Log schoolhouse reconstruction on schedule for November 15 inauguration



Continuing with the reconstruction photographs in the BGHS News--September/October 2022 issue, these new ones show (at top left and center) walls and roof rafters in place on September 30 (**the center roof rafter is an 1837 log**); in upper photograph at right, roof sheathing is set on October 4; lower left photograph shows window frame on October 7, and photographs at lower center and right on October 17 reveal the beginning of boardwalk connection to Letourneau Home/Museum boardwalk and roofing barrier for the shake shingles—note the stones covering foundation.



Who am I?

Before the log schoolhouse closed in 1848, it had become a meeting place for circuit riders. The first quarterly meeting was held at the school house in January 1842. Bourbonnais Grove then became part of the six-week circuit the following year with me beginning my missionary ministry at Bourbonnais Grove in 1843. Who am I, and what is my religious faith?
