LOTTIE THOMPSON AND THE WMS/UCW

I have been cataloguing the **United Church Women** material over the summer and will devote the first few fall articles to past members.

Charlotte Ellen Bridge Thompson was born in Cle Elum, Washington State in 1892. She met a young farmer in Naches, Washington and they married in 1913. Lottie, Marion and their four children came to Canada in 1920 and farmed two miles south of Coaldale.

In this small southern Alberta town, Lottie found her niche in the church as a C.G.I.T. leader and member of the Ladies Aid and Women's Association.

The Thompsons retired from farm life in 1945 and made their home in Lethbridge where they transferred their membership to Southminster Church and Lottie joined their missionary group in January 1950.

The Women's Missionary Society assisted the church in its missionary work. Their aid enabled missionaries to be sent to various countries throughout the world. These missionaries, as well as teaching Christianity were also teachers or medical professionals who helped better the lives of many third world people.

The eleven years spent working with the Missionary Society were fulfilling for Lottie. She rose from member, to officer, to vice president in 1959 and to president in January 1960. During that time, she offered her assistance in the monthly meetings by sharing the devotionals and reviewing their study book material. There was always time to serve on various committees such as Christian Stewardship and Citizenship and the Associated Helpers Committee.

Lottie used her elocution skills to give talks on Mexico and various individuals of note. At one meeting in May of 1958, the theme being Mother's Day, Lottie, and her daughter Betty (who had joined the Missionary Society in 1957), shared the meeting's agenda.

When the WMS and WA joined forces to become the **United Church Women**, Lottie carried her membership over and was involved with **Mrs. Reagh group and Alma Buchanan Unit**.

Lottie passed away in April 1963 and she is fondly remembered for her spirit of kindness and goodwill towards others.



National Indigenous Spiritual Gathering in Edmonton on July 30, 2023

Our Strong Voices

The National Indigenous Church Council that convened after three long years was a wonder of the new and exciting, one of my many first to come. Not only did we get to hear awesome speakers like our Moderator, the Right Reverend Dr. Carmen Lansdowne sharing her vision and enthusiasm, but also Reverend Michael Blair (general secretary to the UCC) led the panel discussion on the work with the recovery of the gravesites.

Reverend Murray Pruden addressed Reverend John Thompson as he ends his long and fruitful time leading the United Church of Canada's National Indigenous Council (NIC) and the vote in favour of a self-determining Indigenous church. He leaves us all with some very big shoes to fill. His vision will continue with the practical work to bring the decisions to life.

The lineup of breakout sessions, training, soul-satisfying drumming and song with the Sacred Fire was an amazing learning experience. As we shared with our brothers and. sisters from all over Canada, the multitude of ideas sparked so many great discussions: beginning with suicide prevention, the inner workings of Jordan's principal in the practicalities of kids in need, and the continuing work for the missing children.

The panel recognized how the efforts of our executive - since the first breaking news of the discoveries of children's remains at residential schools, to the present - have been exemplary. Being able to hold that space for discussion is a great illustration of pastoral intention. The deep sorrow of respect, demonstrated for all of us the great need; taking care of all to whom the recovery of the children has had so much impact, and continues to do so.

The Sacred fire holds God, our Creator and the Holy Child and the Holy Spirit, ever present within the smoke and the flames. The prayers that rise, our cries and petitions, and the hopes of all; whether whispers of prayers, or shouts of laughter and joy, we are called to enter Pentecost once again. The Trinity of God, the love and beloved, which we enter that which feeds us.

It is my hope that the enthusiasm and motivation of such events, the anticipation of all that is new when we live in Christ, will be with us as we enter the new church year, and for all our years.

Both the National Day for Truth and Reconciliation and Orange Shirt Day take place on September 30.

Orange Shirt Day is an Indigenous-led grassroots commemorative day intended to raise awareness of the individual, family and community inter-generational impacts of residential schools, and to promote the concept of "Every Child Matters". The orange shirt is a symbol of the stripping away of culture, freedom and self-esteem experienced by Indigenous children over generations.

On September 30, all Canadians are encouraged to wear orange to honour the thousands of Survivors of residential schools.
