# GGRS Abandons Trackage! Pulls Rails for Transfer to Other Locations!

The GGRS board and members agreed to abandon tracks leading to a heavy, but rarely used subdivision, in favor of pulling the track and moving it to more conducive rail lines still in operation. The Gandy Dancer Division met at Bando Junction in July at the connecting point to the Grand Western Mining Company RR. In spite of the heat, the crew got down to business ripping up the track and usable ties, and discarding the scrap lumber.



Repairs were also made to the MOW (Maintenance of Way) equipment, such that storage of railcars and equipment could be more readily available when needed by the railway.

The Chow line was well stocked with feasts from south of the border, and by the end of the day, all work was accomplished, rail pulled, equipment organized, and there was still time to visit the Grand Western's two locations and railfan some passing freight.






### At the Depot

At the Southern Museum of Civil War and Locomotive History, the club set up a layout. This museum holds the General, famous for the Great Locomotive Chase! Rarely do they allow people to board the General, but this was one of those days! Lots of folks came by to see us as they made their way to the back of the museum.

When the building was taken over by the museum, many of the patterns, molds, and train construction parts remained in the facility.











Across the street from the museum is the hotel, where the crew always stopped for breakfast on their trip from Atlanta to Chattanooga. After the train was stolen from them, the crew never ate breakfast there again while running the train.

#### 1:1 Scale Train Ride for 2023 Schedule Released

The Tweetsie Railroad in Blowing Rock, North Carolina has released the 'OFFICIAL'

schedule for their Annual Railroad Heritage Weekend. Lots of steam railroading for our group to enjoy! All Railroad Heritage Weekend activities are included in Tweetsie Railroad's regular daily admission price with one exception: A \$5 per passenger donation is required to ride the special 1870s vintage No. 5 Coach Car, pulled by one of our historic locomotives. All donations will go towards supporting East Tennessee & Western North Carolina Railroad preservation projects.

SATURDAY, AUGUST 26TH the park will open at 10:00am and participants can view and photograph the morning locomotive preparations after the park opens. The Locomotive Shop will be closed to visitors except at specified tour times. A Memorabilia Room will be open in the Tweetsie Junction during park hours where you can see historic and rare artifacts from Tweetsie Railroad's past, and view documentaries about the ET&WNC and Tweetsie Railroad. Starting at 10:15 a.m.and running until 4:45 p.m. Locomotive No. 12 (formerly ET&WNC "Tweetsie") and Coach No. 5 guests can climb aboard Tweetsie Railroad's 1870s vintage Coach No. 5 and ride behind locomotive No.12 (built 1917). Guests will enjoy a 3 -mile journey into the past. [Due to its design, Coach No. 5, is not wheelchair accessible, this is a non-stop train ride and does not include any interactive entertainment.] From 10:30 a.m. until 5:00 p.m.

Locomotive No. 190 (former White Pass & Yukon "Yukon Queen" built in 1943) will operate the Wild West Train transporting Guests and Railfans alike on a 3-mile journey back into the Old West. Not to be missed is the 2:30 p.m. Locomotive Shop Tour where our group can see the equipment, tools, and machines that help keep our locomotives operating. Meet in front of the Shop five minutes prior to the scheduled tour. (Age 12 and under must be accompanied by an adult.) The Shop tour will be followed by a brief presentation regarding current ETW&NC preservation projects. The highlight of the weekend will be the 6:30 p.m. Evening Photo Special, an exclusive opportunity for ticketed Guests to photograph Locomotive No. 190 with the excursion cars. Locations for the photo run-bys will be at the Trestle and the Frontier Outpost, with two run-bys at each stop. (Guests must be 16 years or older to be permitted to get off the train at the designated photo run-by locations.)

SUNDAY, AUGUST 27TH the park opens at 10;00am with another opportunity to view and photograph the morning locomotive preparations after the park opens. The rail shop will not be open to visitors except a specific tour time. Just like yesterday, the Memorabilia Room is open in the Tweetsie Junction where you can see historic and rare artifacts from Tweetsie Railroad's past, and view documentaries about the ET&WNC and Tweetsie Railroad. Today's highlight will be a Double-Header operating from 10:30 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. with Locomotives No. 12 and No. 190 pulling one train. Enjoy a rare opportunity to witness two steam locomotives working in tandem. Led by Locomotive No. 12, Guests will be transported on our Wild West train ride with the assistance of Locomotive No. 190. After lunch and operating until 5:00pm. Locomotive No. 190 will operate the Wild West Train transporting Guests and Railfans alike on a 3-mile journey back into the Old West. Continued from yesterday, Locomotive No. 12 and Coach No. 5 will run from 1:00 p.m. until 4:45 p.m.

