


January 13: Kirby Park. Kirby Park is always one of the more productive local birding areas offering river views and wooded areas. We will meet at the Nesbitt boat launch at 8:30 a.m.

February 17: Susquehanna Riverlands. The Riverlands is an Important Bird Area (IBA) in Luzerne county and there is always plenty to see there. We will meet in the parking lot at 8:30 a.m.

March 16: Nescopeck State Park. Nescopeck is another great area for birding in Luzerne county. In mid March, we could find some early migrants mixed in with the overwintering birds. We will meet in the parking lot by the bridge to park headquarters at 8:30 a.m.
