

Moving With Dogs



Moving with dogs can be a bit stressful, but here are some tips and tricks to make the process smoother for you and your furry friend

- 9. Reestablish Routine: Set up your dog's belongings, such as their bed and food bowls, in familiar locations to help them feel more at home. This might be putting their crate in the kitchen at the new house if the dog was in their crate in the kitchen at their old house.
- 10. Patience and Reassurance: Be patient with your dog as they adjust to their new surroundings and provide plenty of reassurance and affection during the transition.
- 11. Veterinary Records: Ensure you have copies of your dog's veterinary records, including vaccination history, in case you need them in the new area. Keep this in your moving binder if you have one.

- 14. Behavioral Support: If your dog experiences anxiety or behavioral issues during the move, consider consulting with a veterinarian or professional dog trainer for guidance.
- 15. Exploration Time: Allow your dog plenty of time to explore the new surroundings outside on walks and outings, gradually expanding their territory as they become more comfortable.
- 16. Secure Yard: If you have a yard in your new home, make sure it's securely fenced to prevent your dog from wandering off in unfamiliar territory or keep other animals from attacking your dog.
- 17. Socialization Opportunities: Seek out local dog parks or pet-friendly events in the area to help your dog socialize and make new friends. Check out "Next Door" or "Facebook" to get connected to dog park locations and dog owner meetups.
