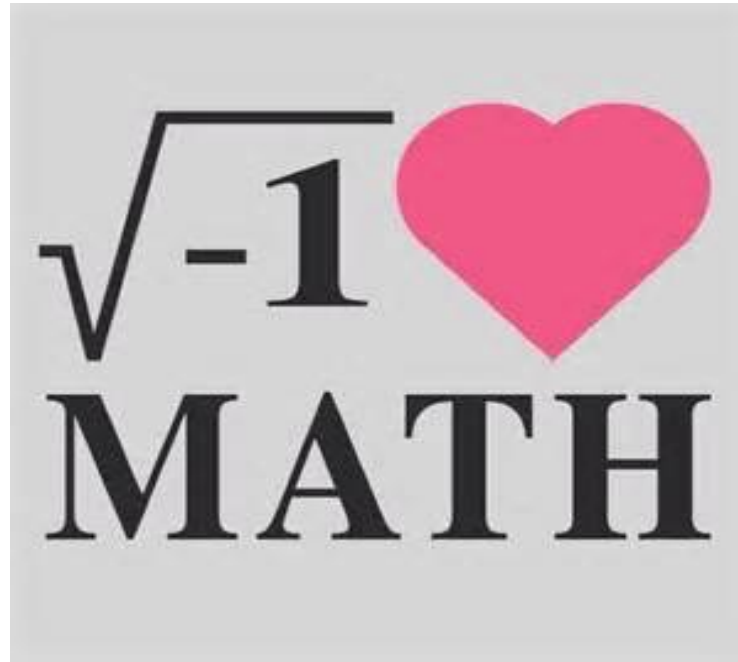


Lesson 1.3.1: Defining Complex Numbers, i , and i^2

Vocabulary

- Imaginary Unit



The letter i , used to represent the non-real value, $i = -1$

- Complex Number
 - Standard Form



A number in the form $a + bi$, where a and b are real numbers, and i is the imaginary unit
