Minister's Message:

This month we are having a tremendous celebration, on January 21st Southminster will officially become an Affirming ministry.



Our Affirming journey began in the fall of 2021, shortly after we had returned back to in-person worship during the COVID-19 pandemic. Fran Hiscocks spoke with me following worship on a Sunday, and asked how we might better tell others in Lethbridge of our church's inclusion of 2SLGBTQIA+ people. I responded that within the United Church, this is typically done by being designated an Affirming ministry by the national network, Affirm United. Fran wrote a letter to Church Council requesting that becoming an Affirming ministry be on the agenda at the next annual congregational meeting.

The Affirming process encouraged us to think about how we can offer a welcome that is Public, Intentional, and Explicit (PIE), of not only the 2SLGBTQIA+ community, but also inclusive of those with physical and mental disabilities. To go further than just welcoming people of every race and ethnicity, but to become an anti-racist church. To embrace people of different family compositions, different levels of physical and mental health, or different economic classes than ourselves, adopting all of these values officially with a congregational vote last spring.

Affirm United advises that the minister remain fairly hands off throughout the process, and that the process be driven by the lay members of the congregation. Therefore, I wish to offer thanks to the members of the Affirming Committee: Hilary Squires (chair), Gabrielle Dumont, Amy Dodic, and Sheila Hollihan, for their diligent work shepherding us through the official Affirming process.

Indeed, this will be a major milestone for Southminster, but in addition to being a church where people are welcomed no matter who they love, and welcomed to be exactly the way God has made them. We shall continue to remain a church where, first and foremost, we seek to know Christ, and to make Christ known.

Happy New Year to you and your families. May 2024 bring you prosperity, peace, and good health.

So coming in to town is a switch to a different hat, as well. The visits and a great blessing of Rev. Taylor who has modeled and taught me so much. It is amazing the heart he has and he makes it all look easy, he is a blessing. I made a small joke to one lady who had to answer curious neighbours why she had not one- but two ministers, visit within days.

My 6 months also allowed me to deepen my comfort and I have been able to grow and explore worship and service beyond school scenarios. The opportunity to lead small group Bible study was challenging, and enlighting, as I recognized the Holy Spirit's voice and presence in the way the topic and local current events unfolded, unexpectedly, informing our discussions, and I wish many blessings to those who stuck with me. As Southminster has continued its path to affirming ministry the timing and discussion as well as observing the commitment and love behind our decision will help me tremendously as we all as the United Church of Canada, continue to work not only for our church but out in the world as well. Thank you.

As I start my new position I am so proud to carry with me the new relationships we have with the Anglican and ecumenical ladies ministerial group that is gathering from all southern AB. Some which you will be blessed to have carry on next year, as both Rev. Taylor and Rev. Gillian Breckenridge would like to continue the Longest Night as a shared event with St. Augustine's. I have had an easier time being introduced and learning the various faith communities in Lethbridge and southern AB which is a relief to bring into new ministry with Prairie Spirit Pastoral Charge.

Working through to the end, until our time of



Group Fitness Class for all fitness levels, ages and genders. Our awesome instructor Victoria keeps us challenged according to the individual fitness level and ability.




January classes will run on Fridays **January 12/19/26** and continue every week in February

Church Manses (Part 2)

Further research into church annals, has discovered the existence of other church manses. We go back to the late 1880s to the first dwelling belonging to the Knox Presbyterian Church. This manse was located on 8th St. S and housed the McKillop family from 1888 until 1907.



The church manse for the Knox United Church was another example. It is interesting to note that the ministers of Knox United used the manse closest to them which was at 1210 4 Ave. South [see December article].



For the Wesley Ministers, they used the small dwelling directly north of the church where Southminster Hall & the parking lot is today. Unfortunately, there is not much history regarding this dwelling. As you can see by the

image, it is sandwiched between Southminster and Trimbles Tire Company. The address was 320-11 Street South, and it was the abode for Reverends Cobbledick 1914; Cragg 1918; Pearson 1925 & McMinn until 1935. It was sold in the late 1930s, and the first owner was Christensen Brothers, Parley and M.E. who were Funeral Directors. They stayed at that location until 1946 when they moved across the alley to their own building at 327-10 Street.

Another building that as purchased by the United Church was at 1106-5th Avenue South. It was one of four dwellings discussed in a meeting of the Board of Stewards in March 1951. The manse committee's report indicated the house wa in excellent repair with a garage and good grounds. Its



location was one block from the church on 5th Avenue and next door to the east of the old Spudnut Shop. This small house was built in 1909, a two-storey abode with a hip roof style. There were four rooms on each floor plus living room, dining room, kitchen, and a full basement.



One of the last manses belonging to the church was a little further away than the others. The address was 526-26th Street South. This dwelling was used in the late 1950s and well into the 1960s. It had four bedrooms, the

third bedroom had a fireplace and the fourth bedroom was in the basement. There were living and dining rooms, a kitchen, recreation room and a den, front, and back halls. There was a telephone table and chair in the hallway. The manse committee kept a record of replacement carpets, furniture, kitchen appliances and painting. Residents were Dr. Frame and family and Reverend O'Neil and family.

Members of the Manse Committee were Mrs. E.C. Millar, Mrs. George McKillop, Mrs. Ken Thompson, Mrs. C. Ott, and chairperson Margaret Sutherland.

The dwelling was sold in 1966 after renovations were completed.



Many necessary expenses have gone up considerably and – sadly – there are not as many of us members remaining to help cover those costs. Your Stewardship committee is meeting to address the issues that we see ahead of us. We hope to come up with some innovative ideas and ways

to keep our funds coming in so our heat can remain on through the coldest months of the year – and the air conditioner for our anticipated hotter than usual summer.

Perhaps, now is the time for each of you – Members of our Southminster Family – to make some plans for the coming months in your own Spiritual Life Journey – through our doors and beyond. Many of you have already signed up for Pre-Authorized donations. These can be set up – or changed - at any time through the ladies in the office. One thing to note, however, is that these banking instructions result in "first of the month" transactions. We are now taking direct deposit donations through the "Canada Helps" application on our updated website. Debit & Credit cards can be used at the office (credit cards by phone) for special occasions. And, Of Course, numbered envelopes are available for your weekly donations of cash or cheques which can be placed in our collection plates on Sunday mornings. If you do not have a set of envelopes – but would like one – please just stop by the office to receive yours – along with a big Smile.
