Green achieved this past year in initiating a historic citywide mediation agreement designed to improve race relations in the Green Bay Police Department, schools, city administration and businesses.

Rev. Green attended Saints Junior College of Lexington, Mississippi and Mississippi Industrial College of Hollyspring, Mississippi. While at Saints Junior College, he met and married Alice, his wife of 31 years. They have three children, five grandchildren, and have also adopted two children.

Rev. Green is a gifted singer and preacher, and has served in Green Bay as the Pastor of Divine Temple Church of God in Christ since 1995. His uniqueness as an individual has attracted people from diverse backgrounds and persuasions, as he focuses his ministry on meeting the needs of the whole person.

Rev. Kay Krejci was one of 27 clergy and lay leaders who met in May, 2002, with WISDOM Organizer, Rev. Joe Ellwanger, to learn about how to begin congregational based organizing in Brown County. About Our Speaker Rev. Jerry Hancock

Rev. Jerry Hancock, an ordained minister in the United Church of Christ, entered the ministry after working for more than 30 years in the criminal justice system.

He started as a law student interviewing prisoners in the jail at seven o'clock every Monday morning. Since that time he has been an attorney and Assistant Attorney General for the State of Wisconsin. As head of the state crime labs he introduced forensic DNA in Wisconsin. He worked with law enforcement leaders—like David Cooper—on the development of Problem Oriented Policing. He also worked with Jim Doyle on the prosecution of Publishers Clearing House for defrauding the elderly.

About five years ago, Rev. Hancock felt God calling him in a different direction. Here is how he explains it: "I know that God wants me in prison. I need to be in prison to find the justice that is missing in the legal system."

In February, Rev. Hancock became the Director of the Prison Ministry Project. The Project is an outreach ministry of the United Church of Christ. Its challenge is to serve prisoners and their families, engage the wider church in prison issues and to be an advocate for prison reform.

Rev. Hancock is a graduate of Colorado College, The University of Wisconsin Law School and Chicago Theological Seminary. He and his wife, the artist Linda Hancock, live in Madison.




November 8, 2007: Brown County Workforce Housing Public Event

With a grant from the Affordable Housing Institute of the Catholic Foundation and in cooperation with the Fox Valley Housing Coalition, developed a 6 minute educational video called "A Neighborhood for Everyone".



- Continuing to educate the general public and area decision makers about the need for mixed income Workforce Housing through the video distribution and presentations.
- Cooperating with the Brown County Planning Staff to produce a model "Traditional Neighborhood Development" on the 150 acre "County Farm" property located adjoining the Brown County Mental Health Center and Detention Center.
- Brought internationally recognized urban planner David Rusk for a return presentation comparing
 the income levels of various local governmental and private employees with the current
 availability of existing housing and cost of new construction, particularly in the suburbs.

Value Statement On Health Care Access

Health is not a commodity that can be bought or sold. Health is a state of being. It calls for a process of nurturing the physical and mental well-being of all God's children, recognizing that every human life is infinitely valuable. Therefore, we believe that quality, accessible health care is a basic human right.



February 2008 Health Care Forum: "Health Care Access: Is it Making You Sick and Tired."

- The Health Committee spent some time this past year increasing their knowledge about the health care crisis. We had three speakers: Daniel Wadle, from Wisconsin Citizen Action spoke on the Healthy Wisconsin Plan; Bonnie Kuhr, NEW Community Clinic Director and Andrea Werner, Bellin Cardiac and Vascular Director shared their views on the current healthcare system in Brown County.
- We also held a viewing of and discussion about "Sicko" a documentary by Michael Moore.
- We finished the year with the Healthcare Forum "Health Care Access: Is it Making You Sick and Tired." There were three speakers: Dr Robert Kraig, Director of programs at Citizen Action of WI; Mr. Jeffrey Resik, CEO of Bottom Line Marketing and Mr. Adam Warpinski, Brown County Supervisor. Each shared different programs being proposed in Wisconsin. But the key to the forum was the sharing of how our faith values should be shaping the discussion about health care access. This was done beautifully by Marian Boyle, pastor of West Side Moravian Church and Rabbi Shaina Bacharach of Cnesses Israel Congregation. It was well attended by about 80 people.

Common Destiny Reflection:

Restoring Our Sense Of Compassion And Community

"Why do you care what happens to those people?" The people who have been fighting Green Bay City Hall over the treatment of the chronic homeless have heard this question from many sources. It has been asked by City Council and County Board members. It has come from friends, neighbors and coworkers. It appears in letters to the editor and on on-line forums. The question needs to be answered.


For many, unconditional compassion is a result of personal life experiences. These are people who have been lost, but now are found, people who have recovered from addictions, mental disease, or financial disaster through the unconditional compassion of someone else. They find that the only true form of thanksgiving for the compassion they have received is to share it with others.

Others believe that their faith traditions require them to act according to the very specific and clear directions that their founders and prophets have laid out for them. These messages of compassion were directed toward people who did not deserve compassion. People of faith are compelled to provide for the simple human needs of the helpless. In order to be healthy over the long term, a community must involve all of the gifts of all of its members, even those who appear at the moment to have no gifts. We are not intelligent enough or farsighted enough to judge anyone as worthless.

We sometimes mistake the intentions of the Founding Fathers in the Bill Of Rights. The granting to "We the People" of rights such as freedom of speech, religion, press and assembly was not a kind-hearted humanistic gesture. They realized that respect for the individual is necessary for a strong, free community. We need to restore our sense of compassion and community and outgrow the mean-spirited and fearful attitude of exclusion and separation that we have fallen into in the last couple of decades. Our community will be better for it, and our grandchildren will thank us for it.




