## January Speaker: Matthew Boulanger

### 10,000 Years of Lithic Procurement in the Taos Valley

Pedestrian survey of 100 km2 (nearly 24,500 acres) of land near Taos, New Mexico has resulted in the identification of more than 450 archaeological sites dating from the Paleoindian period to the historic past. Over the past two years, I have been working to inventory and curate the collections of this survey. These efforts have included working with volunteer citizen scientists and students to digitize site information as well as a detailed study of the lithic artifacts collected during the survey. I will present the first results of this work, focusing on long-term patterns in lithic-procurement. Specifically, I will report on the results of using X-ray fluorescence (XRF) spectrometry to characterize and determine the sources of all obsidian and fine-grained volcanic tools and debitage collected by the survey. This dataset, comprising 575

individual artifacts from nearly 150 sites and nearly 200 isolated finds, is ideal for documenting toolstone use throughout the Holocene. Results from this study suggest a remarkable persistence in the types of stone being selected for use in toolmaking, emphasizing deep-time connections between the region's Indigenous populations and their landscape.


**Matthew Boulanger** received his Ph.D. from the Department of Anthropology at the University of Missouri. He is interested in multidisciplinary approaches to anthropology and archaeology. His research combines aspects of evolutionary theory, physical geography, landscape ecology, middle-range research, and geoscience into studying human behavior.

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## 2022 NTAS Highlights

## Jimmy Barrera

• In January, the Historian transferred the NTAS archives from home storage to the excellent Special Collections facility at UT Arlington.

- January through December NTAS member Chris Meis continued to diligently oversee investigations of the Clovis Field site in Mills County. Many NTAS members participated, and these are continuing into 2023.
- In January, July, and November, members of NTAS supported the Grass House rebuild project at the Caddo Mounds State Historic Site near Alto, Texas.
- February 12<sup>th</sup> NTAS recorded one archeological site with historic structures and possible marker trees in Hood County.
- In February, Dr. Tim Sullivan coordinated Anthropology Day with NTAS members, faculty, and students at the Richland Campus of Dallas College.
- March 26<sup>th</sup> NTAS volunteers recorded three archeological sites at the Fort Worth Nature Center & Refuge (FWNCR).
- During 2022, Dr. Catrina Banks Whitley hosted numerous lab opportunities including: Human Remains Identification Class, Flotation Class, and Artifact Identification Class.
- In June, 59 NTAS members attended the Texas Archeological Society (TAS) Field School in Kerrville, and NTAS co-hosted the Kids Archeology Camp at the Doss Heritage and Culture Center in Weatherford.
- NTAS reconned a series of archeological sites along the Clear Fork of the Brazos through Jones County in July.
- In July, Dr. Whitley resumed excavations at the BaahKu archeological site in New Mexico and was joined by multiple members.
- In 2022, NTAS awarded three Sponsored Student Memberships, one scholarship for a TAS Academy, and five scholarships for the TAS Field School.
- NTAS raised donations through NTAS hats, photo scales, scoops, and archeology books.
   NTAS also donated funds, combined with matching funds from members, to support Texas Beyond History and the Grass House rebuild at the Caddo Mounds State Historic Site.
- NTAS issued the inaugural volume of the Journal of the North Texas Archeological Society in October.
- In October, NTAS hosted and participated in numerous Texas Archeology Month (TAM) events including: the first annual "Denton Dig It" archeology fair; the "Pioneer Heritage Fest" at the Doss Heritage and Culture Center in Weatherford; a TAM day at the Gainesville Travel Center; Dinosaur Valley State Park 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary event; Fort Worth Nature Center & Refuge site tour; along with building and distributing TAM kits for kids at various events. Through these various events NTAS engaged with thousands of people during the month of October!
- In October, NTAS co-hosted the TAS Annual Meeting in Tyler. Numerous members volunteered, donated, presented, and enjoyed this important gathering for Texas Archeology.
- Other significant NTAS accomplishments in 2022 include that NTAS was awarded an additional mini grant from Humanities Texas to cover operational costs for Jan 1-June 31, 2023. NTAS held hybrid monthly meetings throughout 2022. And last but certainly not least, NTAS membership increased from around 230 to 316 members in 2022!!!

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## **TAS Annual Meeting Summary**

#### **Chris Meis**

The 93<sup>rd</sup> TAS Annual Meeting was held October 21-23, 2022 on the UT Tyler Campus in conjunction with the 27<sup>th</sup> East Texas Archeological Conference. Rather than the traditional hotel/conference room facilities, it was held on the UT Tyler campus with 306 registrants. The Local Arrangements Committee was comprised of both North Texas Archeological Society (NTAS) members and UT Tyler staff. The host society was the North Texas Archeological Society while the Program Chairs for the meeting were Dr. Thomas Guderjan and Dr. Cory E. Sills of UT Tyler. Dr. Guderjan and Chris Meis were co-chairs for the Annual Meeting. NTAS members on the Local Arrangements Committee included Dana Parker (Treasurer), Linda Lang (Registrar), and Gen Freix (Silent Auction/Book Room Coordinator).

Friday started out with TAS Board, Council of Texas Archeologists (CTA) and Texas Archeological Stewards Network meetings and the always popular Silent Auction and raffle drawings. Paper presentations were presented in the afternoon. The Public Forum speaker on Friday evening was Leslie Bush, Ph.D., R.P.A. Dr. Bush's presentation was titled "Caddo Archeology: The Land and The People". TAS professional and avocational archeologists were available to answer questions about artifacts brought by local area residents and the CTA Career Social was held.

Saturday morning started a full day of paper and poster presentations with a total of 65 papers and 15 posters having been presented at the Annual Meeting. The silent auction and raffle sales proved to be a very productive fund raiser this year, generating \$4,298 for TAS. Thanks to all the TAS members who contributed silent auction items and helped Friday and Saturday to make this so successful.

Our Saturday evening banquet had 179 registrants. After the three-course meal, the TAS and Presidential Awards were announced and given to deserving TAS members. This was the first Annual Meeting since 2019, so three past TAS presidents, James Everett, Sarah Chesney, and Elizabeth Coon-Nguyen had awards to present. (See related article in the TAS newsletter for these awards.) The banquet speaker was Dr. Rolfe D. Mandel, who is the Senior Scientist & Director, Odyssey Archaeological Research Program and University of Kansas Distinguished Professor. His presentation was titled "Searching for Evidence of the First People in the Americas: A Geoarchaeological Perspective" focused on the application of geoarchaeological methods in the search for evidence of the first people in the Americas, and highlighted ongoing studies in the Big Bend region.

The East Texas Archeological Conference and North Texas Archeological Society appreciate all the help in making this meeting a success. Thanks to the Maya Research Program and Humanities Texas for their sponsorships. The presenters, guest speakers, TAS attendees, UT Tyler student volunteers and the facilities and catering personnel all contributed to the success of this 93<sup>rd</sup> TAS Annual Meeting and we are grateful.

The income produced by the meeting was \$34,133 versus \$14,993 in expenses, resulting in a net surplus of \$19,140. Of this surplus, \$4,298 was from the Silent Auction, book sales and raffle proceeds. This income goes directly to TAS while the remaining surplus of \$14,842 is split evenly with \$7,421 going to both TAS and NTAS, the host society.

Mark your calendars now to attend the next Annual Meeting scheduled for October 5-8<sup>th</sup>, 2023 at the Embassy Suites hotel in San Marcos, Texas. The Travis County Archeological will be hosting that event.


