### March Speaker: Rhiana Ward

#### Archaeology and Preservation at Mission San Antonio de Valero, San Antonio, Bexar County, Texas

In 2019-2020, Raba Kistner, Inc., conducted a 17 month-long field investigation for the Alamo Preservation Project, at Mission San Antonio de Valero in downtown San Antonio, Texas. The purpose of the investigations was to assist the Alamo Preservation Team in determining the current conditions of the Alamo Church and Long Barrack, and to determine what levels of stabilization and repair would be needed in order to preserve the iconic buildings. Investigations recovered thousands of artifacts, and uncovered a variety of features that reflect the 300-plus years of historic occupation at the mission site, as well as the proto- and prehistoric occupations that came before.

Rhiana D. Ward is an Assistant Director of Cultural Resources Raba Kistner, Inc., a San Antonio based engineering firm. She received her Bachelor of Arts in Anthropology from the University of Texas at San Antonio, and her Master of Arts in Anthropology with a focus in Archaeology/Cultural Resources



Management from Texas Tech University in Lubbock. Mrs. Ward has thirteen years of archaeological experience in Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, and Belize, and has worked in the City of San Antonio for over eight years. Mrs. Ward specializes in regulatory review under federal, state, and local compliance, including the Texas Antiquities Code and the Historic Preservation and Design Section of the City of San Antonio's Unified Development Code. Her most recent projects include work on the City Hall Renovations Project, the San Pedro Creek Culture Park Project, and the Alamo Preservation Project.


Not only will it be only a few hours away in Tyler, Texas, but NTAS is co-hosting the meeting along with UT Tyler!


### **Clovis Field Site Update**

Several units in two new areas identified by the GPR as likely targets were In both of these areas, opened. burned rock scatters and hearth features were discovered. Including the area discovered a couple of months earlier, that makes three areas in this field showing hearth features at the same approximate depth. We intend to expand these areas in the coming weeks. The next scheduled excavation dates are March 12-15. 2022. ### **Squaw Creek Site**




Figure 2 (Left). Murray Cohen and Steve Lowe excavating a shovel test. Photo by Susan Everett.

On February 12<sup>th</sup> 13 members of NTAS participated in an archeological site recording in Hood County (Figure 1). The archeological site was named by the landowners Steve and Karen Adams the Squaw Creek site (41HD111) for proximity to this stream. A fresh February day kept folks diligently focused on three shovel tests, site form, mapping, and other records. Shovel testing identified buried historic materials from 0-30 centimeters below the surface (Figure 2). NTAS recorded precontact debitage on the surface in one area of the site and dense historic materials across much of the site. The historic buildings (house, smokehouse, cellar, and shed) were built as early as the mid-1920s based on the deed, but the artifact assemblage (ceramics, glass, bricks, and metal) indicate that the historic occupation may have started in the mid-to-late 19th century. While NTAS did not identify any precontact materials in the three shovel tests excavated, the landowner collection represents late Paleoindian through Late Prehistoric occupation from a variety of diagnostic lithic artifacts. The diagnostic types identified by NTAS include: Angostura, Gower (or Uvalde), Carrollton, Bulverde, and Alba. Two formal manos (grinding stones), and various bifacial and unifacial tools are in the collection. NTAS also recorded attributes on the two potential marker trees and will continue working with the Comanche Nation of Oklahoma and the Texas Historic Tree Coalition to ensure they have record of these trees. Artifacts from the shovel testing remained with the landowners, and all other site records are filed with the Texas Archeological Research Laboratory.

### **TCFPS (Texas Clovis Fluted Point Survey) Call for Data**

The author of the TCFPS and colleagues at the Texas Archaeological Research Laboratory (TARL) and the Prehistory and Research Project (PRP) ask for help in updating information for the 4th edition of Texas Clovis Fluted Point Survey.

In 1985, David Meltzer initiated a survey of Clovis fluted points in Texas. That survey continues to the present, and as of 2007 when the 3rd edition of the survey was published there was over 544 Clovis fluted points recorded by the Texas Clovis Fluted Point Survey (TCFPS). Clovis fluted points occur throughout the state.



The TCFPS has now come under the control and curation at TARL. It is anticipated that the number of Clovis fluted points from Texas will be increased as will the counties from where the points were reported. This call for data will provide details of how to report any Clovis fluted point discoveries and where you can report your find.

The ability to differentiate between human and faunal remains is essential during excavations. The presence of human remains in a field project triggers numerous laws and additional notifications to descendants. Becoming familiar with human skeletal remains morphology is an important skill as small fragments and faunal bones with similar morphology can be very difficult to identify. This hands-on lab will cover basic morphology of adult and infant remains. This lab is not designed to make you an expert in human remain identification, but to provide a greater level of confidence during excavations!

### First Call for Papers — TAS/ETAS 2022 Annual Meeting

Abstracts and creative ideas are sought for papers, symposia, and posters to be presented at the joint 93<sup>rd</sup> Annual Meeting of the **Texas Archeological Society** and the 28<sup>th</sup> **East Texas Archeological Conference** at the University of Texas at Tyler on October 21-23, 2022. This is anticipated as an in-person gathering. TAS encourages presentations by avocational, student, and professional members on any topic of archeological interest.

The program committee is planning a series of regional and topical symposia. Consequently, time slots for papers and symposia will fill early. Anyone interested in presenting at the meeting should contact the program chairs as early as possible to ensure that time and space will be available.

Symposia may be organized around any topic, area, major project, and/or time period. Each symposium will be allotted two hours per five presenters, with a five-presenter minimum. Due to scheduling concerns, symposium organizers must ensure that all abstracts for symposia and symposium papers meet an earlier deadline of August 15, 2022. For effective presentation of symposia, organizers may specify the order of papers and their length, as long as these points are stated in the symposium abstracts.

Papers will be limited to 15 minutes. The deadline for receipt of paper abstracts is September 1, 2022.

Posters are encouraged. Poster presentations effectively convey visual, graphic, and quantitative information and reach a larger audience than oral papers. Poster abstracts must be received by September 1, 2022 to appear in the program; late poster entries may be accommodated after consultation with the Program Chair.

Other presentation formats such as discussions, demonstrations, and hands-on workshops may be held on approval of the Program Chair and Annual Meeting organizers.

Submit all abstracts as email attachments. Abstracts must include the following information: *Paper/Symposium/Poster* (indicate one); *Title*; *Author(s)* and *Affiliation(s)*; Abstract for each presentation (150 words maximum).

Meeting rooms will be equipped with data projectors and computers; additional audiovisual needs may be accommodated given prior notice. Contact the Program Chairs with questions about submission dates, formats, and/or equipment. We look forward to your contributions to this meeting.
