

Notes And Helps to Instructors

Thank you for volunteering to lead a group through the treasures of God's word! You may feel overwhelmed or inadequate, but you can do this! The leader notes are designed to help you grow in knowledge and love for Christ and for you to help pass what you have received to your group. Here are some suggestions to help equip you to grow in your teaching and leading ability.

- These lessons could simply be read, and a group would receive something but that is not how they are designed. The notes are designed to grow you as a leader so you might tailor the lesson for the needs of your group. Some groups may not have much of a knowledge base in the bible, so the concepts must be brought down to their level. Other groups may have a large knowledge base and you may challenge them with more information. The key is to know your group. If you begin leading a group in one way and find that it is not connecting, it is alright to modify and bring down or raise up the level of information.
- The more preparation you do the stronger you will be as a leader. Let the study material be a joy for you! Let it feed you as you prepare! The more you are fed the more you have to give to your group.
- There is no set time on how long a lesson may take. Lessons could be slowed down and take several weeks to finish. Perhaps in leading a group, one question captivates the group and leads to a fruitful conversation. If that happens, that is good! You are in no hurry. If you can finish the material in a week, then great! But if it takes several, that is great as well! The important thing is that they receive deeply from the gospel of Jesus.
- Pray about your lesson! Pray as you prepare! Pray as you teach! Remember we do not teach or exercise our gifts in our own strength. The Holy Spirit is the one who opens the heart and mind. Pray for the Spirit to move in your heart and the heart of the group.

May our merciful Triune God bless your study and your group that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith-- that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may have strength to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.

Lessons in Salvation -- Lesson 5 "What Is Repentance? Why Is It Important?"

Introduction:

The Westminster Shorter Catechism says this about repentance:

Question 87 What is repentance unto life?

Answer: Repentance until life is a saving grace, whereby a sinner, out of true sense of his sin, and apprehension of the mercy of God in Christ, doth, with grief and hatred of his sin, turn from it unto God with full purpose of, and endeavor after, new obedience.

Read these passages at least five times then answer the questions as best you can:

- 17 From that time Jesus began to preach and to say, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." (Mat 4:17 NKJ)
- ³⁰ And their scribes and the Pharisees complained against His disciples, saying, "Why do You eat and drink with tax collectors and sinners?" ³¹ Jesus answered and said to them, "Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. ³² "I have not come to call *the* righteous, but sinners, to repentance." (Luk 5:30-32 NKJ)
- ¹⁰ For godly sorrow produces repentance *leading* to salvation, not to be regretted; but the sorrow of the world produces death. (2Co 7:10 NKJ)
- 8 If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. 9 If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. (1Jo 1:8-9 NKJ)

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Read these passages at least five times then answer the questions as best you can:

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From reading these passages, define "repent" or "repentance."

Mark 4:17, tells us that we are to repent for the kingdom of heaven is at hand.

Luke 5:30-32, tells us that Jesus came to call sinners to repentance.

2 Cor 7:10, tells us that godly sorrow for our sins produces repentance and that leads to salvation.

1 John 1:9, tells us that if we confess our sins Jesus is faithful and just to forgive us.

So, If we put together what is said here, "Repentance is recognizing that we are sinners and have sinned, knowing that Jesus is faithful and just to forgive our sins when we confess them to him, to confess them with godly sorrow, so that we might enter into the kingdom of God."

See the above question and answer from the Westminster Shorter Catechism 87. Notice how these passages tell us very much the same thing.

Why did Jesus call men to repentance?

First and foremost, it is because Jesus is loving and kind. Rom 2:4 says, "Or do you presume on the riches of his kindness and forbearance and patience, not knowing that God's kindness is meant to lead you to repentance?" His love is so great for his people that he is not



willing to lose any of his people as told us in 2 Peter 3:9, "The Lord is. not slow to fulfill his promise as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing that any should perish, but that all should reach repentance." Luke 15:7 tells us Jesus has joy in his people repenting, "Just so, I tell you, there will be more joy in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who need no repentance." So Jesus calls us to repentance because he loves us, will not lose his people, and it fills him with joy

Second, he knows it is our sins that have separated the human race from God. Sin must be dealt with and has in the person of Christ. Repentance is a response of faith to Christ. We are saved by faith alone. Repentance is the breath of someone who knows their sins, knows the holiness of God, and has their faith in him as the only one who can save them from their sins.

Third, Martin Luther once said, "When our Lord and Master Jesus Christ said, "Repent" (Mt 4:17), he willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance." We are sinners and until we die or Christ returns, we will always have areas of sin in our life and heart. Sin separates us from the fullness of fellowship with Jesus. Repentance restores that relationship and fellowship that we might feel his love in greater ways, have more to fuel for our worship and thanksgiving to him, realize more that we do not stand on our own power but by the Spirit, long for heaven and deeper fellowship with him, and many other reasons that perhaps you or your class might think of.

What is the required to enter the Kingdom of God?

Repentance is required to enter the kingdom of God.

What kind of people did Jesus spend time with? Why did He do that?

He spent time with tax collectors and sinners. He spent time with those who know they are sinners because it is they who can hear the good news. The good news of the gospel is not good news unless you know the bad news. The bad news is that you are a sinner and deserve an eternal hell for your sins against an eternal holy God. The good news of the gospel when we come to Christ in repentance and faith our sins are forgiven, and we are welcomed into his kingdom as his people. That is not good news to those who do not know they are sinners. We must realize our sin before Jesus becomes precious.

Define false repentance. What does it look like? What are its results?

