### A Letter from the Pastor



Resurrection Greetings to everyone here at Fairview United Methodist Church as well as our community beyond! It is so good to be back here with all of you following a much-needed family vacation after the joy of Easter. As I write these words from my home office today, my youngest daughter is singing in the background: “This is the day, this is the day, That the Lord has made, that the Lord has made. I will rejoice, I will rejoice, And be glad in it, and be glad in it...” Naturally, it just warms my heart to hear her singing this, and I pray that it may be so for all of us.

I also find myself thinking ahead as we find ourselves rapidly approaching one of my favorite days of the Christian Year; Pentecost. Just as in the Upper Room at Pentecost, it is the Holy Spirit who transforms Christ’s disciples from ordinary people into Spirit-filled evangelizers. Before the coming of the Spirit, the early Christians did not seem a particularly impressive group of people. They had good reason to be filled with fears, concerns, and feelings of inadequacy as they contemplated the awesome task Jesus had given them: to be his witnesses to the ends of the earth. They were still struggling to comprehend the events of recent days: the crucifixion, resurrection, and ascension of the Lord. But when the Spirit fell upon them, their hearts were set ablaze with the fire of God’s love and they could no longer keep the good news of Christ to themselves. They went out from the Upper Room overflowing with the joy of the Gospel. Through their witness, the Gospel was unleashed in Jerusalem and from there throughout the ancient world.

Today no less than two millennia ago, there is no limit to what the Lord can do in our midst. His part is to clothe his Church with “power from on high” (cf. Luke 24:49) for the accomplishment of her mission. Our part is to give him our wholehearted “yes”—to let ourselves be transformed, guided, and sent forth by the Holy Spirit, who is the “principal

agent of evangelization.” It is my responsibility as a pastor and servant leader to help inspire all of us to live into that same reality as the Apostles experienced in the Upper Room all those centuries ago so that we too will have that same zeal and enthusiasm for mission and spreading the love of Jesus Christ in a world that is wracked with strife, division, and war. These things will be the focus of my preaching over the next several weeks as we continue our sermon series “In the Name of Jesus, By the Power of the Holy Spirit” heading into Pentecost. We will also be exploring some of these themes in Renewal Hour which meets on Wednesdays at 3:30 pm, so if you’ve never made it before, I’d highly encourage you to come check it out for some lively and spiritually enriching conversation and teaching!

We’re also preparing to head into Choir Sunday, which will be our beloved Carol Chatfield’s last Sunday with us. We plan to have a reception after the service, so we hope you will consider joining us for that as we celebrate her and all the amazing things she has done in her time as our Director of Music! Let us all continue to be in prayer for Carol as she begins this exciting next chapter in her life!

One of my favorite New Testament scholars, the great N.T. Wright, once said that “Those in whom the Spirit comes to live are God's new Temple. They are, individually and corporately, places where heaven and earth meet.” I know this is certainly the case with our Fairview Family, God has great things in store for us, and I am excited for this wonderful season in which we will continue to explore the power of the Holy Spirit, who is available to all call upon Him!


**UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH BOOK REVIEW**

***Invisible Child*** follows eight riveting and dramatic years of the life of a girl whose imagination is as expansive as the skyscrapers near her Brooklyn, New York homeless shelter. Her mother named her Dasani after the bottled water. Dasani described herself as ‘invisible’ when she was eleven years old. She did not use the word negatively but thought of it as a positive image---- a ‘superpower’. Dasani’s childhood was shaped by the encounters of her two worlds – the seen and the unseen---the world of Black disadvantage and homeless and the world of white privilege and the housed.

**UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH REPORT  
GIVEN BY KATHY SCHAEFER  
SUNDAY, APRIL 7, 2024**

Kathy Schaefer, Secretary of the Fairview United Women in Faith, gave the highlights of 2023 key mission contributions and the history of United Women in Faith on Sunday, April 7, 2024. The following is her report shared with the Fairview congregation:

The organization we now call United Women in Faith began 155 years ago when 8 women from a Methodist Episcopal Church in Boston formed a group called the Women's Foreign Missionary Society in order to help support the church's mission in India. Since then, our organization has expanded as new missions opened up and other churches with their Women's Missionary Associations combined into what we now know as the United Methodist Church.

