
To be a mission-driven agency that is comprehensive, progressive, risk-driven, integrated, collaborative, coordinated, flexible, and professional.

# PUBLIC INFORMATION & WARNING


PCEMA boasts a robust public information support and warning capability with formally trained staff as public information officers. The agency is also a participant in the Alert Iowa System, the statewide alerting platform for emergencies, disasters, and threats.

Along with basic information operations supporting local jurisdictions during incidents such as infrastructure disruptions, PCEMA is an activating authority for the statewide system as well as national alerting platforms.

## **PREPAREDNESS**



Preparedness is an integral part of the emergency management program, whether internally with stakeholders or externally with the public. Prepared communities are resilient communities and no response scenario is effective without a trained, coordinated conglomerate of partners and stakeholders.

Additionally, the agency participated in a multi-day exercise with state and county emergency management programs as part of the National Guard Bureau's "Vigilant Guard" exercise program.
