

Introduction

All staff members, judges, and vendors should use the New Hampshire Judicial Branch name, seals, and branding properly and consistently. Uniformity in presentation will maximize the awareness of our name and ensure proper recognition of our initiatives.

This guide provides an overview of the NHJB's visual identity as well as guidelines on using the key graphic elements of that identity: the seals, colors, and preferred typefaces.

Refer to these guidelines whenever using any element of the NHJB name or seals.

Colors

The consistent and exact use of New Hampshire Judicial Branch colors, particularly with respect to the logo and seal, is an important aspect of our institutional identity. When reproducing in different mediums and for different applications, every effort should be made to adhere to our color standards.

The Judicial Branch has a palette of colors that work well together and are used in our collateral materials. To accurately reproduce the colors in print, use the appropriate Pantone® Matching System (PMS) swatches as shown below. Hex colors and RGB breakouts are also listed for web publications.

Seals

New Hampshire Judicial Branch Seal

The New Hampshire Judicial Branch seal is available in black and white options, gold, and blue and gold. Please do not alter any element within the logo. The logo should be used on all letterhead, publications, signs, and web pages that are NHJB wide.







Supreme Court Seal

The Supreme Court Seal is reserved for publications and correspondence from the New Hampshire Supreme Court. It should be used only for materials that are specific to the Supreme Court. It is available in black and white only.



Typography

Times New Roman is the main typeface used for Judicial Branch news releases and many publications. This classic typeface was chosen for its universal quality and readability.

We use **Helvetica** as a sans serif secondary typeface, most often in headlines and sub-heads, in print publications.

Bookman is the alternate typeface used by the Judicial Branch most prominently in Supreme Court correspondence and email, and as a third-level subhead in complex documents. It is also used in all orders and opinions issued by the Supreme Court.
