiphany and the remaining Sundays in January move us quickly, over the decades, from the visit of adoring Magi to our Lord's Baptism and the beginning of His public ministry. The Little One adored by shepherds is recognized as the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. The newborn King, once announced by angel choirs, now issues His own compelling invitation: Drop everything! Follow Me.

To celebrate this Great Reveal over the years, some of my congregations have observed an old custom, the Epiphany house blessing. As pastor, I'd visit residences to chalk the following on entry door sills: 20 C+M+B 20. The letters CMB denotes this blessing: Christus mansionem benedicat (Christ bless this house), while the numbers represent the millennium and century. CMB also recalls traditional names given to the wise men (Casper, Melchior and Balthasar). Prayers are of-fered for the house and all who reside therein. Some households gather other family and friends, including the blessing as part of their end-of-Christmas festivities.

Whether it's a single-family dwelling, an apartment, a room in a skilled nursing facility, or another place, these chalk-marked doors bear witness to the world that Christ is Lord of this home. The blessing also reminds us, coming and going, to put Christ and His Church first in all of our disciple-ship, including our stewardship of all God's gifts — time, talent, treasure and testimony. So, may it be for us as we celebrate Epiphany, the Great Reveal, and look forward to the year ahead. Amen.




Grace Care Center

Peace Bible Study meets the third Wednesday of the month at 9 am in the CR. The study is called *Speaking for Christ.* All are welcome.





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
