For Christians, the most important event in history is the resurrection. Our church year revolves around the Holy Week and the Three Days (Triduum) of Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Resurrection. This week is the very core of our Christian Gospel. Although never mentioned in the Bible, Lent has become our way of preparing ourselves for this Holy Week.



Lent as a time of fasting originated in the first few centuries after Christ. It was a time of mourning, cleansing, and preparation for the Holy Week to come. At first, the length of Lent varied. Lent was formally set at 40 days at the at the Council of Nicaea in 325. Forty days was selected to parallel the time Jesus spent in the wilderness fasting and being tempted after His baptism. Originally, Lent was a time of intense education and preparation for baptism. As adult baptisms became fewer in number, Lent became more of a penitential season.

The origins of Ash Wednesday are unclear. The Old Testament scriptures speak of people throwing ashes over their heads and dressing in sack cloth during times of mourning and repentance. When Lent first became a tradition, those who were guilty of great sins covered themselves in ashes, fasted, and removed themselves from the community until restored on Maundy Thursday. In the sixth century, priests began marking all worshippers with ashes in the sign of the cross as a reminder of both our mortality and our joining with Christ in our baptism.

In modern times, giving up something we enjoy for Lent has become a common practice. And the most frequent item given up is – Chocolate!! Isn't it ironic that this year Ash Wednesday falls on the day of the year when the most chocolate is sold – Valentine's Day!! Will you give up something for Lent? What we give up is far less important than what we replace it with. So, if you plan on taking part in that practice this year, consider spending your time of fasting in prayer. If you give up your daily Starbucks coffee or evening cocktail, consider donating the savings to the local food bank. Or instead of giving something up, consider adding 30 minutes each day for extra devotions, scripture reading, prayers, or a Lectio Divina. Whatever your choices this Lenten season, remember, Christ did not die so that we might suffer but so that we might enjoy life more abundantly. Blessings to you!

<u>Youth & Education</u>: Guides the youth & education opportunities.


Congregation Council Action <u>December 2023:</u>

Did you know that any decoration of the Church is supposed to be more subdued than normal during Lent? Flowers are specifically banned as decorations around the altar for nearly all of Lent. Lent is a time of penance and introspection, based on Jesus' 40 days in the desert overcoming temptation. However, Laetare Sunday, the Fourth Sunday of Lent, March 10, 2024, is an exception to this rule. "Laetare" is derived from the opening

words of the Latin Mass, "Rejoice (Laetare) Jerusalem" (Isaiah 66:10). The church is called to joyful anticipation of the victory to be won. This day is in the middle of Lent. We look with expectation to Easter. It is meant to give us hope and encouragement as we slowly progress towards Easter.

<u>Communion Assistant</u> ~ Serves the wine during communion.

<u>Fellowship Hour Host</u> ~ Prepares and serves coffee and treat following worship.
