Federal Government Budget & Policy Changes

For several years, CCEDNet has been working to achieve changes in the Government of Canada's programs and policies for employment and training. Many of our members were negatively impacted by changes at HRSDC and Service Canada which created administrative burdens and barriers to achieving effective employment outcomes in communities.

VOLUNTARY SECTOR ADVISORY COMMITTEE

As a result of this work, a voluntary sector advisory committee to the Minister of HRSDC has been established which seeks to address these issues and make the appropriate changes. Both CCEDNet's president and executive director have been appointed to this committee. The advisory committee has now made a submission to the federal government's '*Blue Ribbon Panel on Grants and Contributions'*. It reflects many of CCEDNet's concerns with human capital development and funding for CED.

FINAL REPORT

The Pan-Canadian Community Development Learning Network, CCEDNet's 2.5 year action research project on the links between social inclusion and community economic development, is now complete. The final report is available for download <u>here.</u>

Partnering with The University of Victoria's BC Institute of Cooperative Studies, CCEDNet is the co-lead of the National Research Program on the Social Economy, funded by the Social Science and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC). Advancing a CED Approach to Human Capital Development in Ontario

BACKGROUND:

In 2001, the National Policy Framework developed by CCEDNet and its membership identified a series of recommendations around social, financial and human capital development. In its 2003 <u>report</u>, *Human Capital Development- Closing the Gaps*, CCEDNet concludes that many Canadians who experience labour market vulnerability are unable to access the government-supported human capital development services they require. It therefore proposes a series of recommendations that would ensure that more Canadians are able to access the support they need by expanding access to human capital development services using integrated, community based models.

TELE-LEARNING SESSIONS:

In December 2005, Canada and Ontario signed a Labor Market Development Agreement. One year later, the time was ripe for CED practitioners get an update on the status of the LMDA. CCEDNet Ontario organized a tele-learning session on the topic, and thirty people from across the province heard Barbara Simmons, Manager of the Transition Management Office at the Ministry of Trades, Colleges and Universities provide an update on the transfer of employment programs to the province. Jennifer Liptrot of A Commitment to Employment for Women, then spoke of the role that community stakeholders are playing in overseeing the LMDA in the province.

The <u>powerpoint presentations</u> and other background information on the LMDA will be available shortly on the CCEDNet website.

This tele-learning session on the LMDA was the first in a series of six sessions with topics of interest to CED practitioners which will take place between September 06 and June 07. Three of those sessions will be in English and three will be in French. The French sessions are being coordinated in partnership with Économie solidaire de l'Ontario, a francophone network of CED, social and solidarity economy initiatives across the province.

Tools for Humanity: Member Spotlight



Tools for Humanity Helps to break the cycle of poverty.



The Multicultural Economic, Training and Resources in Ontario (METRO) project is a small grassroots initiative of the Somali community. It is a community learning network. From summer 2005 to 2006, the project explored how a co-op can help the life of the ordinary Somali in Toronto. For the last 15-20 years in Ontario, the majority of the Somali community have been in the cycle of poverty.

"It is our experience, that despite getting Canadian education and training or accreditation in our field, that our community continues to live in the cycle of poverty," says Mohamed Maie, community trainer for METRO.
