

HEALTHCARE HAPPENINGS

A Study on the Measles Virus

Have you ever watched a movie in which the character wakes up from a coma and asks, "where am I?" Until today, this statement only existed in cinemas and in cases of brain trauma. However, recently certain discoveries have shown that the measles virus can cause the human immune system to say the same thing – "where am I?" Recent discoveries show that after someone is cured of the measles virus their immune system forgets close to 40 of the previous antibodies that it had developed.

Antibody Creation in the Human Body

The immune system is the body's defense mechanism against infection. Like security guards, the immune system recognizes invaders and gets rid of them. The immune system consists of different cell and protein types that work together to remove antigens (foreign substances), like viruses or bacteria, from the body. White blood cells called lymphocytes recognize these antigens and produce a protein called an antibody that has a unique shape that specifically binds to that antigen. Once the body has antibodies for a foreign substance, memory cells are created, so that if the same pathogen enters the body again, the immune system can recognize and destroy it before it is able to make someone sick again. This system of memory cells is why once someone has a disease, they typically do not get it again.

The Concerning thing about Measles

After patients are cured of the measles, doctors have begun to notice that they tend to get other illnesses like the flu and cough. Researchers have found that measles causes something called immune system amnesia. The way in which you forget the math that you learnt last year after summer break, measles causes the immune system to forget the antibodies that it has developed for other diseases.

This immune system amnesia is dangerous as it leaves people susceptible to diseases that they had previously built an immunity against, meaning many patients die after getting measles rather than measles itself, due to a weakened immune system.

Doctors over the past few years have been dedicating their time to ensuring that every single person across the world is vaccinated for measles. Most children receive two doses of the vaccine MMR during the first two years of their life. This vaccine protects them against Measles, Mumps, and Rubella. While measles vaccinations have shown to decrease deaths, we have not been able to completely eradicate (get rid of) the disease. A vaccine works by training the human immune system to recognize and develop antibodies the pathogens of a specific disease, without actually infecting the body with the disease. To do this, certain molecules from the pathogen must be introduced into the body to trigger the production of antibodies. Sometimes these molecules are a weakened or dead version of the virus. The introduction of these bodies of pathogens is what vaccines do.

These vaccines were nonexistent in the 1950's when about 4 million Americans contracted measles deadly disease and close to 500 people died from it. This epidemic sparked vaccine development with widespread administration going out in 1963.

In order to help yourself and the people around you it is suggested by the CDC that all parents vaccinate their children for the measles virus.