We have grown from 8 members in 1869 to nearly half a million members today. And we have had a variety of names along the way— some of you may remember.

- the Women's Society of World Service of the Evangelical United Brethren Church
- or the Wesleyan Service Guild for Methodist Episcopal Women employed outside the home
- or the Women's Society of Christian Service for the Methodist Church,
- all of which combined in 1972 into United Methodist Women,
- and in 2022 we all became United Women in Faith.

We've had many names, but the core of our work has remained the same: changing the world through faith, hope and love in action.

In this past year, our local unit of United Women in Faith has participated in the national reading program and learned about and contributed to a wide variety of missions, including (but not limited to):

- Support of our own missionary (Grace Musuka) in Southern Africa
- Fairview's own Food Pantry
- Wesley Center in Dayton
- Nome Community Center in Nome Alaska
- Church Women United of Dayton
- United Methodist Committee on Relief for earthquake victims

And through our donations to the District, State, and National levels of United Women in Faith we have helped support Women's missions in such places as: Cameroon, West Congo, Jamaica, Haiti, The Philippines, the Oklahoma Indian Missionary Conference, and many other locations.

We plan to follow a very similar agenda for 2024. Our operating expenses and our mission donations are not a part of Fairview Church's budget. All of our funds are raised by our members with the help of donations from you, our generous friends in the congregation. Thank you!

**UNITED WOMEN IN FAITH PRESENTS  
JAN MAINS SPECIAL MISSION RECOGNITION**

Cecelia Long, President of Fairview United Women in Faith, presented the Special Mission Recognition to Jan Mains, April 7, 2024. The presentation was as follows:

At the October 2023 meeting of The Fairview United Women in Faith Leadership Team, the decision was made to give a Special Mission Recognition. Today we present this Special Mission Recognition to a member of Fairview who quietly works behind the scenes but is a real worker bee. She is an alto in the Chancel Choir, a member of the Bell Choir, and sings with small groups when the choir is on vacation. She serves as a Trustee on Duty one Sunday a month when she arrives very early on Sunday morning to unlock the church, open the parking lot gate, turn on lights, and unlocks doors throughout the church. She is also secretary of the Board of Trustees. She also serves on the Altar and Flower Guild and helps to prepare the Sanctuary for worship services.

When Fairview had an active children's ministry, she was a member of the Ministry team which prepared creative lessons and artistic designs that helped children to learn about Christ being a role model for their lives and nurture the children in being disciples of Christ. She is currently working with others in the church to expand the ministry of the Faith Class beyond the classroom and into the community at large.

This outstanding woman helps with desserts and meals when they are needed for church dinners. She also sets up tables and chairs for church activities in Fellowship Hall and often launders the tablecloths and keeps them organized. She is very good at organizing and bringing order to space that is crowded or disorganized. I could go on and on about tasks which our awardee does just because she sees the need, and this is how her love for Christ is shown as 'Love in Action' in each ministry area. She is that kind of person.





**PANTRY UPDATE**

April was a very busy month in our Food Pantry as we served a record number of households. Every time we open, we see more and more households needing our services. Attendance on Monday and Friday has sometimes doubled, and we are turning people away. The same is true on Wednesday. Most of our clients live in our 45405/45406 neighborhood.

We need more help each time we open our doors. We would like to see a third volunteer on Monday and Friday, and we can always use help on Wednesday night. If you are serving once a month, consider twice! Have a friend who would like to volunteer, bring them along.

Thanks to all the volunteers who show up to unload our Foodbank trucks along with volunteers from our neighborhood. Our last truck was 7,600 pounds which brings our total this year to almost 40,000 pounds.... that's 20 tons! We also hosted volunteers from the Foodbank for one of our trucks. They were a huge help and were impressed with our pantry and all it does.



