In Edmonton, the Indigenous population approaches nearly 83,750 individuals. Within Canada, this number only falls second to Winnipeg. From the 83,750 indigenous, over half of them reside in the city outside of the reserves, and over half of the urban indigenous population struggle from low income or poverty, in need of desperate help.

The Edmonton Urban Native Ministry is an organization rooted in the Western Han-Ca Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, and aims to aid in the "healing and reconciliation" journey for the urban indigenous people in the love of Christ. Since 2004, EUNM has operated at Eastwood, Alberta Avenue (118 Ave. 87 St.), following the high concentration of urban indigenous peoples in the area. The following ways are how EUNM has seeked to serve local needs.

Leadership

 For the urban indigenous, those who wish to serve at the centre are given the job opportunity to do so. Through the experience of serving others, many are able to work on their self-development and leadership skills.