This will be our last chance to climb aboard Tweetsie Railroad's 1870s vintage Coach No. 5 and ride behind locomotive No. 12 for a 3- mile journey into the past. Like yesterday, a \$5 donation per rider is required for this special train; all donations go to ET&WNC railroad preservation projects. [Due to its design, Coach No. 5, is not wheelchair accessible. This is a non-stop train ride and does not include interactive entertainment.] At 2:30 p.m. the Locomotive Shop Tour will be repeated from yesterday. See the equipment, tools, and machines that help keep our locomotives operating. Meet in front of the Shop five minutes prior to the scheduled tour. (Age 12 and under must be accompanied by an adult.) The Shop tour will be followed by a brief presentation on ETW&NC preservation projects.

No photography will be allowed at the Trestle or the Frontier Outpost during the day Sunday. However, photos may be taken from the Hacienda.

The theme park is based around the railroad and has family-oriented rides and shows in addition to the train ride, so bring the kids and grandkids along. Tickets are \$60.00 per day for adults, \$40.00 per day for 3 to 12 year-olds, and 2 and under are free. If you enter AFTER 3 pm on Saturday, you can return all day Sunday for the one Saturday ticket. The official hotel will be the Hampton Inn and Suites, 262 Hotel Street, Lenoir, North Carolina which is about 30 minutes away from the railroad. 


#### September GGRS Meeting and Second 1:1 Scale Ride Opportunity











Bachmann, LGB, PIKO, and Hartland steam locomotives may be found operating on the railroad. Rolling stock is made up of a mix of Accucraft, LGB, USA Trains, Bachmann, Aristocraft, and MDC/PIKO. This railroad was featured in the June 2018 Garden Railway's magazine and as a pre-tour on the 2018 National Garden Railway Convention. Buildings are mostly wood and are either scratch or kit built. Many plantings are appropriate scale sized for the garden railroad. Members are welcome to bring a locomotive or entire train to run on the layout if desired (rolling stock on the railroad all have LGB or Kadee knuckle couplers).

Lunch will be served at noon and the menu shall include pork tenderloin sliders, chips, soft drinks, and tea provided by the host. Members are asked to bring sides or desserts. A table or two will be provided for members to being items to sell or trade.

A member meeting will start immediately after lunch with a short presentation on model buildings by Ted Yarbrough. He will show a few examples of wood kits and plastic kits. Scratch built, Michael Custom Wood Working, Banta, Garden Texture, Ted Brewer's Railroad Plans, Lionel, and other manufacturers products will be shown, explained, and compared.

The operations of the day will shut down at 2:00 pm in order to allow time for participants to take advantage of the Tennessee Valley Railroad's Founder's Day activities.

The Tennessee Valley Railroad, in Chattanooga, is about a 50-minute drive from the host's garden railroad. September 9 is their Founder's Day Celebration. They will have several very special activities that many GGRS members may want to take part in.

First, they plan to operate a **special double headed (train pulled by two locomotives) steam train** at 5:00pm from the Grand Junction Depot on Cromwell Road. Double headed steam trains are rare. For this event, Southern Railway Locomotives #630, a 2-8-0 Consolidation, and #4501, a 2-8-2 MIKADO, will pull the train three miles crossing two high bridges and traveling through the 960 foot long pre-Civil War Missionary Ridge Tunnel to East Chattanooga and back.

The second activity of the day will be Dinner on the Diner train leaving Grand Junction at 6:30. This ride will take you into downtown Chattanooga on either a dining car or Pullman car while you eat on the train. Real china on a white table cloth will be the setting for an elegant meal.

The third event will be a twilight train, The Evening Ridge Runner, leaving Grand Junction at 7:00 pm. The Evening Ridge Runner lets you experience the train ride at twilight with the engine headlights and coach lights turned on. The final event will be a night time photo shoot with TVRM locomotives staged at East Chattanooga (will require driving over to East Chattanooga for the photo shoot). The photo shoot will begin at 8:30 and end at 9:45. The East Chattanooga Depot will be open for participants to get photo equipment ready and as a waiting area between photo

All events are priced individually and range from \$30.00 to \$130.00 per person. Tickets will sell out (SOON), so purchase tickets in advance if you desire to participate. **Tvrail.com** is the web site for more info and to purchase tickets.
