Jody Martin was our guest artist.

- Daniel Greene influenced her to study portraiture.
- She starts painting with hard pastels.
- Uses Cretacolor in early stages. These are hard, lightfast pastels.
- Other pastels she used: Great American's Daniel Greene portrait set.
- Terry Ludwig - essential grays and cool greens.
- Start with a stick barely darker than the background - this makes correcting easier.
- Uses Premier Pastel Paper, Pastel Premier Board and Uart paper.
- She discussed how to draw the head. Dividing it into thirds and how to make reference lines to create an accurate picture.
- She blocks in the shadows. She starts darker than the reference and makes it lighter as she develops the painting. Lights are then painted, and lightened as the painting develops.
- She creates depth in areas by starting with the complement of the local color.
- When painting eyes, she colors the whites with a darker color (medium gray).
- She makes the pupil and iris a little bigger, and then carves into the area.
- Establishes the background color early because this affects colors of the subject.

- Use the subject's colors in the background to create harmony.
- She uses straight angular lines drawing the face because this technique makes the finished product more interesting.
- Tips for coloring face:
  - Top third has a purplish cast to it.
  - Middle area (nose and cheeks) reddish cast.
  - Below the nose a greenish cast.
- She checks proportions throughout the painting process.
- Even if the neck appears lighter than the face, make the neck darker than the face. Forward objects (face) are lighter than objects further behind it (neck).
- On the edge of the shadow put a medium pastel color.
- She likes to dip a fan brush in alcohol, and brushes the painting lightly to create a loose and interesting texture.
