Having a Will helps ensure that important questions are answered for those left behind:

Parents of underage children, who will raise your young children if both you and your spouse die?

Who is to receive those special items you want to share?

Philanthropic giving – do your family know what you wanted?

If you die without a Will, your estate may not be distributed in the way you would have wished, and the costs of administering your estate may also be higher.

Wills Registry – The Vital Statistics Agency maintains the wills registry in BC. Wills can be registered by a lawyer, notary, trustee or individual over the age of 16 and mentally capable.

To be valid – a will must be in writing, signed at its end by the will-maker in the presence of 2 or more witnesses present at the same time and signed by 2 or more of the witnesses in the presence of the will-maker.

Witnesses – should be competent adults who are not receiving anything under your Will and are not the spouses of individuals receiving anything under you Will.

Changes – if extensive, make a new Will that begins with a clause stating that it revokes all previous wills and codicils

Probate – if an Estate's value is over \$25,000, it must be probated before the assets can be distributed. If an Estate's value is \$25,000 or less, there are no probate fees.
