D-DAY Remembered 2019

Today is the 75th anniversary of D-Day. In the hour this morning as I write this letter, thousands of our troops have already died. Many of these troops had never before left their hometowns, let alone their state and now they are landing on a beach thousands of miles from home. They were our fathers, brothers, uncles, cousin and husbands. In that group of brave men that jumped from landing craft into waist and chest high waters were 18-20 year olds that had two thoughts in their minds; staying alive and getting to the enemy. There were no designated safe places to avoid confrontation. There were no pets to soothe their anxiety. They were men that day and the country could not have been more proud and sad for their sacrifice. Many would not come home. Many would come home and had to live with disabilities. Many never ever talked about their ordeals, some did as their life was coming to an end.

Those that survived the war in both Europe and Japan bore the memories of the horror of war and went on to build this great country to the industrial success that America enjoys today. We owe them a lot. Without their grit, determination and ingenuity we would not have become the country that beckons everyone. Now there are very few of these brave men, and women, left from the Greatest Generation, as Tom Brokaw named them. Having talked to several of these men over the years their greatest fear was that it was all for naught. They watched the decaying of our moral fabric, the loss of respect for elders, the trashing of our country's values.

I am of the Vietnam era and watched as US Citizens spat at our soldiers, as the likes of John Kerry and Jane Fonda dissed our soldiers and our country with their actions and words. Many of my generation fought each other in the streets to protest the war, but war protestors aimed their venom at the soldier and sailors who did their duty. Let me be clear, I enlisted in the Marines to fight the enemy, but I also think Robert McNamara has the blood of many of the Vietnam military on his hands.

America was going to church, saying "God Bless America" in school was not viewed as a crime, going to a major league sports event was not a political affair. Yes we had contention with Civil Rights and it was dealt with and we are still dealing with it. Southern Democrats created Jim Crowe laws that hurt many people. But, this country went on to elect a black president. This country has dealt with a lot of obstacles, but we dealt with them as a country. Today, sadly, we do not.