JOSHUA TIP/TAD Committee

Our "Treatment Instead of Prison (TIP)" Committee picked up another acronym this year. A response of the state government to the call for TIP has been to establish a program called "Treatment Alternatives and Diversions (TAD)," which provides grants to counties to help establish programs like Drug Treatment Courts, Day Reporting Centers, and the like. So, we are the "TIP/TAD Committee!"









We started meeting on a monthly basis back in September. We needed to find out what was already happening and what we wanted to improve upon. We decided we needed to go with a Public Forum, first to educate the public as well as public officials as to successful alternatives to incarceration and second, to build support to establish a Drug Treatment Court in Brown County. God had already paved the way by having the Honorable Judge Donald Zuidmulder enthusiastic that JOSHUA was willing to help him bring a Drug Treatment Court to Brown County. We attended the Criminal Justice Coordinating Board when Judge Zuidmulder gave a presentation to begin the process. We had the opportunity to observe Winnebago's Drug Treatment Court and gain valuable information to share at the Public Forum. We have spoken with people who will be influential in making it happen: the District Attorney's Office, Department of Probation and Parole, the Public Defender's Office, the Sheriff's Department, the Green Bay Police, Brown County Department of Human Services, the Brown County Public Safety Chair, the Mayor of Green Bay, and the County Executive's Office. At the April 8, 2008 Public Forum, most of these governmental officials were in attendance and made public commitments to support the formation of a Brown County Drug Treatment Court.

It sounds very promising. We have been invited to have a representative from JOSHUA to be on the Drug Treatment Formation Committee.

Common Destiny Reflection:

Helping To Right The Wrongs

I have been an Eye Care Professional for many years. With the influx of Hispanic and Hmong populations in our community I had the feeling: If these people are here in the U.S. they should be able to speak English.

About five years ago JOSHUA was introduced to us in our church. I felt like I may be of some use to help, along with others in our church and other congregations, to right some of the wrongs in our community.

Joining JOSHUA not only made me a better Christian but made me more aware of the problems in our neighborhoods. It also gave me more compassion for the imprisoned and some insight into the homeless issues. People in JOSHUA became my friends and helped me be aware of the concerns, setbacks and trials of my non-English speaking patients and neighbors.

I now say to my no-English speaking patients, through an interpreter or their children who interpret for them, "I wish I could speak and understand your language. Sorry!"

Common Destiny Reflection:

Building Community One Person At A Time

When JOSHUA asked that we pick an issue we would like to be involved in, Immigration was my choice. As a Literacy council tutor, I had come to know Jessica and her wonderful family, and I had seen first hand all the difficulty Jessica's husband had getting his green card; the years he had to wait, the costs, interviews, and frustration. Jessica also experienced discrimination at the DMV and on one of her jobs.

Jessica was my student for four years and is still a very good friend. She has become a citizen, voted, and saw her husband receive his green card.

A year and a half ago I attended a JOSUE meeting where I met Paula, a woman who couldn't speak English and said she would like to learn English at the Literacy Council.

Our classes began in August 2006. I know she is learning. She and her husband are very active in JOSUE and very committed to working on their undocumented status. One of her lessons had the sentence, "The woman goes to church on Sunday." She said "I go to church on Tuesday." She and others are in a group at St. Willebrord's praying for a resolution to the immigration problem.

Paula and I continue to meet twice a week. I try to help her and make her family feel welcome. I am learning just how big and complex this immigration problem is, but I'm hopeful that somehow this problem can be resolved in the near future. It has gone on far too long a time.

- February 9-12: Roberto Torrez represented JOSHUA and WISDOM in Washington, DC at meetings of FAIR (Fair Immigration Reform Movement) and CRI (Civil Rights for Immigrants).
- ~ February: Began work to bring all area groups concerned with immigration issues together or a meeting to address common concerns.
- March: Began development of a Speakers' Bureau that will meet the educational needs
 of churches with few Latino members.
- April 12: Members participated in the Wisdom Forum in Milwaukee at which Roberto Torrez co-chaired the session on Immigration.



Common Destiny Reflection: We Are All Children Of God

Bright faces laughing, looks of mischief, smiles, shyness, openness, talking, whispering, engaging — Children! Joy! This is my experience Monday mornings walking down the halls of Sullivan Elementary School in Green Bay, where, as a retired speech and language pathologist, I help screen children for communication problems.

Many of these children are from immigrant families. I don't know if their families are legal or illegal. Their academic gifts, hands on understanding, and relational experiences will be used to create a better future for all of us. These are our kids and my faith background and experience tells me that they are also all children of God.

Imagine then my incredulity several months ago when at a JOSHUA event, my state assemblyman pointed me to the 2007 Wisconsin Citizen Survey from the Wisconsin Policy Research Institute. The issue of allowing illegal immigrant children to attend local public schools drew my attention. 46% of the state opposed the idea of sending these children to public schools and 46% favored. This was difficult enough for me to believe but then I learned that in my city of Green Bay, 53% of residents opposed the idea while only 32% supported it. How is it that people would deny a public education to the presently least powerful, yet potentially most important group for our future?

These are the same vibrant, eager to learn, life filled, energy giving kids I see every Monday. These are our children with whom we share a common destiny. It is for these children - and all children - that my voice combined with others must speak to national and state legislators, to city council members to our churches and perhaps most importantly and most difficult, to speak to friends, co-workers, and neighbors.
