Re-examining the Toyah Paradox

As an archaeologist, I have the unique opportunity to tell the stories that have been left out of our history books but can still be inferred from objects people left behind. The modern Texan identity is undeniably shaped by Spanish colonial influences – from the food we eat to our most-visited landmark, the Alamo. But this narrative rarely acknowledges that when the first Spanish explorers arrived at the northern boundary of New Spain, they found the landscape already occupied by indigenous peoples who had complex social, political, and trade networks. The result that we lose all the complicated details that add up to make Texas so unique, and the descendants of the indig-

enous populations lose that connection to their heritage. My dissertation uses new photography and image processing technologies to identify the small changes in arrowhead shape that occur across Texas with the assumption that the more time craftsmen spend together, the more their art starts to look the same and vice versa. This allows me to reconstruct the social networks into which the Spanish were inserting themselves.

Bonnie Reynolds is a doctoral student in the SMU Department of Anthropology, where she has also been lead curator at the Archaeological Research Collections since 2018. Bonnie has a Bachelor's Degree in Archaeology from Johns Hopkins University and a Master's degree in Archaeology in Material Science from Cornell University, where she focused in historical preservation and museum studies. Her current dissertation focuses on the Spanish Colonial era in Texas, with emphasis on stone-tool production.



NTAS meets at 7:00 p.m. on the second Thursday of each month (except June and December) at the University of North Texas Health Science Center, 3500 Camp Bowie Boulevard, Fort Worth (in the Research and Education Building, Room 114), near the intersection of Camp Bowie and Montgomery Street.

Traveling west on I-30 from downtown, take the Montgomery Street exit. Turn right on Montgomery and continue to the five-way intersection at Camp Bowie. Turn right onto Camp Bowie, followed by an immediate left onto Clifton Street. Turn into the first parking lot on the left (Administrator and Visitor Parking). On October 8th, Bret Williamson assisted Michelle Villafranca (Fort Worth Parks Operations and Natural Resource Manager) and Suzanne Tuttle (former director of the Fort Worth Nature Center, and native plant/prairie expert) on an multidisciplinary field trip for this year's Cross Timbers Master Naturalists, to visit examples of Fort Worth Prairie and an 1800s historic archeological site on property not open to the public, plus a fairly new Ft.
