

Is time moving faster? Probably not but it sure seems like it! It is already time for the July/ August edition of the news-letter. Maybe moving faster has to do with getting older. Maybe it is about the culture around that wants to thrive on movement and doing stuff.

I remember when the summertime was a time to rest and relax. It seems now that is not the case. Of course, maybe it is just my perception of time that has got me so discombobulated. In a couple of weeks Kathy, Alex and I will be heading south to visit Kathy's mom. The last visit didn't last too long, and we don't get to see Kathy's family much because of the distance and of course having a child in school.

All this time talk makes me wonder about how I sometimes want to put things off that I know I should do. A case in point is getting my second shingles shot. In February I went to a different insurance company. The place where I received the first shingles shot doesn't take my current insurance. I have put off getting the second shot even though the current place I could get the shot is closer than the last one.

All this procrastination has bled over into other aspects of life. I wonder about how it is with you all. Do you feel the pull and tug of time and then just try to hide by not doing stuff you know you should do? The gospel texts for Pentecost from Matthew are filled with movement (not so much as Luke's story of Jesus). For Matthew this movement occurs with Jesus to be sure. But it also occurs with the disciples. They are sent out into the world to share the message. They are given specific instructions for going out. They are told to move on if someone doesn't receive them.

How often have we tried to share a message of God's mercy and love and people rejected it for some reason? Has this happened to you? Ministry and mission happen when we all take seriously the work God gives us to do. All this work is always, always in response to the unconditional grace from our Lord and Savior.

One last thing. It is always appropriate to take time to rest. This is especially true when we seem to be off center/balance. So maybe some bit of procrastination is good – just not too much!

Dear St. Paul Congregation,

I am writing while sitting on a train in Germany. The last five days I spent in Sicily, Italy, where I performed a piano solo recital in a small but very atmospheric setting. It took place in a more than 1000-year-old former church that is now used as a cultural center for the community of Ispica. The strongest impression for me was the stillness of this little town. While taking a break during practicing the afternoon before the recital, I walked around the church and across the plaza in its front. I heard the wind, the occasional clattering of dishes through on open window (it was hot!) and sometimes a car engine in the far distance. Otherwise: nothing.

Like Americans, Italian people are very hospitable, and I was taken for sightseeing in several cities in the south of Sicily the days after the recital. We even got to see flamingos in the wild in a nature reserve.

Later today, I will arrive at my mother's place, and enjoy some cherished family time. On Sunday, I will play another recital in my hometown – the first in probably 20 or so years with several former music teachers in attendance, so I am very much looking forward to it.

One last thing I'd like to share: We took a trip to the southernmost point of Sicily in Portopalo di Capo Passero, which is also the southernmost point of Italy (with the exception of two tiny islands). It's an interesting place, because the Ionian Sea (between Italy and Greece) meets the Mediterranean Sea there, and the water on the Ionian side is very quiet, while the Mediterranean Sea always appears stormy, with much bigger waves. Legend has it that the namesake of our church, St. Paul came through here, on his journey to Malta.

I wish you all a very happy July and look forward to returning in the end of the month!




