American Military History has many interesting stories of how and why America became, and still is, a key Super Power. Lest we forget this History and how it was accomplished, and more important, how to maintain that status, Freedom and Global Peace will be no more. One such story of American soldiers in WWII doing the seemingly impossible at a very high cost is that of the 2nd Ranger Battalion who took Pointe Du Hoc during the Normandy Invasion.

Under the command of Lt. Col. James E. Rudder on the 6th of June,1944, 225 Ranger Commandos of companies D, E, and F made History on D-Day. Their task was to still the large German gun batteries at

the advance of the Normandy Invasion which in itself was a huge challenge. To make their task even more difficult, they had to climb straight up the sheer 100 foot cliffs of Pointe Du Hoc Normandy to start their mission. During this raid they met with a barrage of German gunfire and grenades as they attempted to reach the top of the cliffs. With this seemingly impossible task, these brave men overcame the odds but only through the sacrifice of half of their men. With the remaining smaller numbers of their team they set out to seek and destroy the guns they believed would be at the top of the cliffs they just climbed. Little did they know that the Germans had already moved these guns further inland so now they had to battle their way past the Germans who awaited them at the top of the cliff and find where these guns had been moved. Through sheer guts and gumption these men we able to not only find the big guns but they destroyed them successfully to pave the way for the Normandy Invasion. Had they not accomplished their task of climbing the cliffs and silencing these guns, the invasion would not have been successful and WWII would have been lost...



Major History was made by this small band of dedicated American soldiers and it turned the tide of the war in our favor. As the saying goes, we could be speaking German today and be under the control of a horrible regime were it not for men such as our 2ND Battalion Rangers.

About the perseverance of American soldiers dedication to their duty at all cost, I leave you with this one bit of History put in a slightly different way: "Americans - We'll cross a frozen river in a row boat to kill you in your sleep on Christmas. No kidding we've done it before..." Thank you George Washington for leading that charge!!!

<u>Women's History Month</u>: In WW II, Victory in the Pacific depended on strategy, bravery and military might. It also depended on a brilliant Marine Scientist named **Mary Sears**.



At the Battle of Tarawa in the Gilbert Islands in November 1943-one of the major amphibious landings of the war-as many as 100 boats full of US Marines ran up against a coral reef hundreds of yards from shore. As Marines jumped into the water and tried to make their way to the beach, Japanese fire mowed them down. Though the US prevailed at Tarawa, more than 1,000 Americans were killed and 2,000 wounded—what went wrong? One major blunder that turned the shoreline into a killing field was shockingly basic. Operations planners relying on outdated nautical charts and imperfect memories of foreign officers had misjudged the tide. A startling realization that their lack of knowledge about the ocean was going to cost lives, ships and equipment.

Enter diminutive marine biologist Mary Sears, who at age 38, with impressive scientific credentials became the Navy's first official Oceanographer. This unknown plankton researcher found herself in the middle of a terrible global war providing critical advice that countless lives depended on. It is no exaggeration to say that Mary Sears was instrumental in bringing the field of oceanography onto the battle stage. Her data gathering and top-secret calculations on the eve of battle changed fledgling

amphibious forces into premier assault teams. Sears retired from active service in June 1946 but continued her own research, published a vast collection of unparalleled knowledge of the sea, and rose to the rank of Commander in the US Naval Reserve. Three years after her death, the U.S. Navy recognized her service in October 2000 by launching a 300-foot research vessel named in her honor **USNS Mary Sears**, one of seven Oceanographic research vessels in operation today.
