

NTAS Talk at Midwestern State University

On November 17 NTAS - President Jimmy Barrera delivered a guest lecture at Midwestern State University (MSU) in Wichita Falls. NTAS is fortunate to receive many requests each year for programs on archeology, and MSU specifically requested a lecture on archeology for their fall semester. The talk was focused on the 2004 Maya Research Program mapping and excavations centered on the ballcourt area at the Mayan site of Gran Cacao in northwestern Belize. About 30 folks attended the in person program. With lively dialog throughout. As with any program on Maya archeology, there was discussion and imagery of jaguars, monkeys, jade, pottery, glyphs, and sweat soaked archeologists in the rain forest.
