March Speaker: Mr. Lance Tahmahkera

Stories on Cynthia Ann Parker

Mr. Tahmahkera will discuss the Parker family's coming to the Mexia/Groesbeck area, the raid on Fort Parker, Cynthia Ann Parker's capture by the Comanches and recapture at the Pease River by Sul Ross. He will then take things to her eventual death and relocation by Quanah back to Oklahoma.

Born and raised in Fort Worth, Lance Tahmahkera was with Texas Health Harris Methodist Fort Worth for the past 45 years and recently retired from the Imaging Department Texas Health Harris Methodist Neighborhood Care and Wellness – Burleson. He is a great-great-grandson of Comanche Chief, Quanah Parker. With his parents staying close to the Comanche traditions and culture, much of his youth was spent at pow-wows learning family stories about ancestors and the tribal ways. He's been asked to share those stories with various schools/universities, historical groups and organizations. The stories that will be shared will vary



from the origins of the tribe, life on the plains and reservation, Cynthia Ann and Quanah Parker to current day events. Also to be shared are children's stories that were passed down through the family.



NTAS meets at 7:00 p.m. on the second Thursday of each month (except June and December) at the University of North Texas Health Science Center, 3500 Camp Bowie Boulevard, Fort Worth (in the Research and Education Building, Room 114), near the intersection of Camp Bowie and Montgomery Street.

Traveling west on I-30 from downtown, take the Montgomery Street exit. Turn right on Montgomery and continue to the five-way intersection at Camp Bowie. Turn right onto Camp Bowie, followed by an immediate left onto Clifton Street. Turn into the first parking lot on the left (Administrator and Visitor Parking).
