

February Speaker: Tim Sullivan



Bio: Dr. Tim Sullivan received his M.A. in Anthropology (Conservation Archeology) from SMU in 1976. After working as a CRM Archaeologist, before such a thing existed, he returned to graduate school (NTSU, now UNT) to earn 30 hours in Sociology, enabling him to obtain a teaching position at Cedar Valley College, part of the Dallas County Community College District. After years of teaching Sociology and Anthropology, he returned to school again in the 1990s to gain a Ph.D. in History, from UTA. He has taught as an adjunct lecturer in History at UTA, and Anthropology and Sociology at TCU. In 2011, he transferred to Richland College in north Dallas, where he is Lead Faculty and Coordinator of the Anthropology Department. A long standing member of the American Anthropological Association, the World History Association, and the Society for Anthropology in Community Colleges (SACC), as well as TAS, he is a past President of SACC and has presented papers at national and international conferences in both anthropology and history. He is currently working on the completion of ongoing research on the Little Egypt Project, with his History colleague, Dr. Clive Siegle.

Shift Happens

Abstract: In 1883, African American couple, Jeff and Hannah Hill, bought land in a relatively isolated area in North Texas. They established a community, that much later came to be known affectionately as "Little Egypt," after the Egyptian Chapel Baptist Church, the cornerstone on which the community was based. Over the ensuing decades, as Dallas began to grow, the settlement remained rural, in spite of the white suburbs expanding north and eventually surrounding it. The 1940s and 50s saw major shifts as Dallas grew, and the social unrest that was sweeping the nation had its impact on the local landscape. Meanwhile, Little Egypt continued as a rural, African American hamlet, much as it had been since its inception. In the early 1960s, still without running water, paved roads, or sewage, and sharing one electric and telephone line, Little Egypt was a virtual African American island, surrounded by Lake Highlands. Facing condemnation, the members of the community were offered a deal by a real estate company, and in May 1962, moving vans arrived, residents and their belongings were moved out, literally just ahead of bulldozers that razed the small, simple dwellings. Within a few days, Little Egypt was gone, lost to history. In 2015, Richland College professors Tim Sullivan and Clive Siegle, combined their Anthropology and US History classes into a Learning Community to explore this 'forgotten community,' and, through oral history, archival research, genealogy, and archeology, their students have focused on reconstructing this community and its legacy for deeper understanding of the political, social and cultural changes that shaped Dallas as we know it today. This is as much a story about what community college students can accomplish, overcoming the challenges they face, as their contributions to bringing an underrepresented part of Dallas history back to life.



Traveling west on I30 from downtown, take the Montgomery Street exit. Turn right on Montgomery and continue to the five-way intersection at Camp Bowie. 




