

NTAS meets at 7:00 p.m. on the second Thursday of each month (except June and December) at the University of North Texas Health Science Center, 3500 Camp Bowie Boulevard, Fort Worth (in the Research and Education Building, Room 114), near the intersection of Camp Bowie and Montgomery Street.

Traveling west on I-30 from downtown, take the Montgomery Street exit. Turn right on Montgomery and continue to the five-way intersection at Camp Bowie. Turn right onto Camp Bowie, followed by an immediate left onto Clifton Street. Turn into the first parking lot on the left (Administrator and Visitor Parking). Richland College Collection and Anthropology Day Volunteers

In last month's newsletter, we shared information about working with two donated collections at Richland College. This is an opportunity to work with both lithics and ceramics. There are two donated collections that arrived just before the end of 2020 and right after. Both are lacking provenience but are interesting nonetheless.

The first consisted of several boxes of lithics donated by Brad Stroud, after his father, a long-time collector passed away, and these had sat in his garage. Mr. Stroud wished to donate these so that students would have an opportunity to handle and identify various types of stone debitage and possibly some tools. When asked about the location(s) where and when these were collected, he answered, "Central Texas over about twenty years." A cursory exam of the contents reveals that there are some bifaces, burins, and partial projectile points, as well as a large sample of cores, flakes, and some grinding/polished stones.

The second collection is from Caton County in New Mexico. The donor's family had visited a site over a span from about 1959 to the mid1970s . The collection includes several boxes of sherds, some burnt clay, wood, and some lithics. The site is reportedly on private property, and the family kept the more complete vessels

for their private collection. The couple, Marc Nowell and his wife, Elke Sheehan, wanted to donate the collection to a college so students may have a chance to see first-hand, and work with, Native American artifacts.

On November 19 and 20 some NTAS members visited the college and worked on the New Mexico material. This initial work consisted of listing, preliminary sorting and recording of all the pieces that were



still in boxes. Once this work is completed, our goal will be to organize some of the material into sets for learning activities – identification, perhaps temporarily fitting some sherd pieces together, and prepare some for presentation in the Richland Anthropology Lab to attract attention and pique student interest in the classes offered. A return trip is planned for January 21 & 22 (Friday and Saturday), 2022. Volunteers may work one or both days; no need to sign up for both. We had several members who worked both days this past November.

Gwen Durrant and Katrina Nuncio work on fitting a rim to a base. No sherds glue! But we did use some non-residue duct tape on a different pair of sherds to see what happens when we return and disassemble. Question: How might we have students fit sherds together without causing harm to the surface and/or decorative paint/slip?

An additional goal is to assist in preparing and to support an exhibit at the college February 17, 2022. For those not aware, this is officially declared *International Anthropology Day* (https:// nationaldaycalendar.com/world-anthropology-day-third-thursday-in-february/).

Some of you may recall a similar event at Richland some years ago, in which NTAS (then TCAS) members participated by setting up tables and presenting lecture-demonstrations. We hope to use some of the collections artifacts to showcase the Anthropology Program at Richland College as well as assisting with activities. This year we already have two members signed up to help. Ray Wallace will give a demonstration as to how his work with GIS connects with and supports archeology. Dylan Holubar has agreed to share his flint knapping skills to demonstrate how stone tools are made and used.

An email reminder with further instructions will be mailed out to those who have contacted with interest, as we get closer to the event.
