

## The Month of April

As I look through my photos to add to this month's newsletter I realize that it's not that crazy that we feel a little tired! In the past few weeks, we led our second international recon to Botswana and Namibia for 10 days, got back to base where we are now managing about 15 expedition leaders at a time, managing our house getting built, a new expedition building, expedition equipment and trucks, logistics and prep for about 20 expeditions to go out between May-August, and working with our local ministry partners (translators). We also went out for a few days to prepare villages in Mosukotwane for the AMT expeditions in May, Trent went with 7 other guys to Namibia to pick up 6 new Overland Missions trucks for future expeditions, then we left the day after he returned for the Kids on Fire expedition! Whew!

Trent and I have a saying that "it just takes 3 days". In all of our travels we've realized it usually takes us 3 days to adjust to a new country, overcome jet-lag, or just overall feel well rested mentally, spiritually, and physically. Usually if we let ourselves sleep in and take more time than that... we find we don't end up truly adjusting. We honestly do transition fast and can jump back into our daily habits, wake up times, work out routines, eating choices, etc. quickly and we feel ready for our next adventure that God has lined up for us. So, we definitely feel tired at the moment as we just returned from the Kids on Fire expedition... but... it just takes 3 days! (: and we definitely have that. The next 2 weeks we will be on base focusing on logistics, being in morning worship every day, and eating breakfast/lunch/dinner with the other 60+ missionaries on base at the moment! Life on base does have more of a 9-5pm "work day" flow and we have plenty of fun, bonfires (which here we call a Braai), and rest at the end of the days ahead.


- That the work team on our house would finish with excellence and speed.

- Open hearts of those in the Mosukotwane villages we will be going to with the Advanced Mission Trainings Students (AMT)



It was amazing how God perfectly brought Lilly and our team together.









Kids on Fire is a ministry for Zambian children to learn about God, grow in their relationship with Jesus, and be discipled. It has been running for almost 10 years.

The Kids on Fire expedition brought out 30 of the Zambian kids, 7 of their KOF teachers, 7 expedition leaders, and a handful of other sector staff to minister the Gospel. We help with the logistics and go home to home with them, but they do all of the talking! They boldly shared the Gospel using the wordless book, prayed for people, and saw many healed and delivered! They also do kids ministry every day and have their own skits prepared.

This expedition was a blast, and incredible to see the growth and boldness of each kid!
