August Speaker: Dr. August "Gus" Costa

The Nighthawk Bison Jump (41BI564/41BI565):

Initial results from the 2022 Texas Tech Test Excavations in Caprock Canyon State Park

In 2021, THC Steward Rick Day and Susan Day located bison bones eroding out of a slope below the Caprock escarpment on the western border of Caprock Canyon State Park in Briscoe County. TAS fellow Chris Lintz in coordination with Tony Lyle, (regional TPWD archaeologist) launched a follow up reconnaissance and documented extensive bison bones in two locations: one directly below the Caprock cliff face (41BI564) and another 125 meters east (41BI565). The surfaces around these sites yielded abundant lithic chipping debris, burned rock and a handful of notched and stemmed dart points and arrowpoints. These sites were inferred to represent a Late Archaic to Late Prehistoric bison jump kill site and an adjacent processing site. Aside from Bonfire Shelter (41VV218, Val Verde county), this discovery represents the only bison jump in Texas and the broader southern plains. Realizing the significance of this

find and potential loss due to ongoing erosion, TPWD collaborated with Drs. Brett Houk and Tamra Walter at Texas Tech University to organize a field school to test and salvage a sample from the sites in the Fall of 2022. This talk will review the initial results of those field investigations and ongoing conservation and analysis of the bison remains.

Dr. August "Gus" Costa is an independent consulting archaeologist that provides specialist support in geoarchaeology, artifact analysis, and faunal analysis. Gus earned a doctorate focusing on paleoanthropology at Indiana University, where he was a Fulbright and Leakey Foundation fellow conducting expeditions to India supported by the National Science Foundation. His academic work in India focused on the earliest human occupation of South Asia. Gus led a field program in Gujarat that identified the most productive Ice Age fossil locality in western India and discovered a new species of extinct antelope as well as numerous prehistoric cultural remains. Gus has more than 20 years' experience in archeology and has carried out field and lab-based work in Asia, Africa, and Europe, as well as numerous projects within the U.S.

Gus is an adjunct lecturer at Rice University where he has taught courses in geoarchaeology, paleontology, paleotechnology, and Asian Prehistory. Gus has contributed to numerous cultural resource surveys and acted as a consulting geoarchaeologist and analyst for survey, testing and large data recovery projects. In the last five years Gus served in various staff and management roles including Principal Investigator and Vice President at Moore Archaeological Consulting, Inc. in Houston, Texas. In 2020, Gus shifted to independent consulting primarily in Geoarchaeology working for a variety of CRM firms in Texas and across the south.



Call for Papers

Abstracts and creative ideas are sought for papers, symposia, and posters to be presented at the TAS Annual Meeting. TAS encourages presentations by avocational, student, and professional members on any topic of archeological interest. According to current TAS policy, all presenters must be TAS members and be registered for the meeting.

Papers will be allotted 15 minutes. The final deadline for receipt of paper abstracts is August 18, 2023. Symposia may be organized around any topic, area, major project, and/or time period. Each symposium will be allotted two hours per five presenters, with a five-presenter minimum. Abstracts for symposia and symposium papers must be received by August 4, 2023.

Poster presentations can effectively convey visual, graphic, and quantitative information, and posters can reach a larger audience than oral papers. Members are encouraged to consider poster presentations as an alternative to papers. In order to appear in the program, poster abstracts must be received by August 18, 2023. Other presentation formats such as discussions, demonstrations, and hands-on workshops may be held on approval of the Program Co-Chairs and Annual Meeting organizers.

Submit all abstracts as Word files attached to an email (am-papers@txarch.org preferred), or by regular mail on CD or flash drive or in typed form. For email attachments or CD/flash drive submissions, include a text (.txt) file in addition to the word processor file; text files may be created by using the Save As command and selecting the text file type.