2 Cor 7:10 tells us, "For godly sorrow produces repentance leading to salvation, not to be regretted; but the sorrow of the world produces death." There is in this text a difference between worldly sorrow and godly repentance. The difference is that worldly repentance has to do with the consequences of our sins and the worldly affect of those sins in our lives. For example, one might have sinned against his wife and is full of regret for the change in situation in that relationship, but all the thoughts he has are about the worldly affects that sin has caused (e.g.,



how can I get her to return to me? How can I have peace in my home again? This home is so uncomfortable now so how do I repair that distance? Etc.) A great example is in the life of Judas. (Matt 27:1-8) Judas betrayed Christ for 30 pieces of silver. But when he saw that Jesus was put on trial, he returned to the Pharisees, and he tried to return the money. He was not repentant for his sins against God but had worldly regret. Jesus is now going on trial, and he is losing his ability to steal money and perhaps if Jesus became King in earthly Judea, a nice position in his kingdom rule. Godly sorrow is concerned about consequences in our worldly existence, not seeing our sins as first and primary sins against a holy God and how our sins hurts our fellowship with Him and apprehension of His love.

In contrast, Godly sorrow deals with the earthly affects sin has caused. But is pointed towards God as the one our sin has ultimately offended. The prime example of this can be seen with King David in Psalm 51. David committed the sin of rape and murder (2 Sam 11). He had thought he got away with it, until Nathan the prophet came to him and told him that his sin was not hidden from God (2 Sam 12). Psalm 51 is his cry of repentance to God. He says that in Psalm 51.

1 Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love; according to your abundant mercy blot out my transgressions.

He asks for mercy according to the love that God has for him. In other words, he apprehended the mercy of God and his kindness led him to repentance

2 Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse me from my sin!

He asks for God to was him as he knows that nothing else could forgive him of his sin. Especially since under the law, there was no forgiveness for his sins. He needed a mercy that came from outside the law. According to the law, he was a dead man, and he knew it.

3 For I know my transgressions, and my sin is ever before me.
4 Against you, you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight, so that you may be justified in your words and blameless in your judgment.

He knows that God sees all things and God knows his sin, even the sin secret in his heart. And he knows that although he sinned greatly against Bathsheba and Uriah, ultimately, his sin was against God.

5 Behold, I was brought forth in iniquity, and in sin did my mother conceive me.



He knows that he is a sinner by heart. He knows he does not need behavioral modification; he needs cleansing of his very heart. He knows that it is out of his heart that his sin comes forth (Mark 7:14-23).

6 Behold, you delight in truth in the inward being, and you teach me wisdom in the secret heart.
7 Purge me with hyssop, and I shall be clean; wash me, and I shall be whiter than snow.
8 Let me hear joy and gladness; let the bones that you have broken rejoice.
9 Hide your face from my sins, and blot out all my iniquities.
10 Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit within me.
11 Cast me not away from your presence, and take not your Holy Spirit from me.
12 Restore to me the joy of your salvation, and uphold me with a willing spirit.

He longs for restored fellowship with God. He longs for that restoration more than anything else.

13 Then I will teach transgressors your ways, and sinners will return to you. 14 Deliver me from bloodguiltiness, O God, O God of my salvation, and my tongue will sing aloud of your righteousness. 15 O Lord, open my lips, and my mouth will declare your praise.

He wants to be able to praise God for his goodness. He knows that every time we repent for our sins, we add more fuel—we add one more log to the fire—of our praise to God and our thankfulness to him. Repentance helps us see his love and kindness to us, and we then are able to grow in our love to Him.

16 For you will not delight in sacrifice, or I would give it; you will not be pleased with a burnt offering.
17 The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit; a broken and contrite heart, O God, you will not despise.

God delights in a broken heart of sin towards him. He delights when we know that He is our only salvation. We cannot enter into his courts without knowing our sin and his holiness. Christ is our final sacrifice; there are no more offerings to give. What we give is our heart broken by sin and rejoicing in the saving work of Christ. When we come to God in repentance, we breath out the truth of the gospel. Jesus saves sinners. So when we remind ourselves and Jesus that we are sinners and repent to him, we remind our hearts that Jesus died for us.



18 Do good to Zion in your good pleasure; build up the walls of Jerusalem; 19 then will you delight in right sacrifices, in burnt offerings and whole burnt offerings; then bulls will be offered on your altar.

When a man repents and turns to Christ, does he live a perfect life? Explain.

No, we will always have sin in our hearts; and therefore, cannot live a perfect life in this world. We never out-grow our need for grace in this life and so never out-grow our need for repentance. Repentance is a turning away from sin to God with full purpose and endeavor after new obedience. It is a desire to walk away, not never, ever struggling with or falling to that sin again. True repentance is not perfect repentance just like true faith is not perfect faith.



Appendix on Repentance

Westminster Shorter Catechism

84. What doth every sin deserve?

Answer: Every sin deserveth God's wrath and curse, both in this life, and that which is to come. See also: WLC 152

God grants repentance

Acts 11:18

¹⁸ When they heard these things they became silent; and they glorified God, saying, "Then God has also granted to the Gentiles repentance to life." (Acts 11:18 NKJ)

2 Timothy 2:25

²⁴ And a servant of the Lord must not quarrel but be gentle to all, able to teach, patient, ²⁵ in humility correcting those who are in opposition, if God perhaps will grant them repentance, so that they may know the truth, ²⁶ and *that* they may come to their senses *and escape* the snare of the devil, having been taken captive by him to *do* his will. (2 Tim. 2:24-26 NKJ)

Justification by Faith Alone Romans 4:3-5

- ³ For what does the Scripture say? "Abraham believed God, and it was accounted to him for righteousness."

Ordo Salutis (Order of Salvation –Romans 8:29ff)

- Logical order not temporal order

Responsibility of all men to repent
