Plaintiff Claimed Homeowner Negligent In Fatal Fire

Defendant's Verdict

The plaintiffs were the relatives of two men who were killed in a house fire. They sued the woman who owned the house. The fire hap-

pened on Nov. 20, 1996 at approxi-

mately 1:15 a.m. Four people were killed in the fire. The homeowner survived.

The plaintiffs' expert argued that the fire occurred because the woman stored flammiable materials, including newspaper, magazines and starter logs, too close to a wood-burning stove!

The defendant argued that heat from the stove could not have ignited combustibles 18 inches to 20 inches away from the stove, that the origin of the fire was unknown, and that there were at least 14 other possible sources of ignition. She also contended she was not the last per-

son to put wood in the stove.
